HOLY CROSS CHURCH

Dear Parishioners,

Happy New Year – of Grace 2022 that is. The First Sunday of Advent begins a new liturgical year. We begin by focusing on the goal of the spiritual life, where we hope to end up, with Jesus, our Universal King whom we celebrated last weekend and concluded the Year of Grace 2021. Mark's gospel focused last liturgical year (the second of three cycles of readings in the lectionary) on the B cycle of readings. This liturgical year, Year C, the gospel is predominantly taken from the Gospel of Luke. Luke's gospel is known as the Gospel of Inclusion. The poor, the outcast, women and children, and Gentiles (non-Jews) figure predominantly in Jesus' parables, encounters, and teachings. For instance, unique in Luke's gospel is the widow from Nain burying her son who crosses paths with Jesus, the parable of the Good Samaritan, healing of the crippled woman on the Sabbath, parables of the Lost Coin and the Prodigal Son, letting the children come to Jesus, the cleansing of the ten lepers, encountering the tax collector Zacchaeus in Jericho, Jesus weeping over Jerusalem, and finally affirming the good thief on the cross (Dismas) that: "Today you will be with me in paradise," (Lk 23:43). Luke is traditionally described as an artist or doctor and the Acts of the Apostles is also attributed to him. We hope to get to know St. Luke and his writings better this year. His feast day is October 18th.


Advent is the shortest "season" in the liturgical year. However, this year it is almost the longest it can be, almost four complete weeks because of where December 25th falls on the calendar, this year a Saturday. The four Sundays of Advent are: 1st (November 28th), 2nd (December 5th), 3rd Gaudete "Rejoice" (December 12th) and 4th (December 19th). Christmas Eve falls on Friday, December 24th. Advent is a challenging season to stay focused in since secular society has already jumped to Christmas. The darker and deeper hues of purple are used to distinguish Advent from the lighter purple/grey ashiness of Lent. Advent has two foci: First, preparing for the End Times, our own end in death, and the world's end on the Last Day. Second, preparing to journey with Mary and Joseph to the manager for the Incarnation of the Word of God made flesh in the person of Jesus, Son of God, and Son of Mary. Advent has an underlying penitential tone inviting us to prepare for Judgement, whenever that happens, and to prepare anew for the coming grace of God at Christmas. The Christmas season continues with the feast of the Holy Family quickly following on Sunday, December 26th; the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God on Saturday, January 1, 2022; the Epiphany, January 2nd; and concludes with the Baptism of the Lord, January 9th. We very much look forward to having even more parishioners in the pews in comparison to last year. Statistics show that 60% of Catholics will attend Mass once or more during the Advent and Christmas seasons tripling the less than 20% that usually attend weekly. It is a graced time of year to invite relatives and friends who may not have been to church since before covid or even before 2020 to consider coming with you to experience Jesus in the community of his Church. It is up to us who regularly attend to be hospitable, welcoming, and encouraging of returning or new faces in the pews. It is the time to take advantage of the gift of faith God gives us and challenge ourselves to be living ambassadors of Christ's abiding presence before, during, and after the seasons Advent and Christmas as we strive to always make God known, loved, and severed here and in the manner of our lives everyday in the world around us.

To that end, here are some things to consider as Advent 2021 begins. This Sunday from 11am – 12:30pm you are invited to join fellow parishioners and families in making your own Advent wreath to pray with at home. Supplies might be limited to those who registered already but there might be an extra kit or two around, and if anything, a wonderful opportunity to experience some of the hope, joy, peace, and love of this holy season together in person! Tuesday evening the Right to Life Committee will be hosting Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament beginning at 7:00pm in church inviting us to pray with intention that the wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit be with our judicial leaders as the Supreme Court begins the next day hearing and debating the historic case over the right of states to protect mothers and the God-given rights of the unborn. For more information on this national prayer campaign visit the Catholic Vote website. It is a beautiful and powerful way to begin the Season of Advent in prayer. I mentioned many online resources to encourage and guide us in prayer this Advent. Search Office of the Secretariat for Evangelization in the Diocese of Fall River's website. Similarly Busted Halo, Word on Fire, Dynamic Catholic, and FORMED. I will be highlighting and giving you links for FORMED during Advent and throughout the new year via Flocknote. Follow the instructions on the flyer page toward the back of this bulletin for how to enter the site specifically coded for Holy Cross Parish. It will keep you logged in on whatever device used unless you log out or clear cookies. I will prayerfully begin this journey to Christmas with you on the road and in person next weekend for the 2nd Sunday of Advent. God Bless, Fr. Brad

All Saints

01 November



This feast day in the Church dates to the 2^{nd} century when Christians would bury the body of a martyr in a tomb that would be accessible to the faithful. A martyr is one who witnessed to the faith even to the point of death, so to honor them after their life ended Christians would gather at their tomb to pray and celebrate the Eucharist in memory of those who had gone before them. By the 5^{th} century celebrations moved to local parishes.

Originally this feast day was celebrated at various times throughout the year. It was in the 9th century that Pope Gregory IV fixed the date as it still stands today, 01 November. Eventually the feast moved from honoring martyrs to remembering all Christians who led heroic gospel-inspired lives. This beautiful feast emphasizes the bond between those Christians already with God and those still on earth. The feast points to our ultimate goal --- to be with God.

There's a beautiful prayer called, "The Litany of Supplication." It calls out the name of a saint followed by the response, "pray for us." For example, "St. Joseph, pray for us;" "St. Mary Magdalene, pray for us;" "St. Anthony of Padua, pray for us." We raise our voices invoking the names of our ancestors in the faith and ask them to pray for us, watch over us, and protect us.

Reflection Questions: Who are the saints whose lives have inspired your faith? What have you learned from these holy men and women in regards to living as a Christian?

Find some time to quietly call out the names of the saints who've been an important part of your Catholic life and ask them, each day, to pray for you.

READING I Dn 7:13-14

The days are coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah. In those days, in that time, I will raise up for David a just shoot; he shall do what is right and just in the land. In those days Judah shall be safe and Jerusalem shall dwell secure; this is what they shall call her: "The LORD our justice."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

To you, O Lord, I lift my soul.

READING II 1 Thes 3:12—4:2

Brothers and sisters:

May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you, so as to strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his holy ones. Amen.

Finally, brothers and sisters, we earnestly ask and exhort you in the Lord Jesus that, as you received from us how you should conduct yourselves to please God and as you are conducting yourselves you do so even more. For you know what instructions we gave you through the Lord Jesus.

"Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life, and that day catch you by surprise like a trap. For that day will assault everyone who lives on the face of the earth. Be vigilant at all times and pray that you have the strength to escape the tribulations that are imminent and to stand before the Son of Man."

THE NICENE CREED
