

A MESSAGE FROM OUR RECTOR

Did you ever think about where the *Decalogue* (the Ten Commandments) is placed in the Book of Exodus? It comes <u>after</u> God delivered the Israelites from their bondage in Egypt. It is a set of values of how God's people are to act, but as an imitation of God: my / your behavior toward others must reflect God's comportment toward us. Most biblical tenets, in the Old and New Testaments alike, are geared to our response to what God has done in the past.

Keep in mind, however, that, in today's Gospel, one's 'enemy' in the Lucan context is not an axe-wielding murderer or a terrorist; no, it is one who is non-Jewish. One of the hallmarks of Saint Luke's Gospel is universalism, that is, everyone is called by God ... but it requires a response on the part of a person (of whatever status) for the relationship to grow. So, one must understand what Jesus is saying when he tells his followers to "love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." This is not about foregoing self-defense or protecting those in need.

The first reading from 1 Samuel focuses on the non-violent (and possibly passive aggressive) behavior of the future King David with respect to the current King Saul. Recall that King Saul wanted to kill the young David because he became intensely jealous of his growing popularity and military success, especially after David defeated Goliath, the Philistine, which made King Saul feel threatened and insecure about his own position as king; this jealousy was further fueled by a 'evil spirit' that tormented Saul (cf. 1 Samuel 16-18). King Saul commenced a 'search-and-destroy mission' against the young David. But how can King David be used as a teacher of non-violence when later he murders Uriah (the husband of Bathsheba) out of lust?

Twice – one of them in today's first reading – the young David shows this clearly. The first time is while David is hiding in a cave at Engedi. When King Saul enters that cave to relieve himself, David sneaks up behind him and cuts off the end of his mantle. Then David reveals himself to Saul, letting him know that he had refrained from taking advantage of his vulnerability, and the young David stated, "I ... did not kill you; ... see and be convinced that I plan no harm. ... I have done you no wrong, though you are hunting me down to take my life. The Lord will judge between me and you." (1 Samuel 24:11). A second time the young David has been pursued by King Saul into the Desert of Ziph. David and his friend Abishai are able to get beyond King Saul's guard while all were asleep, and Abishai steals Saul's spear and a cruse of water from his holster. Abishai wanted to kill Saul right then "with one trust of the spear," but the young David rejects the offer because he does not wish to harm the legitimate king who had been anointed by the Lord. Rather, outside the camp, he simply taunts all who were asleep, attempting to shame King Saul into having a change of heart.

What David did twice – as a sign of his magnanimity – Jesus expands into a pacificist way of life. Non-violence sits at the heart of Jesus' teaching. Both Saint Luke, in a much shorter version in today's Gospel, and Saint Matthew in the six *antitheses* (or, maybe better, *hypertheses*) in the Sermon on the Mount, expound upon Jesus' teaching. But Saint Luke gives love of enemies an even higher profile, and he places the mandates of enemy love and nonviolence immediately after the 'beatitudes and woes' of last week's Gospel. The young David deals with his enemy (King Saul) as a fellow human being under the judgment of God ("Today, though the Lord delivered you into my grasp, I would not harm the Lord's anointed"). And when Jesus proffers non-violence and a love of enemies, he shows it to be nothing less than an imitation of God. Recall, as a corollary, how Saint Matthew noted Christians must love their enemies because God makes the sun rise on the bad and the good, just like rain falls on the unjust and the just. The positive consequence is that we will be 'children of the Most High'. In other words, we must be as benevolent to all as God the Father is to us.

Following Jesus' command to love even our enemies, and consequent non-violence that stems from it, is not something we do simply by willing it. Rather, it springs from a covenantal relationship with God that bursts forth in our Christian communities and beyond. Saint Matthew saw love and non-violence as a means of 'perfection' ('be perfect as your Heavenly Father perfect'), but Saint Luke tempers it a bit ... for the good: 'be merciful as your Heavenly Father is merciful.' The Greek word found here is oiktirmos (>Gk oiktipuós: 'compassion, pity, mercy') and is used occasionally in the New Testament to refer to the mercy and compassion of God in Saint Paul's letters.

In the end, while Jesus has initiated forgiveness toward us, if we are to remain in that forgiveness, we must continue to show forgiveness to others.

Registering in the Basilica of Saint Edward

The law of the Church defines a parish as a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a [Diocese]. The pastoral care of the parish is entrusted to a pastor as its own shepherd under the authority of the diocesan bishop. The law of the Church also states that a parish is to be territorial and embraces all the Christian faithful within a certain territory [cc 515, 518]

The certain territory for the Basilica of Saint Edward established at its founding is the area of Palm Beach Island from the north end of the Island south to Sloan's Curve. To register as a parishioner of Saint Edward requires residence within its territory. Please contact the parish office to make an appointment to come in and register.

First Penance and First Eucharist Programs

Beginning in the First Grade, children of registered parishioners are to be enrolled in a two- year Parish Religious Education sacramental program. Registered parishioners whose children attend Catholic Grade Schools are to participate in the immediate sacramental preparation programs of the Parish. Please contact the parish office for more information.

Confirmation Program

Children of registered parishioners who are to be enrolled as candidates for the Sacrament of Confirmation must have been baptized, capable of renewing their Baptismal promises, and properly instructed by participation in the two-year parish program beginning in the seventh grade. The Sacrament of Confirmation is usually scheduled for September, when the candidate is a ninth grader.

Marriages at the Basilica of Saint Edward

The Basilica of Saint Edward reserves the celebration of the sacrament of marriage to registered parishioners who are practicing Catholics and their immediate family members. Registration requires residence within the territory of the parish [the North End of the Island south to Sloan's Curve.] New parishioners must be registered for one year before being considered for the scheduling of a marriage.

Saint Edward Marriage Regulations

All couples intending to marry at Saint Edward must meet with the pastor. No date is promised or scheduled before this initial meeting with the pastor, who is to assess the freedom to marry of the couple and explain other marriage regulations. Saint Edward Parish is not a destination site for marriage and Saint Edward does not rent the Church to non-parishioners for marriage ceremonies.

Anointing of the Sick

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick can be administered to the sick after the age of reason when the person begins to be in danger due to sickness or age. It is preferred that the sacrament be administered when the person is in control of their faculties. Please contact the parish in emergencies. After hours leave a message as directed by the parish voicemail.
