# Mariner's Cross: A Symbol of Hope

The mariner's cross, which is hung in the newly renovated confessionals of Our Lady of the Gulf (OLG) Catholic Church, in Port Lavaca is a traditional symbol of hope. This crucifix is in the shape of an anchor. It is unique because it was constructed from repurposed wood, from the original pews of

the church, by Mr. Arturo Martinez, a retired carpenter and parishioner of OLG. Around 2011 Father Ty Bazar, pastor of OLG at the time, started a capital campaign to raise money to renovate the aging church. When Father Tommy Chen became the pastor in August of 2013 he continued the campaign to make the renovations a reality.

Before renovations, the original struc-

ture, which has been the place of worship for more than sixty years, was in dire need of improvements. It had a leaking roof without insulation, the air conditioner was an old cooling system with parts that were obsolete, the carpet was stained and musty, the pews were cracking and splitting, the sound system was failing and had only one speaker, and the worst was the ONE outdoor toilet to serve everyone! Demolition and construction began in November of 2016 and the renovations were blessed by Bishop Brendan Cahill on February 8, 2018.

Father Tommy described the renovations as bringing new life to the Church. He shared, "It has brought new excitement



## Bishop Brendan Cahill A Shepherd's Message

### **Peace on Earth**

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Every year the Archbishop of the Military Services, Tim Broglio, celebrates a Memorial Mass for all of our Military Personnel. This year I had the opportunity to con-celebrate this Mass at the National Shrine in Washington, D.C. It was especially significant for me since my Great Uncle, Msgr. Patrick Fay was a Military Chaplain who served in World War II. During his homily this year, Archbishop Broglio mentioned that he had just returned from the annual International Military Pilgrimage to Lourdes (warriorstolourdes.com). He told us that the theme for this year's pilgrimage was "Peace on Earth" and reminded us that one way to honor our military is to keep praying and advocating for peace in he world

We consistently pray for peace in the world, for the end of specific conflicts and for the safety of our Military Personnel. Especially trusting in the power of the Eucharist and the Rosary this prayer has real effects. As I'm writing this letter I'm praying for peace in the Middle East, a hopeful resolution to the talks with North Korea, and for the safety of our soldiers overseas. I can remember a Church where I regularly celebrated Mass and we prayed for a young man who was being deployed to the Middle East. I remember praying in thanksgiving when he returned home safely. We should never under-estimate the power of our consistent prayer.

We also realize that not everyone returns

home, or returns home healthy and healed. As a community we remain committed to honor our Veterans. The time around Memorial Day weekend in the Crossroads is especially uplifting as men and women do so much to bring honor and healing to our Veterans. Fields of honor, fishing trips, hospitality, and barbecues take on such a deeper meaning when offered in love and respect for those who have served. As we honor those who served in conflicts, we commit ourselves to advocate for peaceful solutions to disagreements among nations.

The Catechism (#2302-2317) calls the "Safeguarding of Peace" one of our responsibilities in fulfillment of the Fifth Commandment – "Thou Shalt Not Kill". The other two responsibilities are the Respect for Human Life from Conception to Natural Death and Respect for the Dignity of Persons. Quoting St. Augustine, #2304 states that more than merely the absence of war, "Peace is 'the tranquility of order'".

May you and your families know the tranquility that comes from knowing the personal love of God and the presence of the Holy Spirit. Let us keep each other in prayer throughout this summer, with confidence as always in the power of the Eucharist and the Rosary,

### Paz en la Tierra

Queridos Hermanos y Hermanas,

Cada año, el Arzobispo de los Servicios Militares, Tim Broglio, celebra una misa en memoria de todo nuestro personal militar. Este año tuve la oportunidad de con-celebrar esta misa en el Santuario Nacional en Washington, DC Fue especialmente significativo para mí ya que mi tío abuelo, Mons. Patrick Fay fue capellán militar que sirvió en la Segunda Guerra Mundial. Durante su homilía el Arzobispo Broglio este año mencionó que acababa de regresar de la Peregrinación Militar Internacional anual a Lourdes (warriorstolourdes.com). Nos dijo que el tema de la peregrinación de este año fue "Paz en la tierra" y ha recordado que una manera de honrar a nuestros militares es que seguir orando y abogando por la paz en el mundo.

