VICTORIA - Everyone is invited to celebrate the canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis at The Victoria College from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Sept. 8, the day after his canoniza-

Also known as the "first millennial saint," Acutis died in 2006 from leukemia at age 15, but during his short life he had huge impact on the world by promoting a devotion to the Eucharist and creating a Website documenting Eucharistic miracles and Marian apparitions around the world.

The event at the college will begin with a presentation about Acutis's life and his desire to tell the world about the Eucharistic miracles Father Gabriel Bentil, pastor of Holy Family Catholic Church, will give the presentation. bout five years ago, the Diocese of Victoria Aestablished the Office of Hispanic Ministry. At the time, we were still navigating the restrictions of COVID-19, yet a young man applied for the position. Initially, it was thought that the ministry could be served with a part-time role. However, it quickly became clear that the need was much greater. Today, that position is full-time, and my friend, Aldo Camacho, now serves as director of

In a short time, he has accomplished much. He developed and now teaches an in-depth formation course in Spanish, organized several Catholic conferences and continues planning more. Recently he was appointed the regional representative for Region X in the National Catholic Association of Diocesan Directors for Hispanic Ministry (more about this appointment appears on Page 11 in this issue). His dedication has borne abundant fruit for our diocese.

Why do I bring this up now? Because Sept. 15 through Oct. 15 marks National Hispanic Heritage Month, a time to reflect on the richness of Hispanic culture and the many ways it shapes our Church.

As a Hispanic woman and a Sister of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament, I carry this deeply in my heart. I am one of the few Latinas in my religious com-


A Shepherd's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"Always be ready to give an explanation ... for a reason for your hope" (1 Peter 3:15)

On Sept. 21 the Church celebrates a special Sunday called Catechetical Sunday. It's a time when we acknowledge at the start of the school year that the most important lessons we teach are the experiences that we share about the reality of Jesus Christ in our lives. I'm especially praying for all of the students, teachers, coaches, school administrators and catechists across our area who have returned to their work of creating communities of learning and growth in knowledge.





Looking at the diocesan calendar you can see and read about our annual Hispanic Conference on Sept. 13, our Catechist Rally and Commissioning Service on Sept. 20, the beginning of our Catholic school year activities and the ongoing formation of our High School Youth Leadership Team – all activities to encourage and strengthen us as a community of faith in Jesus Christ.

In all of these ways and so much more our families support each other in teaching about Jesus Christ. We share with each other the reason for our hope.

Let me share with you one of the great

reasons for my hope. As I'm writing this letter I'm reflecting on another confirmation that I have celebrated. To see our young men and women, sitting beside sponsors they have chosen to walk with them on life's journey, lifts up my heart with great hope. In the midst of all the busy-ness and activity of young life each one of these members of the Church has chosen to make a public statement of our Catholic faith, and in the Sacrament of Confirmation they receive the gift of the Holy Spirit "just as the Spirit was given to the apostles on the day of Pentecost."

As a bishop, I'm very aware of my humanity and unworthiness to serve as a successor of the apostles. I'm also very aware that in the sacrament it's not my worthiness but it is my trust in Jesus Christ and surrender to His Power that passes on the Holy Spirit. I especially like to refer to an observation that someone made in the Church more than 1,500 years ago when he observed men and women being

baptized, anointed with the sacred oil and being admitted to receive the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ for the first time.

This person observed that it wasn't just the bishop who was presiding over the sacraments, it was Jesus Christ the Good Shepherd who was "branding His sheep." Each time I celebrate confirmation I think about that and surrender to the reality we are proclaiming. Jesus Christ has claimed you and me, and He has promised to be by our side until the end of time. No matter what the worries or concerns that are bothering my soul I know that Jesus Christ is by my side and will fight my battles for me. This is the reason for my great hope.

Thank you for your prayers and support for me as your bishop. May you and your families be blessed this school year and beyond with the hope that lifts our spirits and makes us One Body and One Spirit in Christ.



Let the leaders lead, and think carefully before criticizing

EDITOR'S NOTE: This sermon was written for the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B. Father Kram titled it "Leadership and Discipleship."

One of the main duties and opportunities of every follower of Christ is to serve, that is, to put our goods and our talents to work for the honor and glory of God and for our own well being and that of our we had fellow man.

Not everyone should or can be a leader.

Actually, leadership can be quite a burden. Sometimes we hear that an individual chosen for a position of leadership declines the offer. In one case I know of, a parish organization with a good many members went out of existence because their president was killed in a car wreck and no one else was willing to serve. Yet every organization must have leaders. Without leadership,

we have disorganization, confusion and waste of time and resources.

Since all these things are so, what should our attitude toward our leaders be, and how should we act toward them?

Perhaps a good rule about how to treat our leaders would be to treat them as WE would wish to be treated if WE were in their place. Let's take some examples:

First, let us consider that many of us like to criticize the efforts of others. In fact, criticizing others is sometimes a lot more fun than saying something nice about them. It is almost as though someone else's success is a threat to our own. This is what a jealous attitude can do. Sometimes we are told, "If you can't say something good about someone else, don't say anything." This may not be absolutely correct, but certainly we should be at least as ready to praise and give credit as to find fault.

Let's take another example: Once when I offered free advice to a friend, he said, "Did you ever notice how whenever someone is busy doing something, there are always plenty of people standing around telling him how to do it?"

The next time you are tempted to criticize, first stop and ask yourself, "Is it my place to criticize, and is my criticism necessary and useful?" Then, if it meets all these requirements, make sure it is constructive and not just the kind that finds fault.

Have something better to offer. Just cutting the trees down without planting

new ones in their place soon creates a barren waste.

