

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Last weekend was the beginning of a new fiscal year in the administrative side of parish life. Submission of financial reports and budgets, transition of new assignments for priests, re-organization and vacations are just a few of the many things that keep us moving in the parish office.

Our experience of the pandemic caused by the influential Covid-19 symptom has affected all of us. Now that we are in the endemic stage, we are still coping with bringing back what we used to have prior to March 20, 2020, when we had to close our churches and parishes.

As we start a new fiscal year, a reorganization must be accomplished to maintain our sustainability as a parish and continue to serve our ministry to the people of God. I also would like to acknowledge the time, services, and dedication that two of our retired parishioners, Maryanne Oddo and Kathy Fanger has given in manning the parish office during the absence of a front office receptionist. A word of gratitude and appreciation as well is conveyed to Haidee Baluta, Joanne Halili, and Mayumi Bernardo in their devotedness and the services they provide.

New beginnings are an important part of our human existence. It allows us to look back and improve what needs to be worked on and at the same time it allows us to see and be grateful for the many blessings we have at times do not recognize in life. As we begin a new fiscal year, I am grateful to God for the commitment and faithfulness that so many of you have given to our parish and school community. I am unceasingly inspired by the many hours, services, and devotion that our volunteers continuously provide in the areas of liturgy, music, social, school and parish life.



"THE DOGMATIC PRINCIPLES WHICH WERE LAID DOWN BY THE COUNCIL OF TRENT REMAINING INTACT, COMMUNION UNDER BOTH KINDS MAY BE GRANTED WHEN THE BISHOPS THINK FIT, NOT ONLY TO CLERICS AND RELIGIOUS, BUT ALSO TO THE LAITY."



The distribution of Holy Communion under both kinds does not represent a change in the Church's immemorial beliefs concerning the Holy Eucharist. Today the Church finds it salutary to restore a practice, when appropriate, that for various reasons was not opportune. As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) says,

"Since the celebration of the Eucharist is the Paschal Banquet, it is desirable that in accordance with the Lord's command his Body and Blood should be received as spiritual food by those of the faithful who are properly disposed." (GIRM 80)

"Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified by the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father." (GIRM 281 / Eucharisticum Mysterium)

Wine highlights not only the celebratory nature of the Paschal Mystery but also the suffering and dying. The grapes are crushed, and the wine poured out just as Jesus was crushed by the weight of our sins and his Precious Blood poured out.

Jesus asked us to drink from the same cup he drank from - a cup of blessing as well as a cup of sacrifice.

The Church or "the Catholic faith teaches that Christ, whole and entire, and the true Sacrament, is received even under only one species are not deprived of any grace that is necessary for salvation." (GIRM 282 / Doctrina de Communione sub UtraqueSpecie et Parvulorum)

Christ's presence in the Eucharist challenges human understanding, logic, and ultimately reason. His presence cannot be known by the senses, but only through faith—a faith that is continually deepened through that communion which takes place between the Lord and his faithful in the very act of the celebration of the Eucharist. Fathers of the Church frequently warned the faithful that by relying solely on their senses they would see only bread and wine. Rather, they exhorted [us] the members of the Church to recall the word of Christ by whose power the bread and wine have been transformed into his own Body and Blood.




CATECHESIS ON THE REAL PRESENCE IN THE EUCHARIST

Why should we receive communion from the cup?

The clearest reason is because it is what Jesus asked us to do. "From the first days of the Church's celebration of the Eucharist, Holy Communion consisted of the reception of both species in fulfillment of the Lord's command to "take and eat... take and drink." The distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful under both kinds was thus the norm for more than a millennium of Catholic liturgical practice."

The practice of Holy Communion under both kinds at Mass continued until the late eleventh century, when the custom of distributing the Eucharist to the faithful under the form of bread alone began to grow. By the twelfth century theologians such as Peter Cantor speak of Communion under one kind as a "custom" of the Church. This practice spread until the Council of Constance in 1415 decreed that Holy Communion under the form of bread alone would be distributed to the faithful.

In 1963, the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council authorized the extension of the faculty for Holy Communion under both kinds in Sacrosanctum Concilium:

But do we individually seek ways to alleviate the burden of "the poor" in our lives, or do we only expect the institutional church and charities to shoulder that duty. In our every day lives, Jesus helps us carry our burdens so they are not too heavy. But Luke 12:48 reminds us, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded." Jesus helps and blesses us, so we in turn may bless others.

The 2023 Silicon Valley Pain Index was released last month, and as we acknowledge some of the harsh realities of our lowest-income brothers and sisters living among us and carrying burdensome loads, may we be stirred with compassion and find ways to help them.

- 9,903 Number of houseless people in Santa Clara County on a single night in January, 2023, a 1% drop from the year before; with about two-thirds living in encampments or other places not designed for habitation.
- 1,226 Number of houseless families (i.e., people with children) in Santa Clara County, up from 891 the previous year, with 20% unsheltered.
- 600 Number of families that become homeless each year in Santa Clara County.
- 246 Number of houseless people who died on the streets of Santa Clara County in 2022
- 460,000 Number of clients that Second Harvest of Silicon Valley provides groceries for each month on average, up 10,000 households from last year, and an increase of 80% since prepandemic.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." After living through a global pandemic and record-high inflation, people around the world know what it's like to carry a heavy burden of uncertainty, fear, sickness, and doubt.

The reality is that in our world, people who are poor and/or oppressed often carry the heaviest burdens. The Catholic phrase "preferential option for the poor" was first used by bishops in Latin America in the late 1960s who taught that throughout biblical texts, there is a demonstrable preference given to powerless individuals who live on the margins of society. In 1991, Pope John Paul II used the term, "option for the poor" when he wrote about the concept in his encyclical Centesimus Annus.

Pope Benedict XVI also agreed that the teaching on the option for the poor was a true Catholic obligation.

For him, the poor included all those on the peripheries of society, including widows and orphans, people with disabilities, the sick, prisoners, and victims of oppression, among others.

We have invented clever machines which should enable us to rest: washing machines, dishwashers, microwaves, cell phones, yet we are busier than ever: texting, messaging and now the latest: 'threading'.

"Seek ye FIRST the kingdom of God..."

The Father and the Son rest in each other's gaze. It is here, in the gentle gaze of our God that we find our tranquility for which we truly long. Jesus modeled his own longing for restful union with God when he went away early in the morning to pray.

Resting in YOUR Gaze

Each of us is called to offer this tranquility and receive it in how we gaze at each other. Do you *intentionally* gaze into the eyes of those you encounter and **listen** to them? When we receive the Eucharist, we become One with the Father, Son and Spirit.

We are sent out to be a blessing to others, bringing peace, love and healing light.
