Fifth Sunday of Lent

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Isn't it ironic that, approaching the most painful time in Jesus' life, His passion and death, we are presented with three very joyous scriptural readings today? Let us start with Ezekiel who wrote nearly 600 years before Christ to the Jews of his day living in exile in Babylon. They had lost everything – their homeland, their king, and their temple. They felt abandoned by their God and many believed the covenantal relationship God offered Abraham for eternity, had been broken by their sinfulness. Their exile had to be very depressing.

Yet along comes Ezekiel with a strange prophecy that the covenant is still very much in force. He says that God will raise their dead and bring them all home to the land of Israel. At this time Jews had no belief in an afterlife. They felt this life was it and they would only live on in their children – if at all. Certainly some of them must have doubted but to those who accepted Ezekiel's as a prophet, this must surely have been cause for celebration. They truly expected that the dead would arise and move back to Israel, a fate welcomed by any practicing Jew, so this is a happy message.

Then we have Paul's similar message to the Romans, except for them the rising will be to eternal life – no mere earthly kingdom here. All they need do is live in the Spirit of Christ's loving message and reject the sensuous pleasures of this world. His words of caution about the flesh must be viewed in the context of his message that they are destined for greater things – just as we all are. Just as Christ rose from he dead, we too will be raised – body and soul so long as we live the gospel message of love that Christ taught and lived.

The gospel message is a clear message of Jesus' love. What makes the story of Lazarus so dramatic is its emphasis on Jesus' humanity. Scholars tell us that John stressed the divinity of Jesus in his Gospel but here he emphasizes His humanity. Why? Well, the first century audience to whom he was speaking believed that Jesus would come back in their lifetimes to bring them to Heaven. John conveys here to his audience that Christ is already among us raising us to His Heavenly kingdom the same way He resurrected Lazarus. Just as His love saves us, our love for one another saves us.

The Lazarus story does not appear in the other gospels. Since it occurs just prior to Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, many scholars attribute the welcoming throngs to the fact that it had become widely known that He had raised a dead man. Would we not today expect such a feat to gain instant worldwide acclaim? And does it not shock us a little that this action is what drove the Jewish authorities to destroy Him? It was the last straw for them.

We really have to dig a little deeper to see the true meaning behind this story. Jesus announces to his disciples that Lazarus is quite sick. Contrary to what we would expect, he does not leave immediately to visit his sick friend, what we would normally expect a loved one to do. What is his point? Even Martha and Mary are disappointed that he waited so long to come that Lazarus had died. In the other gospel stories where Jesus raised people from the dead, he did so right after they had died so why the delay? Especially since we are told that Jesus truly loved these people and cried when told Lazarus had died. So what is the point?

First, there could be no doubt that Lazarus was not in a catatonic stage but was really dead. Otherwise, why would his sister be concerned about the stench from a rotting corpse? No, Jesus did not want to leave any doubt in the people's mind that what He was about to do was a true miracle. The point is quite simple really. Just as Jesus' loving relationship with Martha, Mary and Lazarus brought Lazarus back to life, our loving relationship with Him and with one another is what gives us our eternal life. When He says ,"Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God" just before He raises Lazarus, He tells us the same thing. Believe in Him and eternal happiness is ours. How can we ask for more?