Estamos constantemente orando por la paz en el mundo, para el fin de los conflictos

específicos y por la seguridad de nuestro personal militar. Especialmente confiando en el poder de la Eucaristía y el rosario esta oración tiene efectos reales. También nos damos cuenta de que no todo el mundo vuelve a casa, o vuelve a casa sano y curado. Como comunidad seguimos comprometidos a honrar a nuestros veteranos. El tiempo de alrededor de fin de semana largo en el cruce de caminos es especialmente alentador que los hombres y las mujeres lo hacen mucho para traer el honor y la sanación a nuestros veteranos. Los Campos de Honor, excursiones de pesca, la hospitalidad y asados adquieren un significado tan profundo cuando se les ofrece en el amor y el respeto a los que han servido. Al honrar a aquellos que sirvieron en los conflictos nos comprometemos a abogar por la solución pacífica de los desacuerdos entre las naciones.

### **Diocese of Victoria Receives \$2.5M Grant from Catholic Charities USA**

The Catholic Diocese of Victoria in Texas (DOV) was awarded a long-term disaster recovery grant of \$2.5 million by Catholic Charities USA (CCUSA), from funds received through the second collection offered by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). CCUSA is the official domestic disaster relief and response organization of the Catholic Church. The funds will be used to meet the local community's ongoing recovery needs following Hurricane Harvey.

Hurricane Harvey dumped an estimated 27 trillion gallons of water in Texas and Louisiana. This event resulted in loss of life and property. An estimated 738,000 people requested assistance from FEMA. Damage totals included: more than 200,000 homes were damaged; over 12,000 homes were completely destroyed; nearly 500,000 vehicles were ruined beyond repair and hundreds of business structures were compromised. Nine months later thousands of families are still in need of assistance.

The DOV is committed to assisting survivors and remains engaged in the longterm community recovery effort. Chief Financial Officer of The Catholic Diocese of Victoria in Texas, Tony Martinez has

been working with Catholic Charities from the beginning of the recovery efforts. He shares, "The Diocese of Victoria understands that without assistance, survivors can sink into a spiral of non-recovery, especially vulnerable populations. We need to walk with them throughout the recovery journey. Additionally, we have embraced the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Disaster Relief Services' House in a Box® (HIB) program, whereby renters and home owners alike are provided new furniture and home furnishings at the appropriate stage of the survivor's recovery process. Families are reviewed and referred through a Disaster Case Management process that ensures that there is no duplication of benefits."

### Sister Callista Mares, IWBS

Sister Callista Mares, IWBS, 100, passed away May 5, 2018. She was born

February 4, 1918, in Cistern, Texas to the late Cyril Joe and Augusta Lena (Otahal) Mares. She was the second of seven children – two girls and five boys.

Sister Callista completed elementary grades

at St. Wencelaus School in Cistern and high school at Nazareth Academy in Victoria. She became a Sister of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament in San Antonio on December 18, 1937, and made first profession of vows on December 19, 1938. She received her BA degree with a major in history and a minor in philosophy from Incarnate Word College in San Antonio.

After celebrating her 100th birthday in February, she was preparing to celebrate her 80th jubilee as a Sister. She enjoyed her years of teaching primary, elementary and junior high students at Sacred Heart School in Hallettsville, Nazareth Academy, Blessed Sacrament Academy in San Antonio, Ammannsville, Sealy, Falls City Public School, and St. Ludmila Academy in Shiner.

When Sister Callista retired from full-time classroom duty in 1985, she remained active with assisting in the infirmary, serving as sacristan, and participating in household duties at Incarnate Word Convent. During some of these years she also visited nursing homes in the area. She made items for the Arts and Crafts sales with her crocheting and needlepoint and loved to put jigsaw puzzles together. Her last years were spent in the apostolate of prayer and suffering.

She is preceded in death by her parents and brothers, William (Bill), Charles, Felix, John, and George.

