Our parish stakeholder group held its first meeting last night to prepare for our meeting with the Archdiocese on Monday. Several of our stakeholders are discerning whether they have the time to join in this important process. Once all have shared their intentions we will reveal all the names and provide opportunity for contact.

Remember to mark May 10th on your calendar. At 6PM that day our entire community will have an opportunity to meet with Bishop Daniel Mueggenborg to discuss details of the merger.

Also, and this is very important, the Archdiocese is expecting the merger process to last 14months. We're in this discussion for the long haul. St. Patrick will continue to function as a parish and have weekly Masses until at least July 1, 2022.

Please hold our stakeholder team in your prayers as they are representing our community's interests with the Archdiocese. And may God bless their efforts.

Celebrating the Season of Easter

After 40 days of simplicity and austerity during Lent, we're now in the midst of a 50-day season of rejoicing and celebration. It's hard to keep a party going for 50 days, but the Church does. Here are some things we do at st. Patrick's, to keep the party going:

Alleluia, **alleluia**: Probably the one thing you'll notice is lots and lots of alleluias. After 40 days of not uttering the word, we sing it and shout it nonstop. It's a Hebrew word that means "Praise to the Lord!

Sacraments, sacraments: Yes, we celebrate the Eucharist every Sunday. However, as sacraments are celebrations of God's love and

mercy and friendship, we try to celebrate as many of them during the Easter Season as possible. Baptisms are among the most popular Easter Season sacraments.

Care for Creation: More Ideas to Kick Our Plastic Addiction

Two years ago Paul and I gave up plastic for Lent! What we thought impossible turned out to be a fun problem-solving journey. Most of the things we did have stuck! Here are some things we discovered: **We could STOP using plastic wrap!** Instead use beeswax food wrap for keeping already cut fruits and veggies. Keep leftovers in glass pyrex containers with click lids. Instead of plastic wrap on bowls use an appropriately sized plate or reusable lids that look like shower caps or new stretchable ones. We use old Rubbermaid containers in multiple sizes for sandwiches, cut fruit/veggies, left overs. However, do NOT use these containers in the microwave. **We could STOP using plastic dog poop bags!** Instead, order bags made out of cornstarch from **Sir Waggington's**. They are large, strong and hold up when gathering multiple poops from the yard. More next time on using fewer plastic bags!

World Day of Prayer for Vocations

The purpose of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations (celebrated in parishes on April 24th & 25th) is to publicly fulfill the Lord's instruction to, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into his harvest" (Mt 9:38; Lk 10:2).



As a climax to a prayer that is continually offered throughout the Church, it affirms the primacy of faith and grace in all that concerns vocations to the priesthood and to the consecrated life. While appreciating all vocations, the Church concentrates its attention this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate), to the Religious life in all its forms (male and female, contemplative and apostolic), to societies of apostolic life, to secular institutes in their diversity of services and membership, and to the missionary life, in the particular sense of mission "ad gentes".

God our Father, You call each of us to use our gifts in the Body of Christ. Inspire your people with desire to know you, the grace to understand your will, and, with the strength of the Holy Spirit, the courage to respond with love and freedom. Send workers into Your great harvest so that the Gospel is preached, the poor are served with love, the suffering are comforted, and Your people are strengthened by the sacraments. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The film's title is rooted in the ancient Native American saying, "When the Eagle of the North and the Condor of the South fly together, Indigenous peoples will unite the human family." It follows different Native American environmental activists on their journeys of connecting with other tribes and world leaders, all in an effort to preserve the environment and their homes from damaging oil companies. It has won many awards and has enthusiastic reviews, but I'll just quote one of our own parishioners, Nancy Miller: "I watched the Condor and the Eagle tonight and it is an incredibly powerful movie of what we are doing to indigenous people and the land on which they live, from Canada to Ecuador."

This is another documentary that we must pay (\$99) to access, so we again request \$5 donations from those who are comfortable paying for this documentary.
