


Our November 2024 Recommendation: *Stories About Purgatory and What They Reveal: 30 Days for the Holy Souls*

Some books rattle your conscience. Others awaken it. This one does both—with quiet clarity and relentless charity. *Stories About Purgatory and What They Reveal* isn’t mere pious folklore. It’s a month-long spiritual boot camp dressed as a collection of devotions, one that unflinchingly reminds us that holiness is not a hobby and Heaven is not automatic.

Drawing from saints, mystics, and forgotten Catholic tradition, this devotional plunges the reader into vivid portraits of the Church Suffering—and reveals the spiritual urgency of our role as the Church Militant.

6. **The Blessed Virgin is Queen of the Suffering.** Mary’s intercession reaches into Purgatory like a mother’s hand through fire. Her maternal care consoles, protects, and sometimes even releases souls [CCC 969]. Devotion to her, in life and death, matters.
7. **Our Guardian Angels don’t stop working.** Angels, assigned in life, remain companions in purification. Some stories hint they may even “escort” souls through the final stages of purgation [CCC 336]. Our friendships with the heavenly host are eternal.
8. **The forgotten souls are not forgotten by God.** Many entries focus on those with “no one to pray for them.” Yet God stirs up hearts on earth to pray precisely for these souls [CCC 1054]. That’s His mercy—quietly orchestrating intercession.
9. **You get what you give.** If you pray for the dead now, they will pray for you later. This isn’t superstition—it’s reciprocity in grace [CCC 1475]. The spiritual economy of charity never runs at a loss.
10. **You still have time.** Purgatory is not punishment for sin forgiven, but purification for love not yet perfected [CCC 1031]. If we embrace penance now, we lessen our time later. Better a hairshirt today than fire tomorrow.