She is survived by her sister, Catherine (Mares) Camp and many nieces, nephews, grand, great-grand, and great-great-grand nieces and nephews, former students and friends

Yes, Dads are special people; they not only protect and provide for their families, but they are the leaders and serve as spiritual guides in their families. Along with their children's mothers, fathers provide a physical and spiritual loving, nourishing environment in which children can thrive. Children can witness the interaction between a man and woman who are bonded by their love for one another and for their children. Children benefit from the love, example, and discipline of two persons who complement and balance one another. Dads, your example and time spent with your sons is so important in teaching them how to grow up into men of character and integrity. Boys need the love, example, and bondedness of an older male to help them ease into the intricacies of society. Girls need interaction with a father figure in order to facilitate their learning to relate with males in the future, especially in their own marriages. They often use their own fathers as a standard by which they evaluate their future spouses.

Dads, your families love you and need

you. You are the ones whose example can help prepare your children for success. Your gentleness can teach them to be loving and compassionate; your strength can teach them courage and perseverance while your reverence can orient them toward a faith-filled life of love and service in preparation for their final destiny.

Finally, I want to remind fathers that they have a very visible patron saint in Saint Joseph, who serves as a model of a loving husband and a nurturing parent. In fact, in many countries, St. Joseph's Feast Day on March 19 is considered the day to honor Christian fathers.

Fathers, and "proxy" fathers: grandfathers, uncles, older brothers or cousins, Big Brothers — we all love you and we thank you. Happy Father's Day!

### Our God is an Awesome God

My name is Luan Van Tran, and I am a Deacon at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Bay City, and the Vietnamese community in Palacios, Texas. My wife, Thao, and I have lived in Bay City for the past 41 years, but the story of how we ended up here wouldn't have been possible without our awesome God by our side.

North was under Communist rule, and the South was a Democratic Republic. I was 7 years old at the time, and my family was living in North Vietnam. My father was a soldier fighting for the South against the Communist, and he received orders to move to the South with his company. After a few months of being apart, my mom decided it was time to reunite with my father. We left

#### **EARLY LIFE**

I was born at home in 1947 in North Vietnam. I am the seventh child out of nine. My father was in the military, and my mother grew vegetables to sell at the local market. We lived a very simple life until government conflicts divided our country.

In 1954, Vietnam was divided into two sides. The

We had to start life over when we moved to the South. We arrived with nothing and had very little assistance from the government. Before my siblings and I could enroll in school, we had to obtain birth certificates. Since we were all born at home, we didn't have official documents. My father filled in the paperwork for my whole family, but he couldn't remember our birthdays! He filled in that I was born on August 13, 1950, which made me three years younger than my actual age. To this day, my paperwork has an incorrect date for my birth.

#### THE WAR

The war officially began in 1955. We tried to live as normal of a life as we could. My parents were devout Catholics, especially my mom. Every day, she would attend Mass in the morning and be back at church at noon and in the evenings to pray. My siblings and I were also involved in the church. After I received my First Commu-

nion, I became an altar server. I later became a choir director at our church.

Meanwhile, the war in Vietnam was escalating. The North Vietnamese Communist sent more troops to the South. They shot rockets into the marketplaces, schools, hospitals, and churches. So many innocent people were killed. My father was discharged from the military in 1967, and a year later, I volunteered to join the Artillery branch of the Vietnamese Military. By then, the Vietnamese Communists were everywhere. Many U.S. soldiers came to Vietnam to help reinforce the South Vietnamese government. It took a few months to drive them out of the cities.

In 1969, I married my wife, Thao. I was able to come home once a month for two days. It was hard to be away from my family, and I had no idea when or how the war would end. I faced many situations that could've ended in death. My faith and family kept me strong during all these difficult years.

### **LEAVING OUR COUNTRY**

On April 30, 1975, the Communist took over South Vietnam. We were afraid of what life would be like for us under Communist rule. We knew we wouldn't have the freedom to practice our Catholic faith, so we decided to flee the country. Once again, we were leaving everything we had to begin a new life elsewhere.

Our journey to leave Vietnam was difficult and disorganized. My wife, three young children, and my mom (my father passed in 1974) didn't know where to go or how to leave. We prayed that we would find a safe way out. My friend from high school helped us get on an old ship. Mechanics were rushing to work on the boat as people were crowding to get on.

