Adult Faith Formation

During this time, as the crucial need to stay connected arose and evolved, we welcomed new ways of forming the faith of our parishioners.

The Faith Formation ministries at St. Pat's are oriented to assist parishioners in building an intimate relationship with Christ, through offering lifelong faith formation and sacramental preparation. The ministry is to offer parishioners the means to deepen their understanding and practice of our faith, regardless of where they are on their journey with God and with the Church. With the Church Fiscal Year starting in July 2020, we hoped that things would soon return to "normal." Unfortunately, this was not the case. The continuation of the pandemic and quarantine led to a turn to ministry via the internet. Retreats, prayer groups, and faith sharing gatherings moved online with the collaboration with Christ Our Hope.



One way that we aided parishioners' faith journey at home was to offer a Bible Study entitled Studying the Word of God based on each Sunday's readings led by Dr. David Ard. A few of our participants have shared the following after reflecting on their experience:

"During Bible Study I always learn something new about the history, or the context of the passage, or about the life of the Gospel writer. On Sunday as I listen to the readings we just studied I feel as if I'm hearing from an old friend." - Susie Roe

"Without Knowledge of CHRIST's Teachings How will we as Christians Grow? Without the Bible and Instruction, How will we Know? But where two or three are Gathered, CHRIST is Always there, and We each Grow in His WISDOM, As we Study and we Share!" - Jani Kelly





Also, each week, women from St. Pat's and COH met to reflect and share about their lives based on the faith of our Church. One woman, reflecting on what has been the most life-giving thing about her experience in 'Encountering God' wrote that it is:

"the sharing of each person's stories, sad or uplifting, shared laughter, sorrow and also sharing resources; sometimes those stories were every-day issues, and sometimes they were much deeper. I feel that it fostered a deeper relationship between the women." - Rosemary Ryan

Our faith formation also continued with learning more about our faith and its intersection with race and privilege. In September, we did a shared study with COH on the US Bishops race document "Open Wide Our Hearts" and during Lent, over 70 parishioners journeyed together to learn more about racism during our Lenten Journey for Racial Justice series.

Liturgical Movement Ministry

Movement Ministry at St. Pat's has had a busy and unusual year! In the fall of 2020, our little troupe gathered outdoors on the steps of St. Pat's to film **Walk Together Children** with a guest artist (African American dancer friend from Seattle's FAME community.) We are all learning to walk together in new ways! 2020's **Advent Lessons and Carols Service** was online with Christ Our Hope and featured a story dance by Betsey Beckman interpreting Denise Levertov's beautiful poem – *The Annunciation*. Christmas Eve Mass included a pre-recorded heartfelt **Candle Dance** to **Silent Night** with kids & youth, and also a Zoom-filmed interpretation of the Christmas Gospel with shepherds and angels galore!

The Lenten season brought another beautiful zoom Service with the whole community gesturing Song of Brigid (by Laura Ash.) Also, for the 5th Sunday of Lent, the choir and youth from far and wide interpreted Christ in Me Arise. We continued our tradition of Palm Sunday CLOW, once again online with the youth enacting each scene of the Passion Story. Triduum saw Betsey "live" in church embodying the Good Friday psalm - Abba, Abba. Easter Vigil Prelude was celebrated by many St. Pat's folks who prayed with a video retrospective of our unique movement proclamations through the years. Easter Sunday Betsey was back at church embodying the psalm - This is the Day. After communion we offered a mixed media presentation of "live" folks joining with a video of at-home parishioners (including L'Arche and Deaf-Blind participants) all signing Roll Away the Stone together! We concluded Easter Sunday with the youth participating with kites in our festive recessional - Behold the Glory of God.

By Pentecost, we were all feeling safe enough to gather in church to share our joyous multi-generational enactment of the **Pentecost Story!** We also included a video of **Shine On Us** (by Mike Lynch) recorded by the choir and gestured by over 50 community members. The Spirit was shining on us and through us!

Now that the fall has begun again, we have celebrated the Feast of St. Francis with our big & little kids dancing our favorite **All God's Critters** as a recessional. Also, Lorraine Bayes and Betsey offered a communion meditation blessing to a setting of the Diné/Navajo Prayer – **In Beauty We Walk** (with choir recording at home). May the Spirit continue to dance through us!

Communication / Technology / Livestream



St. Patrick's former website had been in place for many years and the older site made it difficult for staff and volunteers to keep the content updated. With the COVID-19 pandemic lock down, the need for effective communication was heightened as people were isolated in their homes, unable to come to mass in person and needed other ways of connecting with the community. Since Christ Our Hope's website was already hosted on eCatholic, with more modern and intuitive website tools, Deacon Dennis wanted us to standardize on that platform.

