End

- 1. Apprehension (intellect) apprehension of a particular good
- 2. WISH (will) attraction of the will to the apprehended good as an end
- 3. JUDGMENT (intellect) judgment that the end is possible
- 4. INTENTION (will) determination of the will to reach or achieve the end

Means

- 5. Deliberation (intellect) consideration of appropriate means to the end
- 6. Consent (will) approval of the possible means
- 7. DECISION (intellect) practical judgment of settling on the best means to the end
- 8. CHOICE (will) the means decided upon is chosen/embraced by the will

Execution

- 9. COMMAND (intellect) commanding the performance of the act (imperium)
- 10. USE (will) initiating the physical movement involved in the act
- 11. Perception of Fruition (intellect) judgment that the end is attained
- 12. Enjoyment (will) resting in the enjoyment or completion of the act
