Discipleship and Service @ St. Agnes





Family Guide 2021-22

Christian Service or Discipleship is at the core of our Christian life. As disciples, we follow as Jesus leads. We follow by staying in communication with Him (prayer) and acting as He did (in service and compassion). Time and again we see Jesus reaching out to feed the hungry, heal the sick, forgive and teach. He tells us directly that we should go and do the same as we love our neighbors and enemies. In the Gospel of Matthew (25:31-45) we find instruction on just how to serve others and in doing so, we serve God. Our Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy come from this parable.

In the past, we have focused on the Corporal Works of Mercy, but that limited our efforts to direct service, donations, and physical work. There are so many ways to be a Disciple of Jesus! Using the Corporal *and Spiritual* Works of Mercy to guide your service will give you some creative ideas about how to do a discipleship or service project. Time in prayer, or study, or advocating for others is as valuable as directly serving physical needs. Consider that you can serve others and God in these many ways:



There are several requirements for service in the various formation programs at St. Agnes:

- School families are required to complete 20 hours of service annually
- Each school student has an individual service requirement:
 - o Grade 1-2: 5 hours
 - Grade 3-4: 10 hours
 - o Grade 5-6: 15 hours
 - o Grade 7-8: 20 hours
- Each class at St. Agnes School is required to complete a class project
- Confirmation and First Eucharist candidates are required to do a Discipleship Project (no hour count) after celebrating the sacraments
- Family Formation participants are asked to do service as a family
- Youth small groups in the formation program may do service together
- And...we are called by our Baptism to spread the Gospel with words and actions!

Many of these requirements can overlap. For instance, a 3rd grader's family hours can also be counted for Confirmation Discipleship. Or, the classroom project can count for the individual student hours. There are separate reporting forms for each of these (see attached) but they can be the same hours/project.

With the expanded list of works, you can now be very creative and intentional about your service. Here are some suggestions but think outside the box and come up with your own projects too!

• Eucharistic Adoration

- Tuesdays 2:30-3:30pm: Covers all the Spiritual Works of Mercy as you pray for others, for forgiveness, for understanding or just spend time with Jesus.
- There will be a sign in book to record your time. Drop in for 10, 15 or 20 minutes and record how many "adorers" from your family were present (example: 4 people x 15 minutes=1 hour family service)

Family Formation Sessions

- 3rd Sunday of each month, for all families to learn and pray together (Oct. 17, Nov. 21, Dec 19, Jan 23, Feb. 20, Mar. 20, Apr. 24)
- o 1 hour per participant
- o Instruction, Counsel, Pray-Spiritual Works of Mercy
- **Spend the day with your family!** No tech or media. Go hiking, go to a museum, go on a picnic. Talk, laugh, play. Take some Sabbath time. Spend some dedicated time with no other distractions, sports, work, school or stress. **Bear Wrongs and Forgive**

Bring Eucharist to the Homebound or Assisted Living

- o Families can do this together as long as an adult is a Eucharistic Minister
- o You can be a regular minister for one person or go to a facility periodically
- Visit the Sick or Imprisoned, Pray for the Living, Counsel the Doubtful
- Contact the Faith Formation Office for information.

• Go to Reconciliation

- Forgive Offences, Bear Wrongs Patiently
- Confession is available every Saturday from 3-4pm or by appointment and during Advent and Lent Prayer Services

Pray the Scriptures as a Family

- Use the Sunday readings to talk about what Jesus is speaking to you
- Instruction, Counsel, Bearing Wrongs
- When you report your time, give a quick summary of the scripture/date/time

Visit a cemetery and pray for those who have died, clean up a little

- Pray for the Dead
- Take pictures or gravestone rubbings and learn a little about those lives when you report your time

Direct Service Ideas and Resources


Finding locations and times to do direct service can be challenging. What can the youngest disciples do? Where can we go to serve people and not just donate? What will have meaning for us and for those whom we serve?

It is always good to find a way to actually see the people you are serving and to get to know them a little. And, it is always best to ask what the real needs are in order to way to make an impact. For instance:

- buying 10 cans of corn on sale for \$1.00 and dropping them off at the pantry is great.
 But donating \$1.00 can allow the food pantry to purchase several pounds of food and get the types of food they really need at that time
- Donating old clothes helps, but a bigger need is linens and towels and baby items like diapers, crib linens etc.
- Praying at Adoration may seem dull but you are being changed while you are there and so are the people you are praying for; maybe people you will never get to meet.

The Two Feet of Love in Action

Keep in mind that direct service to meet a present need is only half of the equation of Christian Service. Advocacy, education, and work to improve the root causes of injustice are important too!
