Dear Parishioners,

I hope Advent is going well so far for you this year. Advent is such a short season to initially get into, feel and experience progress, and finally silently let go of it as basking in the joy of the Christmas Season commences and lasts for two weeks this year from the evening of December 24th through the Solemnity of the Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord on Sunday, January 8th and Monday, January 9th respectively. This Gaudete or Rejoice! weekend marks the halfway point, two weeks in and two weeks to go of Advent hope, peace, faith, and joy– this year a full two weeks since Christmas falls on a Sunday.

Advent is a challenge when society so quickly starts blasting Santa Baby, sales for this and for that, and bombards us with All I Want for Christmas is You, thank you Mariah, but I already have a Queen of Christmas and her name is Mary. Staying focused on the Reason for the Season is tough when all the preparations seems to displace prayer,



peace flees as anxiety and expectations overwhelm hosts of gatherings, and children are fixated on Santa Claus instead of bothering to learn about St. Nicholas. Presents and partying often displace the Reason for the Season and everything is over on December 26th rather than it being the second day of the traditional twelve days of Christmas between Big Christmas on December 25th and little Christmas on January 6th, the Feast of the Three Kings. If Advent seems countercultural that's because it is! Advent is meant to challenge us to stay in the day, not rush, but patiently prepare and wait so we have something to celebrate when it gets here. God's time and not our time. God's way and not our ways. God's love and joy and peace.

It's not to late to take home a reflection booklet and start on December 11th or 12th, try out the Hallow app, tune into Sunday evenings at 7pm with Holy Cross religious, or simply turn off the Christmas music and lights, light a real candle and contemplate the beauty of: the Light overcoming the darkness, hope overshadowing doubt, peace displacing fear, faith blossoming into new life, and ultimately joy emanating from its source, the birth and presence of the Savior of the Universe, Christ, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. I love lights, trees, wreaths, fudge, cookies, wrapping paper and cards, eggnog, Christmas music, Hallmark movies, jingle bells, sweaters and peppermint lattes, too. However, it is all overly consumeristic and commercialized without Tiny Tim and Christmas conversions, giving from the heart, embracing family and friends, simply spending time with one another just as God longs for us to simply spend time with Him. My prayer for all of us from December 11th to December 24th and beyond is to not get lost spiritually, overwhelmed physically, and exhausted mentally as the days get busier and busier heading toward Christmas. Consider joining us this Wednesday at Immaculate Conception Church at 7pm for Prayer and Penance.

Let us enjoy tiny tots with their eyes all aglow, relish in possibly the last time we'll spend Christmas with older relatives and friends, be an agent of kindness in a world in need of it. Taste, touch, see, and feel the blessings and grace of the Incarnation of God who is Love surrounding us in the days and weeks ahead as we challenge ourselves to open our eyes, ears, and hearts to see, hear, and embrace the gifts for the taking well before, during, and after Christmas Eve and Morning. Rejoice! for the days draw near but are not here yet. Keep up the journey with John the Baptist, Mary and Joseph, and let us all prepare the way of the Lord here and now as much as they did way back then. Maranatha— Come Lord Jesus.

I got a chance to share in Advent joy with our 2022 Marian Award recipient, Penny Brennan, with her daughter Erin. Bishop da Cunha reminded us that service is at the heart of Jesus' Gospel message of loving our neighbor as God loves each and every one of us. I am so very grateful to be a part of serving beside Penny not only as she proclaims God's Word at Mass and welcomes parishioners and visitors to the 8:30am Sunday Mass, but during the week as she now works with us in the parish office on Wednesdays and Thursdays. It's easy to serve others when we know we are always surrounded, encouraged, and sustained by Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

#### **IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS**

The Season That Gives Back

I don't have anything left to give.

You can't pour from an empty cup.

All I do is give. Who is giving to me?

Raise your hand if these thoughts have ever run through your head. I'm sure they occur to all of us from time to time. We can become so easily de-

pleted by the fast pace of life and whatever vocation God has called us to, whether that's parenthood, a demanding professional career or the caretaking of friends and family (or as so often happens, a hybrid of all three). Many of us also undergo certain seasons — seasons of the year, but also seasons of life — that seem to sap us of energy and leave us totally empty.

In these times, it seems impossible to continue in the spirituality of Everyday Stewardship. Graciousness, mindfulness, prayerfulness, gratitude, accountability — maintaining some semblance of these characteristics in our daily life feels not only overly optimistic, but totally impossible.

The Church gives us certain liturgical seasons that are meant to fill us up, almost like spiritual pit stops. Advent is one such season, and the Scriptural passages we reflect on at Mass during these four weeks are filled with images of nature defied. We see the dry steppe blooming. We see the weak made firm. We see the frightened made strong. We see the lame walk. We see the Virgin give birth.

If you think you don't have anything left to give this Advent, think again. This is the season of miracles when what we thought was depleted brings new life. @Lpi