Within a few hours, the ship was ready to depart and crammed with more than 3,000 people. It took six long days to get to Subic Bay in the Philippines. There wasn't enough food for everyone, so we were hungry for most of those days. When we arrived at Subic Bay, the American soldiers greeted us and gave us each a box of C Rations to eat. As soon as we finished eating, we boarded a cargo ship to the island of Guam.

We traveled seven days on the ship to reach Guam. We stayed in Guam for three weeks where medical checks and paperwork were completed. At this time, we knew we were safe and on our way to freedom, to America. We were happy that we would be living in the best country in the world, but also so sad to leave our home country.

#### **JOURNEY TO AMERICA**

In June of 1975, we boarded a plane and landed in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

We stayed in a refugee camp for two and a half months before moving to Jersey City, New Jersey, where we lived for nearly two years. I worked as a glass cutter to support my family.

In search of warmer weather, we moved to Bay City, Texas in January 1977. I thank God that I was able to find work at STP Nuclear Operating Company within two weeks of our arrival. We enrolled our children in school and found a church to attend. I spent several years going to night school after work to learn English. Even though life in a new country was not easy, we were grateful to be together, and we were safe.

## SERVING GOD AND THE COMMUNITY

We found our church home at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Bay City. I am very grateful to Father Shannon for encouraging me to join the Diaconate Program. On August 15, 1987, I was a part of the first class of Deacons to be ordained in the Diocese of Victoria.

Today, I serve at Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish in Bay City. I teach youth and adult Confirmation classes, CCD to non-Catholics, Marriage Preparation classes, and I am a spiritual director for the Legion of Mary groups. I am also an Advisor for the Board of Directors of The Vietnamese Deacons Association and one of the board members for The Federation of Vietnamese Catholics.

# Quadriplegic Priest, if Sainted, Would Become First in U.S.

It's been 18 years since the Rev. Charles Kram died, yet the legacy of his heroic life committed to God and the Catholic Church as a quadriplegic priest continues.

In the Yoakum Community Hospital, where he once lived and served as hospital chaplain for two decades, a photo of Kram remains on the wall in his honor.

Serving as chaplain required helpers at times, but he wrote his homilies by himself. He typed them with a stick from his mouth.

He was unable to move the rest of his body after a severe bout of polio paralyzed him decades earlier. He still had his voice; however, and he would continue to use it for the Lord.

"In all his suffering, he never complained or griped. When he needed help, he would ask politely and humbly," said Joe Machacek, an ordained deacon of Sts. Cyril and Methodius in Shiner. "He led a very full and blessed life and inspired many in the way he lived."

About six years ago, Machacek and a small group of church members who knew of the dutiful and gentle spirit of Kram, and his desire to comfort those who suffered, decided Kram was worthy of sainthood.

The Father Kram Beatification Project was born, and a grass-roots effort to canonize Kram got the greenlight in the Victoria Diocese.

Three years ago, Kram's case was assigned by Bishop Brendan Cahill to the Rev. Bob Knippenberg, of Holy Family Catholic Church in Wharton, who now serves as postulator, a Catholic term for the one who guides the beatification through its proper process.

"I think he has a very good case, honestly. Father Kram exhibited all the hallmarks of heroic virtue," Knippenberg said, who spoke of the complexity of gathering paperwork, homilies, interviews and other essentials of Kram's life needed to advance the case. "He lived his life with such joy and attention toward the needs of others, and he did it with difficult physical challenges."

Only 11 saints with historical ties to the United States have been sainted. The most recent was Junipero Serra in 2015.

Many cases for canonization are put up each year in Catholic dioceses around the world, but few ever make it all the way through to the end. Even fewer were physically disabled.

"I think it would mean a lot to the handicapped community to see him canonized," Machacek said. "I think people would say, 'Look, he became a priest, the highest office in the church. If he can do that in a wheelchair, I can do anything.' I think a lot of people saw what he went through and realized they didn't have it so bad."

While it's rare for disabled priests to be

put up for canonization, it has occurred in the Catholic Church several times.

