And we each need to become advocates so this change becomes a reality. This is what Jesus would want us to do. Can I hear an Amen?

#### **Important Parish Update**

Since the Archdiocese delivered the news on April 11 of the future closing of our parish, we know there has been much grief, anger, sadness, despair, and a sense of loss. There have also been many questions and desires for answers and accountability. We share these same emotions, desires, and questions with you. On April 19, a



group of representatives and advocates of St. Pat's met with Archdiocesan staff and Bishop Mueggenborg to open the door to heart-felt and challenging dialogue that provides our community with a voice and an opportunity to be heard. Future meetings are being developed and the St. Pat's advocates have been proactive in compiling questions and seeking transparency in this process. This Sunday, April 25, immediately after Mass, you will hear from our representatives about the action steps that have been taken thus far, the questions that have been submitted to the Archdiocese and how and why these were selected, and how we are working to further engage our community in the struggle to create and envision the future we as a community want. We are submitting a timeline to the Archdiocese for the most urgent and pressing questions to be answered. Once we have more answers, we will be engaging the entire parish in a listening session to help further guide our next steps. Our strength in the community remains our greatest gift and together we move forward.

#### Wednesday Movie Night

We have a special presentation for the next St Pat's Movie Night: a lecture by Dr. Robin Wall Kimmerer the author of the best-selling and universally acclaimed book "Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants." This was an event, (April



21) in the Seattle Arts & Lectures series: "Women You Need to Know" (WYNK). The lecture was followed by a conversation with Dr. Christina Roberts, who is an Associate Professor of English at Seattle University and the inaugural director of the Indigenous Peoples Institute (IPI).

I'll provide just one line from one of the many glowing reviews of Dr. Kimmerer's book: "Robin Wall Kimmerer has written an extraordinary book, showing how the factual, objective approach of science can be enriched by the ancient knowledge of the indigenous people. It is the way she captures beauty that I love the most—the images of giant cedars and wild strawberries, a forest in the rain and a meadow of fragrant sweetgrass will stay with you long after you read the last page."—Jane Goodall
