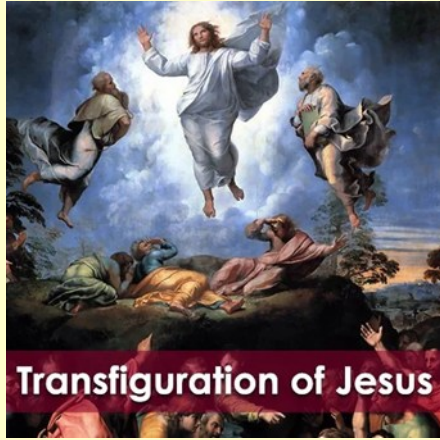
## *From the desk of Fr. Ben*

Dear Friends,

Genesis 12:1-4; 2 Timothy 1:8-10; Matthew 17:1-9

Today, we reflect on the powerful transfiguration of Jesus Christ on Mount Tabor, celebrated on August 6th since the 5th century A.D. This sacred event is also acknowledged every second Sunday of Lent as Transfiguration Sunday, witnessed by His three beloved disciples: Peter, James, and John. Jesus' transfiguration serves as a profound preparation for the apostles, readying them for the significant events of Holy Week—in which He would ultimately sacrifice Himself out of immense love for each of us. In this divine moment, He prepares them for His suffering ahead.

Buddhism shares deep truths about our human experience, starting with the acknowledgment that life is filled with suffering. If we look around, we can see this truth reflected in the world. Notice the faces of those who are consumed by their own pride—often frowning when their desires are unmet. Observe the patients in hospitals bearing pain and illness, or listen to the heart-wrenching cries of those mourning their loved ones. The stories we share are often woven with trials and challenges, reminding us that suffering is a shared part of our journey.



**Transfiguration of Jesus**

Another truth is that suffering originates from our desires. Many struggle with unhappiness due to unfulfilled wants and expectations. Perhaps you yearn for a new appliance but lack the funds, or wish for a romantic connection but feel unworthy. The pursuit of desires can lead us down a path of dissatisfaction if we do not recognize their influence on our happiness.

Reflecting on this, I recall a conversation with a woman in Bula Parish, General Santos City, who owns a thriving fishing industry. She expressed that in her impoverished days, she dreamt of enjoying luxuries like delicious food. Yet, now that she has the means, her health prevents her from indulging in those very delights—reminding us that happiness is not solely found in material fulfillment.

The path to true happiness lies in the liberation from desires. We must courageously ask ourselves what truly causes our suffering.

Often, it springs from our attachment to unmet expectations. Buddha encourages us to strive for freedom from these desires, guiding us toward a lighter heart.

Today's gospel invites us to reflect deeply on our lives and to discover balance:

First, we must nourish our spiritual needs. Though our physical forms grow, our souls deserve equal attention and care.

Second, we should awaken from our metaphorical slumber as the apostles did during the transfiguration. Are we aware of how our words may impact others?

Let us examine our hearts and speak with kindness, overcoming pride that clouds our vision. Third, our spiritual lives require nurturing just as much as our physical endeavors.



Like St. Peter, who sought to take action, we must remember that relentless work is not enough. We need moments for prayer, contemplation, and connection with God to replenish our spirits on the journey toward the eternal Kingdom, where joy knows no bounds. Lastly, let us face the world's suffering with meaning and purpose, joining in the suffering of Christ. Though innocent, He bore the cross for our sins, teaching us that suffering is not punishment but an inherent part of life, alongside joy.

May we hold onto these four guiding principles as we strive for a balanced and fulfilling existence.

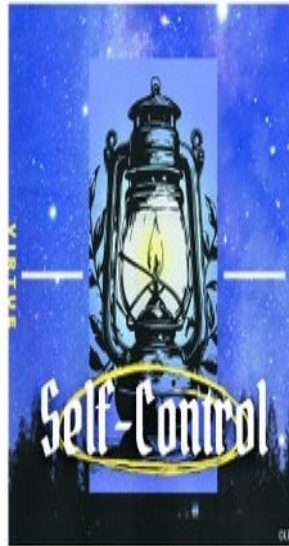

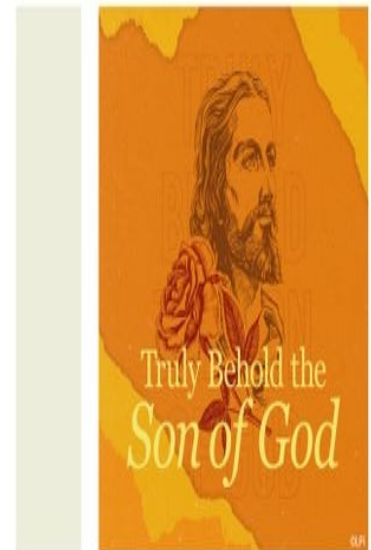

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## Worship & Meditation



### Gospel Meditation

#### Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

When I sit down to answer emails or write a Gospel reflection or return a phone call, I sometimes wonder: Does any of this humdrum work matter? Maybe you ask the same thing about your daily labor. Today's Gospel, the Transfiguration, offers a surprising answer.