St. Giuseppe Cafasso, an Italian priest born in 1811, suffered from a deformed spine. And Blessed Herman the Cripple, who was not sainted, but elevated to "Blessed," a stop along the way to sainthood, was a German priest born with a cleft palate, cerebral palsy and spina bifida in 1020.

Others with physical disabilities have also been celebrated throughout history.

If Kram becomes a saint, he would be the first quadriplegic priest canonized in the U.S.

"I would think it would put the Victoria Diocese on the map, most definitely. Only a few have been ever sainted from the United States, and there's only one other case I know of with a disabled priest going through the process right now," Knippenberg said.

Before Kram's case can move forward, Cahill must determine if it's fit to move to a tribunal of theological experts, who will then determine if Kram's case meets the standard for canonization. They will review the paperwork, analyze submitted materials, and ensure Kram's life and teachings were in concordance with the Catholic Church's teachings.

to the U.S. Conference of Bishops, and if approved, the case moves to the Vatican in Rome.

If the Vatican accepts the case, Kram will officially be known as "Servant of God." And after Kram's first posthumous miracle is proven, he will become known as "Blessed" or "Venerable."

To become "St. Charles Kram," two posthumous miracles must be documented and signed off by Vatican officials.

At some point, Knippenberg said Kram's body may even be exhumed to determine if he's an "incorruptible." When bodies are minimally decayed, or if there is a scent of flowers or roses upon opening the grave, the Catholic Church views this as another possible sign of sanctity.

"It can take a very long time to go through this process; sometimes it takes hundreds or thousands of years to become a saint," Knippenberg said. "I probably will not see Father Kram canonized in my lifetime, but someone else will have to step in and take over."

Only two cases for canonization are being put forth in the Victoria Diocese currently. The other is for the foundress of the Sisters of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament in Victoria, Venerable Jeanne Chezard de Matel, who was venerated by Pope John Paul II in 1992.

Both Knippenberg and Machacek said they have put out the word for those who are aware of any miracles connected to Kram to contact them for documentation.

And both hope in their lifetime, Kram and his good deeds are celebrated in the Catholic Church for centuries to come.

"As much as I've read about all the different saints, by far, Father Kram ranks at the top with any of them," Machacek said. "I would hold him up there with any of them."

# With Confirmation Before Surgery, Woman Feels Love of Faith Community

ARLINGTON, Va. (CNS) — It felt like a small miracle when Father Stefan P. Starzynski came to Kelly Heaton's bedside and anointed her two hours before her brain surgery. And it seemed unbelievable when her family learned one of her brain abscesses had disappeared. Kelly was blessed by speedy recovery and diligent doctors. But she feels the greatest gift is that she found the Catholic faith before her illness. "Had I not had the Catholic family, I don't think I'd be here," she said. "That was a true miracle." The last MRI before she went

into surgery showed the smaller abscess had disappeared, and the doctor feared it had ruptured, or traveled into the ventricle. The surgeon successfully removed the larger abscess, and never found the smaller one. "We credit the Lord and Father Stefan for saving Kelly's life," her husband, Jim, told the *Arlington Catholic Herald*, newspaper of the Diocese of Arlington. In recovery, Kelly had to learn to walk and talk again. But she healed faster than expected, and today is at almost full strength. "We call her the Miracle Mama," said Jim.

## El papa canonizará beatos Pablo VI, Óscar Romero en octubre en Roma

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO (CNS) — El papa Francisco declarará santos a los beatos Óscar Romero, Pablo VI y otros

cuatro el 14 de octubre en el Vaticano durante la reunión del Sínodo de los Obispos, institución revivida por el beato Pablo.

La fecha fue anunciada el 19 de mayo durante un "consistorio ordinario público", una reunión entre el papa,

los cardenales y los promotores de las causas de los santos que formalmente termina el proceso de santidad.

El cardenal Angelo Amato, prefecto de la Congregación para las Causas de los Santos, le pidió al papa durante el consistorio "inscribir en su debido tiempo entre los santos" seis candidatos a la canonización "para la gloria de Dios y el bien de toda la iglesia".

