I feel so blessed to be serving Saint Theresa of Lisieux and Most Precious Blood Parishes as we celebrate Easter together. What a *year* that we have all gone through!! Hasn't it felt like a *perennial* Lent?!!? And remember last Easter? Our churches were empty then – like the tomb. It is hard to believe that that was our reality. Thank goodness we are moving forward!

Our Lord's Resurrection is also a historical reality, but more

important it is the most significant sign we have that Jesus is who He had always said He is – God Himself, clothed in our human flesh. He was an apparent failure, condemned to death on false charges. He suffered the ridicule and the abuse heaped upon criminals, and He endured a shameful death by crucifixion, raised up on the Cross to which He was nailed between the criminals.

On the surface of things, Our Lord certainly looked like a fake and a failure, which was exactly how the religious leaders wanted to portray Him. He had preached and taught a lot of things they did not want to hear, and they succeeded in appealing to the lowest instincts of many people by killing Him. However, Our Lord's death on the Cross was the perfect Sacrifice. It brought us God's mercy and God's grace in this life and opens for us the way to eternal life.

Our Lord's death on the Cross, though, is not the end of the story. Jesus then rose from the dead so that we – though destined to die – shouldn't despair, worrying that with death life is completely finished. Our Lord's Resurrection doesn't simply signal a moment in history, but the beginning of a new reality!!

May God continue to heal you and your loved ones of the sorrows of this past year, and may this Easter bring you much joy, happiness and peace.
