Wedding Feast at Cana

The wedding feast at Cana is the site of Jesus' first miracle. John calls it a sign, not a miracle because it reveals God's presence in human history. Isaiah uses wedding imagery to describe God's presence among us. As in a marriage, God's relationship with us is a bond or a covenant which is established. God and humanity are united as in marriage. When we say "Yes" to God as Mary did, we seem to take on a new identity. Isaiah uses words like "my delight" and "espoused" to describe us.

How could God love us so much, we ask? Love is alive in a wedding ceremony. Christ is the ultimate bridegroom, sent by God to humanity, which is his bride. Every Sunday, when we come together to celebrate this bond and drink the wine, we join in God's covenant with us for salvation. He loves us and all he asks is that we love him back. Is that too much to ask?

Let us consider the many ways that God loves us and consider how we can show our love and appreciation to God for all he has done for us

Message of the Holy Father Francis for the celebration of the 52nd World Day of Peace (January 1, 2019)

The following is an excerpt from the Message of the Holy Father Francis for the celebration of the 52nd World Day of Peace, held on January 1, 2019 on the theme: *Good Politics at The Service of Peace*.

- 1. "Peace be to this house!" Pope Francis says, "bringing peace is central to the mission of Christ's disciples. That peace is offered to all those men and women who long for peace amid the tragedies and violence that mark human history. The "house" of which Jesus speaks is every family, community, country and continent, in all their diversity and history. It is first and foremost each individual person, without distinction or discrimination. But it is also our "common home": the world in which God has placed us and which we are called to care for and cultivate.
- 2. The challenge of good politics Political office and political responsibility thus constantly challenge those called to the service of their country to make every effort to protect those who live there and to create the conditions for a worthy and just future. If exercised with basic respect for the life, freedom and dignity of persons, political life can indeed become an outstanding form of charity.
- 3. Charity and human virtues: the basis of politics at the service of human rights and peace Pope Francis shared Pope Benedict XVI's note that "every Christian is called to practice charity in a manner corresponding to his vocation and according to the degree of influence he wields in the pólis... Man's earthly activity, when inspired and sustained by charity, contributes to the building of the universal city of God, which is the goal of the history of the human family". This is a program on which all politicians, whatever their culture or religion, can agree, if they wish to work together for the good of the human family and to practice those human virtues that sustain all sound political activity: justice, equality, mutual respect, sincerity, honesty, fidelity.
- 4. *Political vices* These vices detract from the credibility of political life overall, as well as the authority, decisions and actions of those engaged in it. These vices, which undermine the ideal of an authentic democracy, bring disgrace to public life and threaten social harmony.
- 5. Good politics promotes the participation of the young and trust in others When the exercise of political power aims only at protecting the interests of a few privileged individuals, the future is compromised and young people can be tempted to lose confidence...but when politics concretely fosters the talents of young people and their aspirations, peace grows in their outlook and on their faces. It becomes a confident assurance that says, "I trust you and with you I believe" that we can all work together for the common good.
- 6. No to war and to the strategy of fear Pope Francis brings us in a particular way to all those children currently living in areas of conflict, and to all those who work to protect their lives and defend their rights. One out of every six children in our world is affected by the violence of war or its effects, even when they are not enrolled as child soldiers or held hostage by armed groups. The witness given by those who work to defend them and their dignity is most precious for the future of humanity.
- 7. A great project of peace Finally, Pope Francis says that it entails a conversion of heart and soul; it is both interior and communal; and it has three inseparable aspects: <u>peace with oneself</u>, rejecting inflexibility, anger and impatience; in the words of Saint Francis de Sales, showing "a bit of sweetness towards oneself" in order to offer "a bit of sweetness to others"; <u>peace with others</u>: family members, friends, strangers, the poor and the suffering, being unafraid to encounter them and listen to what they have to say; <u>peace with all creation</u>, rediscovering the grandeur of God's gift and our individual and shared responsibility as inhabitants of this world, citizens and builders of the future.

Peacemakers

Pastor Martin Niemoeller

Born on January 14, 1892, Martin Niemoeller became a Lutheran pastor and persistently fought the Nazis in Germany with words alone. He strove for peace in the world and is famous for this quotation,

"When the Nazis came to get the Communists, I was silent because I was not a Communist. When they came to get the Socialists, I was silent. When they came to get the Catholics, I was silent. When they came to get the Jews, I was silent. And when they came to get me, there was no one left to speak."

Who will speak now? That is the question we ask whenever there is a conflict in the world, or whenever peace is threatened.

Niemoeller started out, not as a pacifist, but as a U-boat captain. He was proud of his military background, but after the First World War, followed his father into the Lutheran ministry. With Hitler's rise to power, he became uneasy about the hateful extremism of the Nazis. He helped organize a petition signed by 2300 pastors opposing Hitler's Aryan laws and ethnic "cleansing." He was arrested and somehow lived to tell of his time in Dachau concentration camp.

He berated himself for not speaking out more when he heard of all the Nazi atrocities. After the dropping of the atomic bomb, he became a pacifist and decided to live his life based on the life of Jesus. If there was a question about action, he would ask "What would Jesus do?" He continued to advocate for peace until his death at the age of 92. How do we act for peace? What does a peacemaker look like to you? What would Jesus do?


