Social Justice Corner

We are not gods. We are God's children. We are made in the likeness of Jesus. As it says in Isaiah 50; "we have been given well trained tongues that we might know how to speak to the weary, he opens our ears that we might hear."

As today's reading progress we hear of betrayal, shaken faith and denial. *Free will in full control!* Is this our answer to what God has given us? Did we forget about what God gave us in those well trained tongues? How do they speak betrayal and denial, if given by God? And, what about our ears? Do we truly listen or do we search our mind for a response before the statement or question is fully made?

Jesus asks us to give of ourselves as he gave for us. Not in blood, but in love. On Palm Sunday, we carry palm branches as a tribute of waving joy, before Christ, victorious over death; also as a symbol of our wavering fickleness, betraying Christ unto His Death. Dynamic Catholics, "Best Lent Ever" series, Matthew Kelly speaks, in his first week, of resistance and how we are our own worst enemy. Resistance is that thing that stops us from doing what we really know we should. Resistance keeps us from true happiness. Matthew Kelly goes on to say, "God created man for happiness. What happened on good Friday was designed to restore that happiness for you and me."

Resisting God's will gets in the way of all the things that are good. Can we stop before we speak or do and ask ourselves, what would Jesus do? In this final week of lent, challenge yourself to pause and ask Jesus what he would do, before you act. If your collecting for Rice Bowl, put in \$.25 every time you do and thank God for all the grace He has bestowed upon you.

Palm Sunday of The Passion of the Lord

My Fellow Parishioners,

Today begins the holiest week in the Christian calendar. Today is so holy that it even has two names, Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday. This is very fitting because the coming week sees people at their best and at their worst, just as all of us are at different times in our lives. The week opens with Christ greeted by the crowds who wave palms in His honor. Several days later, however, the same crowds call for His execution in the cruelest manner possible.

The good and evil struggle exists in His very disciples as well. First there is the arch villain Judas who sells out his Savior with a kiss, one of the most significant expressions of intimate love people have. This is not a spur of the moment decision for Judas who took the thirty pieces of silver, then waited for the right opportunity to implement his hateful act. But then he regrets what he has done, throws away the money and hangs himself. So we know that even he is sorry.

Then Peter, the leader, who professes undying loyalty to Jesus and even tries to protect Him by cutting off the ear of one of His captors. Yet he too falters and out of fear denies Jesus three times. How typical of us humans to act rashly out of fear. Like Peter, all the other men run away except for John who stays with the women, those whom society deemed less than men, but who remain strongest in their faith.


The significance of the bad human behavior of two of Jesus' best friends should not be lost on us. While Judas regrets his betrayal he is so convinced of his alienation from God that he kills himself rather than ask for forgiveness. In a very real sense his ego convinces him that he is so important God could not love or forgive him. Could it be that his greed in stealing money from the group has blinded him to Divine mercy? We do not know. In any event, he has not grasped the forgiving nature of Jesus who is so full of love that He even asks His Father to pardon His murderers while they are killing Him.

Peter also betrays his friend when he denies he even knows Him. This bullheaded man whom Jesus chose to lead the disciples, turned chicken when the chips were down and fled with the ten other apostles. Yet Peter had just witnessed the Transfiguration. He had actually seen Jesus in His Divine glory so, unlike Judas, he did not despair over his bad behavior. He must have had a sense of Divine mercy because he wept bitterly over his denial soon afterwards. We know Jesus forgave him and the other deserters when His first words to them after the Resurrection were "Peace be with you." Jesus did not condemn them. He offered them His love and forgiveness. Now if Jesus forgives these His closest friends for their betrayal, why would our egos ever make us think that we too are not forgiven? Only one thing prevents us from receiving Divine forgiveness, our pride that stops us from asking for it.

Pope Francis said that God never tires of forgiving us our failures but that too often many of us "tire" of asking for this forgiveness. My friends, let us rejoice this coming week over our salvation. Let us feel the sorrow over the pain and suffering our Savior endured for our lapses. Let us regret our own lapses. But more importantly, let us remember that we are loved totally and unconditionally by our Creator who is always ready to forgive us. All we have to do is ask.

PEACEMAKERS

St. Julie Billiart

St. Julie was born in 1751 of a peasant family in France. She was the co-founder of Notre Dame de Namur and thus the spiritual namesake of San Jose's Notre Dame High School. St Julie took a vow of chastity at age 14 and pursued works of mercy all her life. During the French Revolution, she got in trouble for harboring priests who were being captured and killed. She encouraged young girls into the sisterhood and established more than fifteen convents. She was afflicted with many physical maladies during her life which she bore with patience. At times she was unable to speak.

She died on April 8 and was canonized in 1969.


