# A Note from Fr. Ben

### The Beauty of Surrender

I have spent a lot of the last few years pondering the question, "How do we really grow in holiness?" When I was writing my thesis at the end of my formation, I was excited because I could really dig into this question and spend some time researching it. I started by looking at sport and performance psychology and how people grow in mastery of a skill. Then I looked at the difference between just getting good at a skill, and becoming virtuous, and lastly drew some conclusions around what it might look like to grow in virtue, or in holiness. It was a gift to be able to really dig into this question, and there was one key that really hit me.

Normally when we think about getting really good at something, we think of achievement. We strive to achieve everything, and see our accomplishments as achievements, as things that I did because of the work I put in. When we talk about holiness, there is an interesting piece that gets added in: God. We cannot achieve holiness on our own. Our holiness is not just dependent on us doing a bunch of holy things. It is dependent on us receiving the love of the Father. It is dependent on our relationship with the Holy Spirit, and becoming docile so that He can work through us.

Right after I became a priest, I started pondering sin and our brokenness more. How do we stop sinning? Is stopping sinning about achievement? When we stop sinning, have we just conquered the devil in that area and achieved a deeper freedom because of our work in overcoming it? While it takes effort, the more I ponder it, the more I see it as another letting go. Sin seems to be us trying to grasp at love and find it outside of God. We try to have the greatest accomplishments so that others will love us (pride), or the best things so that others will love us (greed). Or we don't quite believe we are lovable so we try to distract ourselves from the pain in our hearts with the pleasures of this world (lust, gluttony). It seems to me that getting over sin is more of a letting go than an achievement. It is actually surrender.

I think when we look at growing in our spiritual lives, the key is surrender. It is in receiving, surrendering to the Love of the Father, and trusting that love. It is in letting go of the need to find love elsewhere. As we begin to surrender, to allow ourselves to be loved by the Father, we are able simply to act with love. We don't need to sin, to grasp at love in other ways, and can remain at peace in any circumstance. Whether it is in the middle of a storm of life, or an abundance of joy and happiness, we can simply trust that the Father loves us, is taking care of us, and will sustain us no matter what.

As we enter this time of Lent, can we see the penances we take on as a surrender? I am letting go of my need to find love or fulfillment from this particular thing. I am letting go of needing social media for affirmation. I am letting go of my need to eat meat on Fridays. I am letting go of my need to have that dessert, and growing in my receptivity of the Love of the Father. Our prayer practices we take on are also a growth in surrender. I am letting go of using this time in a different way, and trusting the Lord in that. I am taking time to be receptive, to allow the Lord to come into my life and do as He wills. Our almsgiving can also be a surrender and trusting that God will ultimately take care of me: that all the money I have is first a gift from Him and I can surrender my first fruits back to Him, trusting that He will keep providing.

This Lent, I just invite you into a deeper place of surrender, of allowing the Lord to come into your heart in a

deeper way and lead you wherever He desires. All of our practices take effort and we need to be a part of them, but I invite you this Lent to see them all as a surrender. As we continue to surrender, the Holy Spirit will continue to fill us, lead us, and transform us into a more and more perfect image of Christ.

# A Letter from Archbishop Charles

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Decades ago, the bishops of the United States established the annual **Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe** to help rebuild the Church after 40 years, and in some places 70 years of oppressive communist rule. Through the generosity of U.S. Catholics churches have been rebuilt, children have been educated, religious vocations have been fostered, and hope has been strengthened.

Current conditions, with the war in the Ukraine have brought on new challenges. Those migrants displaced by the war have fled to other regions and countries seeking safety. So the Church is reaching out to provide shelter and humanitarian relief to these victims, while still assisting the priests and religious who have opened their churches, monasteries, and convents to respond to the urgent needs.

The annual **Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe** will be taken up in parishes of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis on the weekend of **March 1-2, 2025**. We bear witness to our identity as Christians when we meet the needs of these, our brothers and sisters by our financial offerings and our prayers. Your assistance not only helps the people of Ukraine but supports the resurgence of faith in 27 other countries once persecuted under communism.

Please be generous as you can for the restoration of the Church and a better future for Central and Eastern Europe.



### Prayer to St. Joseph Explained

For centuries, Christians have relied on the intercessory prayers of Joseph, earthly spouse of the Blessed Virgin and foster father of Christ, who was obedient to the will of God in all things.

The prayer to St. Joseph on the cover of this bulletin is often called "the unfailing prayer to St. Joseph." It is thought to have originated in the first century A.D., having been discovered around the year 50. It was sent by the Pope to Emperor Charles V as he went into battle. It is said that those who recite this prayer will not suffer a sudden death and will likewise be protected from drowning, the effects of poison and fire, falling into the hands of the enemy or being overpowered in battle.