El cardenal le dijo al papa que cada uno de los candidatos dio "un testimonio convencido y coherente del Señor Jesús. Su ejemplo continúa iluminando la iglesia y el mundo de acuerdo con la perspectiva de la misericordia que su Santidad nunca cesa de indicar y proponer".

El cardenal Amato dijo que durante la guerra civil de El Salvador, el arzobispo Romero, "indignado al ver la violencia contra los débiles y los asesinatos de sacerdotes y catequistas, sintió la necesidad de asumir una actitud de fortaleza. El 24 de marzo de 1980 fue asesinado mientras celebraba Misa".

Revisando los hechos de la vida del beato Pablo, el cardenal Amato destacó cómo el futuro papa "organizó la ayuda caritativa y la hospitalidad para los perseguidos, especialmente los judíos, cuando era un alto oficial en la Secretaría de Estado del Vaticano durante la Segunda Guerra Mundial".

El papa Francisco entonces certificó que había solicitado la opinión de los cardenales, quienes estuvieron de acuerdo en que "estos mismos beatos deberían ser propuestos a toda la iglesia como ejemplos de vidas cristianas y de santidad".

Los otros hombres y mujeres que serán canonizados incluyen: el padre Francesco Spinelli de Italia, fundador de las Hermanas Adoratrices del Santísimo Sacramento; el padre Vincenzo Romano, que trabajó con los pobres de Nápoles, Italia, hasta su muerte en 1831; Madre Catherine Kasper, la fundadora alemana de la congregación religiosa, las Siervas Pobres de Jesucristo; y Nazaria Ignacia March Mesa, la fundadora española de la Congregación de las Misioneras Cruzadas de la Iglesia.

## Mariner's Cross: A Symbol of Hope

to attending Mass, Adoration, prayer services, and celebrating the sacraments. For

me, it is a true testimony that beauty can touch the person down to depths that other things can't reach." Many improvements were made to the church, some of which included beautiful indoor bathrooms, a choir loft and sound system, lighting, new pews, a new A/C, beautiful landscaping, and significant changes to the sanctuary itself. Matthew Schaefer, a current deacon candidate for the Diocese of Victoria made the podiums for the statues in the sanctuary, new sliding screens and shelves for the confessionals, and the elegant wooden cross over the altar.

Redesigning the sanctuary was a priority to Father Tommy. He wanted to highlight the sanctuary, as it is a symbol of heaven. Some of the things he chose to do were raise the floor up to the sanctuary three steps, to symbolize the Trice Holy God; put real marble on the flooring; embellish the canopy over the altar, called a "Baldachin"; relocate the tabernacle to its original place in the center, behind the altar and under the Baldachin; replace the main cross above the altar, while using the original corpus; and put an inscription on the arch over the altar.

The inscription chosen for the arch reads: "Ave Stella Maris (Hail Star of the Sea) Felix Porta Caeli (Happy Gate of Heaven)." The title of Our Lady of the Gulf is not a traditional title of Our Lady; however, it is derived from her ancient title Star of the Sea. Both have a mariner theme. Father Tommy explained, "As the sailors would look to the North Star to guide them safely to port, as Catholics we look to Our Lady to guide us to her Son."

As church renovations new mariner's cross made of the church were being from old pews and newly decompleted Father Tommy signed sliding screen.

was visiting with a parishioner, Elizabeth Chavana about the old pews that were being

removed from the church. He knew that her father, Arturo Martinez, originally from San Luis Potosí was a retired carpenter. He had donated items he had made from wood to past festivals and asked if he could do another project. She went to her father and asked him, "Daddy, Father Tommy is wondering if you could make the old pews shorter and refinish them to sell at the next festival?" Her dad agreed to shorten the benches for the upcoming festival.

Mr. Martinez shared, "Hice dos bancas, cada una cuatro pies, y todavilla sobró madera." ("I made two benches, each four feet and there was still extra wood.") Then Father Tommy asked, "Can you make an anchor cross from the leftover wood?" He agreed and made one for him. Father Tommy loved it so much that he came back the following week wanting 12 more! Mr. Martinez laughed and said, "Preguntó si yo podía hacer una." ("He asked if I could make one.") He thought to himself, that sure is a lot, but he made them anyway. Father Tommy then had an idea to sell the crosses to raise extra money for the campaign. He said, "We started taking orders after Mass. I really didn't think we would have too many; then before I knew it we had 200 orders!"

