


As I reflect on the humble beginnings of our church and all the sacrifices, work, and heart that have contributed over that time to our identity and history, I am grateful to all our ancestors who came before us, as well as to you, who have shaped the parish into what it is today. The parish has seen many changes, but it continues to be a beacon of hope, just as it was 175 years ago. This is an iconic church that was formed long before the creation of the Diocese of Green Bay.

Now it is our turn to continue the legacy the families that came before us founded and developed. We owe it to them, as well as to those who will live here after us to pass this beautiful church to the next generation of people seeking the love of Christ.

Both the church and rectory roofs are in great need of replacement. The last time this was done was in the mid 1980's. The current cost of this project will be around \$250,000. This is no small amount, but with your help and generosity and the

Lord's will, it is attainable.

How can you help?

"DOORWAYS TO HOPE" DAY PILGRIMAGE WITH FATHER BRIAN



On Wednesday, June 25, 2025, fifty people from St. James, St. Joseph, All Saints, St. Francis Xavier Cathedral, and Prince of Peace em-

barked on an exciting and spiritual journey. The Annual Pilgrimage Day 2025, "Doorways to Hope" was a huge success that took us to Appleton. The Pilgrimage Day has a tenyear history, and each trip is the exclusive brainstorm of Father Brian, who loves to arrange and embark on pilgrimages. Each is unique, and never the same.



Pilgrims explored Hearthstone Historic House which was the first home in Wisconsin to feature electric lights

and the phrase "Turn on the lights!" was coined.

Next, Mass was celebrated by Father Brian and Deacon Conrad Kieltyka at



St. Pius X. Bishop Ricken designated St. Pius as a Pilgrim of Hope pilgrimage destination, where visitors could gain a plenary indulgence. St. Pius was also Father Brian's first parish assignment and was also a pastorate of Fr. Ron Colombo. Deb Lyons served as reader. A delicious pizza lunch from Stucs, along with a sampling of Fr. Jim's Jugenheimer's homemade ice cream followed the Mass.

After lunch, we sojourned to St. Joseph parish, where Brother Ray introduced us to the life of Blessed Solanus



Casey. If canonized, he will become the first United States-born man to become a saint. Blessed Solanus was born in Wisconsin and celebrated his first Mass at St. Joseph in Appleton. He was ordained a simplex priest and could only celebrate Mass privately and could not hear confessions. Blessed Solanus is the patron of disappointment and failure, but is renowned for his spiritual wisdom, healing, and mastery of the violin.

The afternoon continued with a visit to the newly-restored St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception church in Menasha. We prayed mid-

afternoon prayer and Father Brian celebrated the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick for all who requested it, while Deacon Conrad offered a powerful reflection on healing. That was followed by time to pray, join several guided tours, see the choir loft, or explore the church on your own.



It was a wonderful day of prayer, learning, fellowship, and fun. There was good spirit, energy, and laughter all day long. It was a way for people to get to know each other and



HAPPY DEMISEMISEPTCENTENNIAL ST. JAMES CHURCH!

An anniversary of 175 years is certainly significant, but there is no common word used to describe such a milestone. Some sources indicate that the word demisemiseptcentennial literally means one-half (demi-) × one-half (semi-) × seven (sept-) × 100 years (centennial.) For our purposes at St. James, we have avoided using this difficult word.

There is a certain magic that fills the air when a church community gets together to celebrate a momentous occasion. You'll feel that sense of significance when everyone gath-

ers to mark the Feastday of St. James the Greater on the 175th anniversary of the church's founding.

Preparation for this historic day began more than a year ago, when a committee of ten people formed to begin brainstorming on what the occasion would entail. July 27, 2025 was the date chosen because it is the closest Sunday to the Feast of St. James the Greater, (July 25.) After much discussion, a biblical theme from the Book of Psalms, Chapter 126, Verse 3 was chosen:

"The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy."

PARKING

The parking lot will be left open for vehicles, with extra parking along the cemetery driveways. If you intend to stay the entire afternoon, please park away from pedestrian traffic for safety. Carpool if possible, and follow the directions of the parking attendants.

Guided by this verse, the group planned three key components to mark the occasion:

SPIRITUAL COMPONENT

piled. Teaching materials were distributed, and Faith Formation students were encouraged to participate. The pray-

ers were submitted forming a treasury of personal devotions from parishioners who lived in the year 2025. The booklets will be distributed for free as a keepsake for generations to come. This project was made possible

Children were invited to step back in time by memorizing Prayers and Principles of the Catholic Faith. Monthly prizes for completion were awarded, and there will be more prizes given out on July 27.

