

Collaborative News

PASTOR'S COLUMN

A couple of months ago, Father Nick and I provided reflections on the parts of the Mass. We appreciated the comments received from a number of parishioners about our presentations and the opportunity to clarify the significance of what, why, and how we celebrate the Mass – the central liturgical service of our Catholic faith.

Our presentations stressed the important role of the congregation in the celebration of Mass by promoting the active participation of all by means of acclamations, responses, and songs — as well as by actions, gestures, and bodily attitudes. Several questions surfaced from our presentations concerning the appropriate times for kneeling at Mass, in particular, during the Communion Rite.


Kneeling is the ultimate posture of submission and surrender. In the Catholic Church we genuflect and kneel to indicate – by bodily attitude – total submission of our minds and hearts to the true Presence of Christ. It is an exterior manifestation of the reverence inspired by His Presence, especially in the Holy Eucharist. Being a posture of adoration, kneeling has been part of the Communion Rite for many centuries. By kneeling after the Lamb of God is sung or recited, the congregation prepares for the moment in which the priest presents to them the Sacrificed Lamb as he proclaims, "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world...".

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "The faithful kneel after the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) unless the Diocesan Bishop has determined otherwise." (GIRM 43) As is the case in most dioceses in our country, our Bishop (Cardinal O'Malley) has not determined otherwise. Thus, the expected posture following the conclusion of the Lamb of God is that the faithful kneel.

At the moment the priest is about to hold up before the congregation our Blessed Lord in the Holy Eucharist and proclaim, "Behold the Lamb of God," it seems most fitting we be on our knees before the Lord for such a proclamation of faith. In the Book of Revelation, when the Lamb of God (Christ) is presented before the throng of heaven, all fall down in worship before him. The Mass is a participation in this heavenly liturgy.


Memorial Masses may be scheduled up to 30 days in advance of the desired date. To do so, contact our parish offices on weekdays from 10 am - 3 pm.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Sometimes I feel like I need a Jonah in my life: someone who will come along and shake things up; someone who will nudge me and say, hey, you're doing it wrong! No one wants to be criticized, but I know I need loving guidance to help me when I am not at my best. It's easy to get caught up in the swirl of life and neglect (even if unintentionally) what's important. Jonah was given the unpleasant task of pointing out to the people of Nineveh their failings. Unlike many communities who resisted God's words, by the end of the first day of Jonah's anticipated three-day trek across the city, "the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast and all of them, great and small, put on sackcloth." For all the evil they had done, and the rebellion they had demonstrated, the people there weren't irredeemable. They simply needed Jonah to point out how they had gone astray, and the grace of open ears and hearts to receive the message. Who has the Lord placed in our lives in the role of Jonah? How has he blessed us with the ability to receive, and repent where necessary?

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We don't seem to have obvious prophets like Jonah nowadays, but that doesn't mean God has left us without guides. We have the Church, Christ's body on earth, and the ever-present help of the Holy Spirit. In today's Gospel, we hear how Jesus selected his first followers: men who would become the Twelve Apostles, anointed to spread his word and speak in his stead even after Jesus left the earth. We know that there were other followers: men, women and children who became his disciples; Jews and Gentiles who were bap tized. We are part of that apostolic tradition, each one of us baptized into the common priesthood "exercised by the unfolding of baptismal grace – a life of faith, hope, and charity, a life according to the Spirit." (CCC 1547) The call to holiness can be hard to hear in the din of today's busy and secular world, but it is not impossible. We can pray for the grace to hear how God is asking each of us to live out his commands and proclaim the Good News to the world.

PRAY Today's psalm (Ps 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9) is a wonderful way to ask God for this favor. Make it part of your morning or evening prayer for the next week. "Your ways, O Lord, make known to me; teach me your paths."