After getting the go ahead in the fall of 2020, we worked to learn the new platform and create a design that would be intuitive, easy to navigate and represent the many facets of St. Patrick's. We have pages for all the ministries, sign up forms, an events calendar, and links to online giving and the connection board, where parishioners can hold online discussions on certain central topics of interest. Most importantly, people can find St. Patrick's, sign up for in-person mass or watch online and continue our community together. We hope to create a team where we can share the upkeep of the website, connection board and the livestream mass duties in the future.

The Livestream team got its start about a year and a half ago when the COVID-19 pandemic bore down on Seattle and the

rest of the country. Thrust into lockdown, no one was allowed to attend mass in person anymore. The solution that was found was to bring mass to those that were homebound. Nick Marson from Christ Our Hope helped us get a team off the ground and streaming, and ever since we have been putting mass up on Facebook Live and our website so that people can view mass from the safety of their homes. At the start of the pandemic, we had 100 households watching mass consistently every week. As restrictions have loosened, more and more people have come back in person, however we still have a consistent group of people that watch online every week. Amazingly, people from France and Ireland are even able to see our service! After sharing equipment for multiple months, we were able to purchase our own hardware and now have 3 cameras operating each Sunday to capture ASL interpretation and smoothly transition between parts of the mass. We have been able to incorporate videos and slideshows provided by other ministries and have broadcast weddings and funerals for friends and family who cannot attend.

Sister Parish Workgroup

The Sister Parish Work Group of the Social Justice Committee continued to foster our solidarity with the community of Nueva Trinidad, El Salvador in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic. This included financial support of our two major initiatives: social programs and food distribution to elderly members of the community; and support for the community center. This year, we also committed support for internet in the



community center for three more years. Additional funds were sent to support the community's Covid response. We celebrated our solidarity at Christmas when our brothers and sisters shared pictures of themselves with candles, which were set to music. Activities undertaken by St. Pat's parishioners included advocating for former Nueva Trinidad pastor Padre Miguel, who was threatened for standing up for free and fair elections in El Salvador in February. In March we commemorated the life and assassination of Saint Oscar Romero with a Sunday liturgy featuring Spanish songs and a reflection by long-time Sister Parish member Kate Speltz. We held fundraisers including Women's Night In and a Lenten Tree of Hope by which St. Pat's parishioners offered financial and prayer support, and messages of solidarity to our sister parish. For 2021-22, we plan on continuing to support Nueva Trinidad through social/community-building fundraisers.

Sacramental Prep

In our Christian tradition, when we speak of the word liturgy, it is understood to mean the People of God participating in "the work of God." Through the liturgy, Christ continues the work of our redemption in, with, and through his Church.

From the tables of Word and Sacrament, our parish is fed, strengthened and transformed to accompany our brothers and sisters, especially the poor and vulnerable. While Sunday has remained the primary day for the community to gather, our normal course of sacramental celebrations including infant Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmation, Reconciliation, adult initiation through the parish's robust RCIA process, funerals and even weddings were adapted to respect Covid regulations. And as such, they can only happen when people are prepared for the sacraments through our Sacramental Preparation program. To serve the needs of our parishioners, the parish offers a full array of opportunities for preparation and reception of the church's



sacraments. This year, we offered RCIA adapted for Children, RCIA for adults, Spanish RCIA, and RCIA for Reception into Full Communion with the Church.

The driving force of our parish Sacramental Preparation Program is the belief that our faith is a gift to be celebrated, nurtured, and lived. We are taught early in life that God, above all things, is love, and His love is perfect and unconditional. We believe learning about God is sharing His love and treating our faith as the sacred gift it is.

St. Vincent de Paul

We had 90 requests for help this year. There were 20 people who asked for help more than once and a couple more than twice. We helped only 4 families, and there were some folks that we did not help.

Most of our money went toward rent: \$11,800. \$1500 went to utilities including phones. \$1030 went toward furniture and clothing. There was \$740 for food and hygiene items; \$240 for ORCA cards and \$340 for storage lockers for homeless folks. In addition, we sent \$4500 to the needy Conference Fund. The main office gives money to conferences, mainly in the South end. Some of the parishes there get 25 or more calls a month so the funds we share allow them to fill needs.