Jesus leads Peter, James, and John up a mountain. There, **"his face shone like the sun face and his clothes become white as light" (Matthew 17:2)**. That detail regarding his clothes is worth considering.

We know Jesus' body is inseparably united to the divine nature. But his clothing? That's something made by human hands. It's an artifact. And yet it shines with the same uncreated light. What does this detail mean? The early Church noted that Adam and Eve's first act after the Fall was to make clothing. This clothing symbolizes all human labor that supports our dignity. In Jesus' glorified garments, we see not just the redemption of our body, but of human effort to protect and uplift human dignity.

Parents, your family is your work. Baristas, plumbers, nurses, accountants — your labor, your emails, your phone calls, your spreadsheets — can all become radiant when offered to God in love. The question isn't just do I believe in Jesus' glory, but do I believe he can share it with the work of my hands?

**Lenten Challenge:** Identify the "artifact" you are making to uplift the dignity of others: your job, your home, your relationships. Consciously bring it to the Lord this Sunday at Mass. Offer it to share in His glory. It will begin to shine.

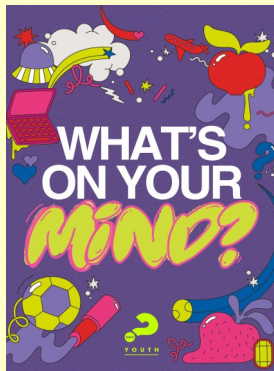

**March 1, 2026 • 2<sup>nd</sup> Week of Lent**

Sometimes we think about making big plans for Lenten sacrificing, only to fall behind with work, family, and other responsibilities. We find ourselves in the Second Week of Lent with no commitment to better prayer lives, doing good deeds, or practicing acts of self-denial. But it is never too late. Catholic Relief Services offers a great resource to parishes and families for praying, fasting and charitable giving—all in one simple project. What is so great about this project, known as Operation Rice Bowl (ORB), is that it makes all the right connections. When you put the money you would have spent on a mocha latte you crave into your Rice Bowl box, you participate in Jesus' sacrifice. CRS provides prayers to accompany your giving. And it uses the money you would have spent on yourself to help people in need across the world. Participating in ORB is an act of solidarity—standing with your brothers and sisters as one human family. Your challenge this week is to adopt Operation Rice Bowl (go to [CRSRiceBowl.org](http://CRSRiceBowl.org) if your parish doesn't do ORB). Give up the extra energy drink, candy bar, movie, or trip to the mall. Put the money in your Rice Bowl, knowing it will be sent to CRS. 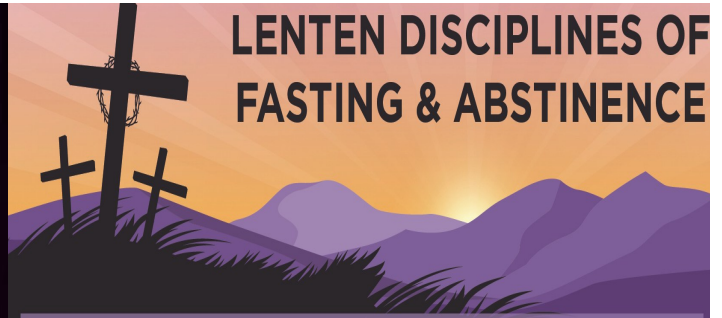

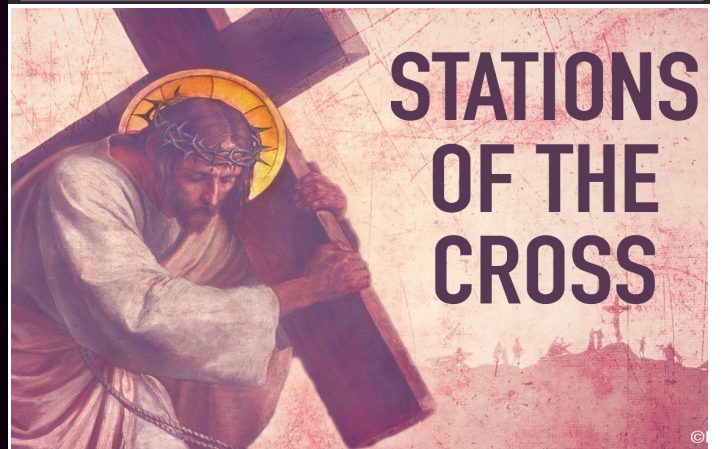


## LENTEN DISCIPLINES OF FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.
