One of my favorite stories from our time at Christ Our Hope and St. Patrick was an incident that happened early in our tenure. At a Sunday morning Mass in the fall of 2019, we had a guy experiencing homelessness sitting quietly in the back of Christ Our Hope Church during Mass. At one point, he walked over to the baptismal font, put his face in the water, slurped up a mouthful, and walked right up to the altar where Fr. Bryan was halfway through the Eucharistic Prayer. He puckered his mouth to spit the water at a shocked Fr. Bryan when I quietly said, "Hey brother, let's not do that." Instead, he spit the water at me then went back to his seat for the remainder of Mass. The part I love is that no one in our Church flinched or was shocked or jumped up to rush the guy out of the Church. I had my dousing and then we moved on. This is what the Letter of St. James is all about this week. This is how we live out our motto: All Are Welcome!

Important Parish Update

Greetings from your St. Pat's Advocates who are charged with guiding our faith community through the process of transition mandated by the Archdiocese. We appreciate your patience as we are gathering information and having many discussions. As most of you know, Deacon Dennis met with Archbishop Etienne pleading our case to keep St. Pat's



parish viable. The Archbishop denied our request to remain open past June 2022, but did allow that more time would be given for transition to either merge with Sacred Heart or St. Joseph parish. We still have not heard how long that extension will be and Deacon Dennis will ask the Archbishop for a clearer timeline for how much longer we can remain paired with Christ Our Hope before a merger begins.

In the meantime, the Advocates have been busy researching possibilities available to us. One option is to see how our parish might use legal recourse to remain open and four of the Advocates met with a Canon Law expert to hear about this possibility.

Here is what we learned:

1) The timeline for fighting this Archdiocesan decision could take 4-5 years and cost anywhere from \$50,000-\$100,000

2) If the community wishes to go down this road, we would need to have 4-5 parishioners named as appellants who would be willing to go the distance

3) The likelihood of success seems somewhat slim based on other cases this expert has handled

After meeting with the Canon law expert, the Advocates met as a whole and discussed this option thoroughly. None of the Advocates felt this was an option we wanted our parish to pursue. However, we certainly want to hear from our parish family how you are feeling about our future going forward.

At this time the Advocates are crafting a survey to get your feedback on options that we face and where you are most inclined to have us place our energy. We want to see where you stand on merging with Sacred Heart at Seattle Center, merging with St. Joseph, taking legal action, forming our own community outside of the Catholic Church, or what other options you see as possible. We hope to get this survey to you by next week.

We know this remains a tender time for our community and we, as your Advocates, remain committed to doing our very best to help you, our sisters and brothers in Christ, through this uncharted territory into our future. We will be listening to you and the Holy Spirit as we chart a way forward and ask for your continued prayers.

Care For Creation hike coming soon

Join St. Patrick community members on Labor Day, September 6th for a day hike through maple, cedar, hemlock, and Douglas-fir on the well-maintained Margaret's Way trail near Issaquah. Pit toilet at the trailhead, no other amenities or water. A busy out and back trail, our goal is to hike for ~1.5 hours outward up a gentle slope (possibly to a viewpoint), have lunch, and return to the trailhead.



Mindful of our carbon footprint, hikers have the option to use Metro's Trailhead Direct Service (every 30 minutes). From Mount Baker transit center, we aim to catch the bus departing at 8:44 AM, arrive at Margaret's Way Trailhead at 9:12 AM. We'll aim for a return trip departing from the trailhead at 2:12 PM, arriving back at Mount Baker station at 3:22 PM. Adult bus fare: \$2.75 each way. Options: a) Get to Mount Baker transit center on your own by 8:34 AM (light rail, bus, other); b) Meet at Elaine Clark's home by 7:55 AM to catch #48 bus to transit center; c) Meet at Margaret's Way trailhead by 9:15 AM.

Bring in your backpack: Mask (required on the bus), Water (a quart or more); Close-toed shoes or hiking boots, Hiking poles (optional); Ready to eat lunch and snacks, Rain gear, layered clothing, First aid items, Sun protection, Container for your trash.
