

PASTOR'S COLUMN

In New England church circles, it is sometimes called a "Pastor's Nightmare." The nightmare comes when weather reports keep you guessing about weekend predictions of record-breaking snowfalls and icy conditions. As you can imagine, I have experienced a couple of those nightmares over recent weekends.

Given that I am heading South for the next two weekends, I do not anticipate another 'nightmare' coming my way too soon – at least I hope not! As you read this column, I am making my annual retreat at the Bethany Retreat Center in the Diocese of St. Petersburg, Florida. The last time I was on retreat at this center was a month before the Covid virus took hold of our nation and the world.

The retreat is being directed by Father Thomas Stegman, SJ., a well-known New Testament scholar and Dean of the Boston College School of Theology & Ministry. There are 50 other priests from the Boston Archdiocese joining me on this retreat. I ask your prayers for us as we take time away from our parish duties to be with the Lord and enjoy a bit of fraternity with each other. In turn, know that you and your intentions will hold a place in our Masses and prayers as well – and I promise to do my best to bring back some warmer weather!

Before leaving to go on retreat, it was a pleasure for me to inform almost 60 people from the Parishes of Holy Family and St. Irene's that their names were submitted for selection to the Pastoral Council for the Concord-Carlisle Collaborative. These parishioners have been invited to a session at which they will receive information about the purpose of the Pastoral Council and the duties of a council member. In time, each person will decide whether to keep his or her name in consideration. Regardless of their individual decisions, all those whose names were submitted will be asked to help in selecting those to serve on the council.

Please continue to pray for this discernment and selection process. Given the talent, expertise, and good will of those whose names were submitted, I am confident the Holy Spirit will guide us in the formation of the council.



Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jer 17:5-8 | 1 Cor 15:12, 16-20 | Lk 6:17, 20-26

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Luke's account of the Beatitudes pulls no punches. Blessed are you ... who are poor, hungry, weeping, when people hate you. These admonitions bear little resemblance to the pursuit of happiness as most of us know it: Striving for wealth (or at least stability), enjoying a good meal, sharing a laugh with friends, and being well-liked. These are things of this world, and Jesus tells us that pursuing them alone will not make us truly happy. I don't think that means we need to wear sack cloth and ashes, or refuse to enjoy the great gifts with which God has endowed his Creation. However, Jesus' words remind us that we won't find lasting happiness even in the finest meal or the most lavish vacation, but rather in placing our lives in God's hands. For the desire for happiness "is of divine origin: God has placed it in the human heart in order to draw us to the One who alone can fulfill it." (CCC 1718)

GO **EVANGELIZE** PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It's a little ironic that I am writing a reflection entitled "GROW" and GO." Few plants have survived my black thumb. That's why I love the image of the tree in the reading from Jeremiah. One who trusts in the Lord "is like a tree planted beside" the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream; it fears not the heat when it comes; its leaves stay green; in the year of drought it shows no distress, but still bears fruit." These words from Jeremiah are a prophecy of hope, and hope allows us to accompany one another through the hills and valleys (and occasional dead plants) of our lives. We can become a source of hope to others by praying for and with one another and encouraging them on their own journeys of faith. In doing so, we help one another tap into the ultimate source of hope - the God who loves us.

STUDY Read the Beatitudes and the Sermon on the Mount and reflect on how Jesus' teachings draw us ever more to himself and highlight our baptismal vocation: holiness. What one thing can you bring to prayer and the sacrament of reconciliation this week to purify your heart?

We can assist in that mission now by trusting, hoping, and looking to God for our cues for how to live, set goals for ourselves and discern the best way to share this world with our brothers and sisters.

RESPECT LIFE

MOLST VIRTUAL WORKSHOP

The Respect Life Ministry will host a virtual workshop, "Understanding Medical Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (MOLST)" on Tuesday, March 1 from 7:00-8:15pm. Parishioners in the Concord-Carlisle Catholic Collaborative are invited to participate.

Patricia Stewart, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Citizens for Life, will provide an explanation about the Medical Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (MOLST) forms and how to avoid traps and unintended outcomes. These forms impact how long a patient may live and how patient mav die. Understanding consequences of the choices available is musthave information for patients and caregivers seeking to make informed healthcare decisions for themselves or someone else. Please join us as we learn more about this timely topic. Time will be available for answering questions at the end of the presentation.