Note about the folks we did not help. We receive requests and then try to reach the folks. The phone numbers or email addresses are wrong or no one responds. Then there are the requests that are way beyond our ability to help. We had one for \$6000 in back rent. We were able to refer that request back to the main office and the person was entered into one of the major city aid programs. He was awarded enough to cover his past due rent.

Sacred Encounters

On Wednesday of Holy Week, we launched our new Sacred Encounters ministry. This group of volunteers meets each Wednesday to walk the streets around downtown Seattle, building relationships with our un-housed sisters and brothers, and providing much-needed survival items to those in need.

St. Patrick and Christ Our Hope parishioners have pulled together to make sure that each week this year as we greet our friends on the street we've had at least 50 fresh PBJ to hand everyone who wanted one. We also collect needed "survival" items for this effort thanks to our generous parishioners.

Sacred Encounters allows our paired parish community to better be a part of what Pope Francis calls a Culture of Encounter with those suffering on the peripheries. The smiles brought to the faces of our friends are the presence of Jesus himself among us.

Stewardship and Evangelization

Stewardship and Evangelization continue to be one of the cornerstones of St. Patrick parish identity. Parishioners serve our church and local community through the sharing of their many gifts. These dedicated and committed parishioners, giving freely of their time, talent, and treasure without expecting return, create an atmosphere that invites and encourages others to become involved and sets a positive example for the entire parish community. Youth Faith Formation

The youth group spent this COVID year continuing to grow, pray and laugh together. We were unable to meet in person weekly, but we did gather over Zoom for Sunday evening formation. We chose to learn about and discuss topics that are a part of our lives and seeing how our Catholicism impacts those issues. This provided youth with the opportunities to discuss topics while continuing to gather. A highlight was the month of February where we focused on Life and Dignity of the Human Person and had parishioners share life topics as guest speakers. Throughout the year we gathered outside monthly for either a social service activity like creating the care packages to hand out to those in need. We also gathered for a hike, a bike ride and ended the year with a beach BBQ. Lastly, we had the honor to have a few of our youth families go to Whatcom County to work with the Service Program: Agape. We spent the 3 days in service to migrant worker families. Throughout the year these gatherings were opportunities for our youth community to come together as members of St. Patrick Parish, allowing our young people to appreciate how their service and sacrifice helped families in need and to build relationships in encounters on the peripheries. What a blessing to help share these lessons.

Growth and Sustainability

The Growth and Sustainability Committee has had an active year, making connections with local neighborhoods and parishes. The year began with an outreach to our zip code to support our youth group's collection of gloves, hats and socks. The group continues to promote St. Pats via online 98102 neighborhood forums and Nextdoor, highlighting our labyrinth and providing information about our work and needs for St. Vincent de Paul, as well as reaching out to other areas such as the Portage Bay/Roanoke Park/Montlake to support the St. Pats and Christ Our Hope initiatives in reaching out to people experiencing homelessness by making and distributing sandwiches and purchasing items for survival kits.

In 2020 we introduced the idea of connecting St. Pats with Seattle Prep, which resulted in Prep using Paddy's Place for AP testing and Covid vaccinations in May of 2021 and parking during this school year. Also in May, we continued our relationship with Seattle Gay News by negotiating advertising and opinion articles.

Two very important events have occurred over the summer. First, in July St. Pats joined the parishes of St. James and St. Joe's and signed a letter from 14 US Bishops and many Catholic orders supporting the Tyler Clementi Foundation protecting LGBTQ+ youth from harassment, bullying and suicide. And in August, the committee joined with neighbors to put welcome kits together from refugee families from Afghanistan.

We look forward to continuing to work with our local neighborhoods, and are connecting with the University Food Bank to have a food donation barrel placed at St. Pats.

Deaf / Deaf-Blind / ASL Ministry

In the early 1980's when the Parish Council was considering providing interpreting for the Deaf community it was made clear that if interpreting was to be provided it must be available in every church activity and that every event must be accessible to Deaf members from birth to death. Through the years, Deaf members have been on the Parish Council, served on parish committees, have attended retreats, have participated in Faith Formation classes, and have participated in the RCIA program for baptism and confirmation. It wasn't long after we began this ministry that we had members from the Deaf/Blind community join us. This past year, the ASL team returned to its normal scheduling of interpreters for the deaf and deaf-blind as our community returned to in-person Mass. Our dedicated team still offers a rotating group to ensure we have signing on all virtual Masses, but our tactile team has been allowed to return with the lifting of some of the Governor's mandates. What a blessing to have our community reunited once again.