Each crucifix is twelve inches tall with a beautiful five inch metal corpus of Jesus imported from Italy. The anchor is a traditional symbol of hope in the Church (Hebrews 6:19). A lot of work goes into making each cross, which is crafted by hand. First he cuts the shape of the anchor. He then uses a belt sander to sand each part of the wood, which removes the old lacquer and paint. Next he uses a "lima" (a file) to smooth the edges by hand.



The redesigned sanctuary of Our Lady of the Gulf features an inscription on the arch above the altar, that reads: "Ave Stella Maris (Hail Star of the Sea) Felix Porta Caeli (Happy Gate of Heaven)."

After he files the edges he uses a router to cut the fancy edges of the anchor. Lastly, he paints the finished anchor with a stain and clear sealer. The process takes a total of four days to complete one cross. He describes the "cross making" process as tedious. He explained that the oak wood is difficult to work with, that it breaks easily especially at the edges due to the age of the wood. When this happens he has to glue it back, wait a day and then finish the process.

Although making the crosses has been time consuming and difficult, the pride in his work and knowing it is for the church has kept him going. Mr. Martinez has graciously made more than 60 crosses and there are so many orders, that he cannot keep up. With the high demand for the crosses David Ortiz and Michael Garza, parishioners of OLG, have stepped in to help by making crosses in their personal workshops. They are still seeking others who may want to help make anchor crucifixes. (Please contact the OLG Rectory if carpentry is your gift.)

The anchor crucifixes can be seen hanging throughout the parish, in the rectory, the confessionals and in Our Lady of the Gulf Catholic School. Many people wanted a part of the original OLG church and now they can purchase a special crucifix for \$200

made from the wood of the original pews, for their homes. The parish and Father Tommy wish to thank the many people who have shared their time and talents to see the church renovations to completion. Just as the mariner's cross symbolizes hope in Christ amid a turbulent world, Father Tommy hopes the newly renovated church will bring a deeper experience of God. He shared, "There is something unspoken that people encounter when they experience beauty. That beauty leads them to a deeper experience of the mystery of God. For me, it is a true testimony that beauty can touch the person down to depths that other things can't reach."

## Emmaus Center Roast and Toast Huge Success - Honoring Very Rev. Janak





## Sister Pimentel, Immigrant Advocate, Receives Notre Dame's Laetare Medal

NOTRE DAME, Ind. (CNS) — Sister Norma Pimentel, M.J., executive director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley in Texas and a longtime advocate

for immigrants and refugees, received the University of Notre Dame's 2018 Laetare Medal at the school's graduation ceremony May 20.

"Jesus said, 'When I was a stranger, you invited me in.' Sister Norma Pimentel has given her life to welcoming Christ in the immigrant and refu-

gee," Holy Cross Father John I. Jenkins, Notre Dame president, said in announcing the award March 11.

The Laetare Medal is so named because its recipient is announced each year on Laetare Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent.

Sister Pimentel, a member of the Missionaries of Jesus, has overseen the charitable arm of the Diocese of Brownsville, Texas, since 2008, providing those in need in the Rio Grande Valley with emergency food and shelter, housing assistance, clinical counseling and pregnancy care.

She was instrumental in organizing local response to the 2014 surge of Central Americans seeking asylum in the United States, which also included helping to establish the Humanitarian Respite Center in McAllen, Texas, providing newly arrived immigrants with food, clothing, water and a place to rest.

In 2015, Pope Francis personally thanked Sister Pimentel for her work with immigrants in a virtual town hall meeting featured on ABC's "20/20." That same year she was named one of Our Sunday Visitor's 2015 Catholics of the Year and won a nomination for "Texan of the Year."

Sister Pimentel said she was "truly honored" to be chosen for the award, noting that it "brings forth the cries of the suffer-

> ing for the world to hear." She thanked the university for the recognition and for "being a voice for immigrants in our midst."

