The Feast of the Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary

This year, August 15th, the Feast of the Assumption, lands on a Sunday. The Bible doesn't mention the last years of Mary's life, and we last hear about her being in the Upper Room on the day of Pentecost. Since the , Christian tradition speaks of her falling asleep and being assumed (taken bodily) into heaven. In 1950, Pope Piux XII officially defined the dogma of the Assumption. World War II had just ended. The

war and the Holocaust had broken the human spirit. The pope delivered the good news of Mary's Assumption.

The dogma expresses our Catholic belief that Mary was taken body and soul into heaven at the end of her days. We believe that the Risen Christ has opened heaven to all believers. Christ promises the same bright future for those who are faithful to the gospel. As Father Bryan likes to remind us, "solemnities are about God and about Mary, but they invite us to participate and identify with God and Mary at the most intimate level."
