"Take up your cross"

Dear Sisters and Brothers In Christ,

This week we celebrate the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, tracing its beginning to Jerusalem and the dedication of the church built on the site of Mount Calvary in 335. But the meaning of the cross goes deeper than this. The cross is a sign of suffering, a sign of human cruelty and violence at its worst. But by Christ's love, as it is shown to us in the Paschal Mystery, the cross is transformed and becomes a sign of love and forgiveness, the very sign of salvation and God's

never-ending love for us.

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus tries once again to explain his own journey to the cross to his disciples. And once again, they don't seem to get it. Jesus knew the cross was in His future. Later on, he also told His disciples that to be His follower, they needed to "take up their cross." What did Jesus mean when he said to "take up your cross?" But what does this mean for us as followers of Jesus in today's world? What is our cross that we must take up to be disciples of the living Christ?

Any struggle to stay true to God, true to love, true to the commandments, true to our faith, true to our calling as Christians is how we carry the cross today. And because each of our lives and challenges is unique, the cross is specific for each one of us. For some, it can be bearing with a troubled family; for others, it is coping in faith and trust through an illness or injury, or the loss of a loved one. No two crosses are alike. And when we embrace it in faith, it is transformed. What seemed on the surface to be a type of death becomes the means through which God gives us life.

Still, bearing the cross with faith and love is the greatest challenge for Christians. When our crosses come, sometimes people will ask "Did I do something to cause this?" " Am I being punished?" "Does God love me?" "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" A person may be thrown into a crisis of faith. But God doesn't send the suffering and tragedy our way.

With each cross that comes our way, we can look at it as an opportunity to renew and grow our prayer life, and our spiritual relationship with God. This week, let us reflect on and ask what is God wanting me to learn from this experience? What is God wanting me to do — right now — as a result of this cross? What is God wanting me to share with others based upon what I am experiencing? Where is God pulling me closer? "

Invisible Hand (2020) (https://www.invisiblehandfilm.com/)

Invisible Hand is the world's first documentary film on the *Rights of Nature Movement*. Executive Producer, Mark Ruffalo, states "You hear time and time again that a corporation has the rights of a person. The idea that Nature has no rights whatsoever is absurd." This "paradigm-shifting" story raises questions about the fate of capitalism and democracy and asks us all to consider the perspective of "Who speaks for Nature?" *Invisible Hand* documents front-line communities that are providing a blueprint forward.

In the fall of 2014, for the first time in United States history, an ecosystem filed to defend itself in a lawsuit claiming its 'right to exist" in Grant Township, Pennsylvania. For attempting such a radical act, Grant's rural community of 700 people were sued by a corporation, then by the state government, and are now locked in a battle to defend the watershed they call home through civil disobedience. The water they drink, the Rights to Nature laws they've passed are all on the line in this exclusive story. Half a continent away in Standing Rock, North Dakota, the same industry threatening Grant Twp. is using militarized force against indigenous tribes and allies fighting to protect Mother Earth. The two, Grant Township and Standing Rock, are joined in an international fight to protect more than just water. They fight for their community, democracy, and for Nature as a living entity unto itself.