As a daughter of Mexican immigrants, Sister Pimentel frequently crossed the border back and forth from Brownsville to Matamoros, Mexico, to be with family on both sides of the border. She was born in Texas while her

parents were awaiting response from U.S. authorities on their application for

In her reflection on immigrants in the book "A Pope Francis Lexicon," Sister Pimentel wrote: "I am a U.S. citizen by

'chiripa' -- sheer chance," noting that she grew up in two countries, Mexico and the United States.

She received a bachelor of fine arts degree from Pan American University, a master's degree in theology from St. Mary's University and a master's degree in counseling psychology from Loyola University Chicago.

She has said that some of her most formative and pivotal experiences took place shortly after she professed final vows and Border Patrol agents were bringing immigrant families to the convent, often late at night.

Sister Pimentel said Sister Juliana Garcia, her religious superior at the time, "would immediately prepare a room to welcome the family when they arrived. The mother and her children would become part of our community family for about a week or so, and I quickly learned the importance of living out our faith by how we welcome and protect those who need us."

Established at Notre Dame in 1883, the Laetare Medal has been awarded annually at Notre Dame to a Catholic "whose genius has ennobled the arts and sciences, illustrated the ideals of the church and enriched

the heritage of humanity."

Past recipients of the award have included President John F. Kennedy, Dorothy Day, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, Civil War Gen. William Rosecrans, labor activist Msgr. George G. Higgins, jazz composer Dave Brubeck and Jesuit Father Greg Boyle, founder and executive director of Homeboy Industries.

### **Pope Will Create** 14 New Cardinals

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Pope Francis announced he would make 14 new cardinals June 29, giving the red cardinal's hat to the papal almoner, the Iraq-based patriarch of the Chaldean Catholic Church and the archbishop of Karachi, Pakistan, among others.

Announcing his choices May 20, the pope said that coming from 11 nations, the new cardinals "express the universality of the church, which continues to proclaim the merciful love of God to all people of the earth."

Pope Francis' list included three men over the age of 80 "who have distinguished themselves for their service to the church."

When the pope made the announcement, the College of Cardinals had 213 members, 115 of whom were under the age of 80 and therefore eligible to vote in a conclave to elect a new pope.

Under Pope Francis, the idea that some church posts and large archdioceses always are led by a cardinal is fading, but is not altogether gone.

With the new nominations, the number of cardinal-electors - those under 80 and eligible to vote in a conclave - will exceed by five the limit of 120 set by Pope Paul VI. But previous popes also set the limit aside without formally changing the limit.

The new cardinals hail from: Iraq, Spain, Italy, Poland, Pakistan, Portugal, Peru, Madagascar, Japan, Mexico and Bolivia.

## Church is a Mother, Not a Bachelor, **Pope Says at Morning Mass**

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Without its feminine dimension, the Catholic Church risks becoming an old boy's club and incapable of love, Pope Francis said.

The church must "remain female" and "have this attitude of a wife and mother" who nurtures her children, the pope said in his homily May 21 during a morning Mass commemorating the feast of Mary, Mother of the Church.

"When we forget this, it becomes a masculine church; without this dimension, it sadly becomes a church of old bachelors, who live in this isolation, incapable of love, incapable of fruitfulness," the pope said.

The feast, which was decreed by Pope

Francis in March, is celebrated on the Monday after Pentecost.

According to the decree, the pope approved the Marian feast day after "having attentively considered how greatly the promotion of this devotion might encourage the growth of the maternal sense of the church in the pastors, religious and faithful, as well as a growth of genuine Marian piety."

In his homily, the pope reflected on the need for the church to maintain its feminine nature as wife and mother, like Mary.

Without this dimension, "the church loses its true identity and becomes a charitable organization or a soccer team or something, but not the church," he said.

Like a mother, the church also goes "along the path of tenderness" and knows how to convey wisdom through the language of "caresses, of silence, of the gaze that knows compassion," the pope said.

All Christians in some way are called to "go along the same path," being someone who is "gentle, tender, smiling, full of love," Pope Francis said.