MANY HANDS MAKE LIGHT WORK

To volunteer means to freely offer up your time and service to help. July 1st marks one year since Fr. Brian became the Pastor at our parish. In preparation for his arrival, and for the upcoming celebration of 175 years of faith, volunteers have generously given their time, talents, and treasures for numerous projects.

Worth noting is that some projects were done by contractors, but many volunteers were needed to get the bids, permits, designs, approvals, details, follow-ups, etc. to take the projects to fruition. In addition, many volunteers donated hours, skills, money, and supplies to make these projects successful. We are grateful for all volunteers and donors! Let us recognize our accomplishments from this past year (and those we may have missed.)

- Repaired and paved the parking lot; installed new cement sidewalks around church
- Completed the Father Ron memorial garden; added white stone around the rectory
- Updated the stairwell near choir/sacristy and basement, including epoxy finish
- Installed a lift in church and outside handrails
- Prepared rectory in preparation for Fr. Brian's arrival
- Cleaned rectory basement and attic; held garage sale

- Trimmed shrubs; added bark around trees and outdoor altar
- ▼ Added concrete curbing; prepped landscaping areas
- ♥ Removed trees in cemetery and front lawn
- ▼ Added landscaping weed barrier and stone
- ♥ Replaced screens in steeple; removed debris
- ♥ Cleaned along CTH R roadside; planted grass to make the ditch the proper width
- Built wood covers for outlets by altar; added shelves in sacristy
- Cleaned cemetery; lifted, cleaned, and repaired headstones
- ♥ Scraped and painted outside trim on windows and doors
- Trenched water to back of church and cemetery
- ♥ Painted lift, entrance, parish hall, and altar tops
- ▼ Added pullies for hanging banners in church
- ▼ Repainted Enter/Exit signs and outside altar
- ♥ Cleaned carpets and church proper
- ♥ Planned 175 year parish celebration
- ♥ Installed air conditioning in rectory
- ♥ Moved Sacred Heart of Jesus statue
- Cleaned kitchen and supply closet
- ♥ Returned tabernacle to back altar
- ♥ Removed deck from garage roof
- ♥ Repaired roof leaks in buildings
- Repaired outdoor benches



1986 TIME CAPSULE DISCOVERED



April 15, Tuesday of Holy Week, was a surprising day for Fr. Brian and a few parishioners. We decided to look behind the opening of the back altar beneath the crucifix, in hopes to place the tabernacle into the space it once occupied prior to the church's remodel in 1986.

Many original wooden pieces from the

church were found stored in the back of the altar. With a little finagling, the wooden pieces were repositioned or removed, along with a cardboard box labelled "SEALED MAY 1ST 1986...DO NOT OPEN TILL MAY 1ST 2086." After identifying this box as a time capsule from 1986, it was properly returned (unopened) behind the altar.

It was wonderful to find such a hidden treasure, and even more exciting to be able to return the tabernacle back to its original position.

- ◆ The church interior is in need of painting, repair, and updating.
- ◆ There are a number of liturgical items (items used for Mass) such as a metal ceremonial book of the gospels, 6 – 8 candlestands, or a set of copes (garments priests and deacons wear for processions and devotionals.)
- You could donate next year's songbooks that are always replaced at the end of November, or consider donating next year's altar candles, or even the Paschal Candle.
- ◆ You could donate towards future landscaping needs and upkeep.
- Moreover the religious education program is always in need of support to catechize our children.

Perhaps you could donate the amount to cover this year's Fun and Faith?

We need your ongoing support to maintain regular, everyday upkeep and operations. I challenge all parishioners to consider a 10% increase in your regular sacrificial giving. That means if you gave \$500 to the parish this past year, please consider \$550 for 2025-2026.

Perhaps it is more convenient for you to donate your sacrificial giving electronically. We have the opportunity available and it is simple to set up. This method ensures your contributions will be given even when you cannot attend Mass here on Sundays.

It is our right and duty to contribute to

the needs of the parish. It is only by the grace of God and the generosity of all of us, and those who came before, that our beautiful and historic Church lives on in Cooperstown, Wisconsin.

Be proud of your church. Promote your church, and support it, not only with your treasure, time, and talent, but by word of mouth. Do not presume that other people know that we are here or that they are welcome here. Invite them to visit our church with you. Your participation, promotion, and enthusiasm for your parish can go a long way in welcoming new parishioners to carry the legacy of this church for the next twenty-five years.
