

On June 10 I celebrated the 22^{nd} anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood. As with many other Holy Cross priests my ordination took place at our parish. I looked back at an album of photos that my mother had put together as a keepsake and my heart was warmed as I saw so many of your faces who were there that day joining me in prayer as I began my life of service.

It has been a profound blessing to be back here for the past year. The gracious welcome that I received from familiar faces and parishioners who were new to me, made me feel very much at home. I have enjoyed renewing acquaintances, meeting children (now young adults) that I baptized and gave their First Holy Communion, and couples whose weddings I officiated at two decades ago. What a joy and priestly blessing.

A few weeks ago, my daily spiritual reading came from a homily by St. Bede the Venerable. He was reflecting on the *Magnificat*, which is Mary's song of praise. St. Bede said that when Mary cried out, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior," she acknowledged the gifts that God had given her. Just as Mary praised the Lord our spiritual lives are meant to be a prayer recognizing God's greatness and how He shows that to us. Our hearts are always meant to be focused on Him and delighting in His goodness. As I have prayed for each of you during my daily prayers, I have been aware of how you have been a sign of God's greatness to me. Thank you for helping me to grow as a priest and supporting my vocation.

As I (and Watson) head back to Indiana and resume teaching Canon Law at the University of Notre Dame, please know that the place you have held in my heart for the past two decades will remain yours. May we always pray for each other, which is the greatest gift that we can be given. And the prayer that I will ask of God for you is one that St. Maximilian Kolbe prayed for himself, "Lord, make us saints. And make us great saints." Holiness and humility are what God calls us to and it must be our daily endeavor.

Thank you, dear parishioners of Holy Cross Parish. May God continue to bless you, and may you grow closer to Him all the days of your lives.



Saint Cyril of Alexandria's Story

Saint of the Day for June 27

Saints are not born with halos around their heads. Cyril, recognized as a great teacher of the Church, began his career as archbishop of Alexandria, Egypt, with impulsive, often violent, actions. He pillaged and closed the churches of the Novatian heretics—who required those who denied the faith to be re-baptized—participated in the deposing of Saint John Chrysostom, and confiscated Jewish property, expelling the Jews from Alexandria in retaliation for their attacks on Christians.

Cyril's importance for theology and Church history lies in his championing the cause of orthodoxy against the heresy of Nestorius, who taught that in Christ there were two persons, one human and one divine.

The controversy centered around the two natures in Christ. Nestorius would not agree to the title "Godbearer" for Mary. He preferred "Christ-bearer," saying there are two distinct persons in Christ—divine and human—joined only by a moral union. He said Mary was not the mother of God but only of the man Christ, whose humanity was only a temple of God. Nestorianism implied that the humanity of Christ was a mere disguise.

Presiding as the pope's representative at the Council of Ephesus in 431, Cyril condemned Nestorianism and proclaimed Mary truly the "God-bearer"—the mother of the one Person who is truly God and truly human. In the confusion that followed, Cyril was deposed and imprisoned for three months, after which he was welcomed back to Alexandria.

Besides needing to soften some of his opposition to those who had sided with Nestorius, Cyril had difficulties with some of his own allies, who thought he had gone too far, sacrificing not only language but orthodoxy. Until his death, his policy of moderation kept his extreme partisans under control. On his deathbed, despite pressure, he refused to condemn the teacher of Nestorius.

READING I 1 Kgs 19:16b, 19-21

The LORD said to Elijah: "You shall anoint Elisha, son of Shaphat of Abelmeholah, as prophet to succeed you." Elijah set out and came upon Elisha, son of Shaphat, as he was plowing with twelve yoke of oxen; he was following the twelfth. Elijah went over to him and threw his cloak over him. Elisha left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Please, let me kiss my father and mother goodbye, and I will follow you." Elijah answered, "Go back! Have I done anything to you?" Elisha left him, and taking the yoke of oxen, slaughtered them; he used the plowing equipment for fuel to boil their flesh, and gave it to his people to eat. Then Elisha left and followed Elijah as his attendant.

READING II Gal 5:1, 13-18

Brothers and sisters:

For freedom Christ set us free; so stand firm and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery. For you were called for freedom, brothers and sisters. But do not use this freedom as an opportunity for the flesh; rather, serve one another through love. For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. But if you go on biting and devouring one another, beware that you are not consumed by one another. I say, then: live by the Spirit and you will certainly not gratify the desire of the flesh.

For the flesh has desires against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; these are opposed to each other, so that you may not do what you want. But if you are guided by the Spirit, you are not under the law.

As they were proceeding on their journey someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." But he replied, "Lord, let me go first and bury my father." But he answered him, "Let the dead bury their dead. But you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God."