Another good rule might be: If you are liberal with your advice, also be ready to bear the responsibility in case your advice causes harm. The person who points an accusing finger at his neighbor and says, "I'm telling you, and you better listen," is usually also the one who is nowhere to be found when his advice turns out to be wrong and the harm has been done.

In summary, some are meant to be great and influential leaders. Others are meant to be faithful followers. Whatever our position, our Christian calling is to serve. As a poet once said, "He also serves who only stands and waits."

Lord Jesus, thank you for giving each of us a chance to serve. Help us to find our place and fill it. Grant that our efforts may bear much fruit for your honor and glory and our own mutual well being and happiness Amen.

munity here in Victoria. When I entered, my Sisters made a conscious effort to learn about my culture and to make me feel welcome. Today, through the reunification of our order, we have grown from about 40 sisters to more than 500, many who are in Mexico, Central America and South America. God's providence has woven my culture even more fully into the life of our community.

In my current chaplaincy formation for prison ministry, I was reminded of something important: Language and culture are not the same. We can translate words, but unless we understand the culture, we miss the heart of the

That is why I value times like Hispanic Heritage Month. They encourage us to learn about one another, not only through study, but also through friendship, shared experiences and even food. I think of a content creator, Kerry Mann (@kerrybmann on TikTok), who tries new foods on camera. His first attempt at eating chorizo didn't go so well, but instead of dismissing the feedback he received, he listened, learned how to prepare it properly and discovered how much he enjoyed it. His openness (and the guidance of those who shared their traditions) reminds me of how hospitality and culture go hand in hand.

I've had similar experiences. I remember trying bratwurst and sauerkraut at an Oktoberfest. I wasn't sure I liked it until a German Sister showed me how to eat them together. Suddenly, the flavors came alive. It taught me that sometimes all it takes is someone to share the "how" for us to appreciate something new.

Our Catholic faith is universal. As one of my special priest friends often says, "Our Church is big enough for

everyone." That truth came alive for me when we welcomed Vietnamese Sisters at our convent some years ago. I noticed they would approach Communion with their arms crossed. At first, I thought it was ... interesting. But when I asked, I learned that in their culture this gesture is the highest form of respect; so, they are coming before their God in deep reverence. What I once saw as unusual, I came to recognize as profoundly beautiful.

I think also of elderly Mexican women I have seen walking backwards out of the church during adoration, unwilling to turn their backs on their King and their God. Different gestures; different cultures ... yet all expressing deep love and reverence for the Lord.

Our Church is big enough for everyone, therefore let us, then, make sure everyone feels welcomed at the banquet of the Lord.

Vatican announces theme for 2026 World Day of Peace

"Peace Be With You All: Towards an Unarmed and Disarming Peace" will be the theme for the 2026 World Day of

Peace, the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development announced Aug. 26.

This theme, according to a statement from the Vatican Press Office, "invites humanity to reject the logic of violence and war, to embrace an authentic peace, based on love and justice." The statement continues: "It is a

peace that is unarmed — that is, not based on fear, threats, or weapons; and disarming, because it is capable of dissolving conflicts, opening hearts, and generating trust, empathy, and hope. It is not enough to invoke peace; it must be embodied in a lifestyle that rejects all forms of violence,

visible or structural."

"The greeting of the risen Christ, 'Peace be with you' (cf. Jn 20:19), is an invitation to all — believers, nonbelievers,

political leaders, and citizens — to build the kingdom of God and to construct together a humane and peaceful future," the statement concludes. The World Day of Peace was instituted by Pope Paul VI, who proposed it on Dec. 8, 1967, the solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. The Church first celebrated it on Jan. 1, 1968, the

solemnity of Mary, Mother of God.

The observance came amid the Cold War, the Vietnam War, and other conflicts.





Hispanic ministry office working on many fronts to fulfill needs of Catholics

As he gears up for his next big thing – the fourth Spanish-language Catholic conference for the Diocese of Victoria on Sept. 13, Aldo Camacho is working diligently to bring to the Hispanic community what is lacking in resources for a fuller experience in faith formation.

In a few short years he has created a formation for Hispanic leadership for the parishes who need leaders and had dozens of people completing various stages of formation. He also has begun serving as representative for the Region X Catholic Association of Diocesan Directors of Hispanic Ministry. He represents the multistate region to the national organization.

On the local level, he is helping parishes implement a structured Hispanic ministry and building leaders with a vision and purpose. He said the Hispanic community has been underserved in many ways by not having Spanish language resources and it has meant that many have joined other churches that do have Spanish speakers to provide Bible study and other spiritual enrichment programs. He has now begun to help them implement retreats and formation programs that feed the needs of Hispanic Catholics.

"Each parish will be different," he said, so building relationships to discover the

needs has been one of the most important steps. "The first part is to build community" so they "feel that they belong to the churches."

But on the national level, his input will help give life to the National Pastoral Plan for Hispanic/Latino Ministry developed by the USCCB.

The plan has 10 main "pastoral priorities" including:

- 1. Evangelization And Mission
- 2. Faith Formation And Catechesis
- 3. Pastoral Accompaniment Of Hispanic/Latino Families
 - 4. Youth And Young Adult Ministries
 - 5. Immigration And Advocacy
- 6. Formation For Ministry In A Culturally Diverse Church
- 7. Pastoral Care For Those On The Periphery
 - 8. Liturgy And Spirituality
 - 9. Promotion Of Vocations
 - 10. Catholic Education

Other leaders in the diocese are also being encouraged to be more intentional about reaching out to the Hispanic community. Several attended a retreat/workshop in the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston to gain a better understanding of the chal-





Enrollment at the schools, overall continues to increase. The total enrollment as of Aug. 25 was 2,906 in all of the Catholic schools in the diocese. That's up almost 50 from last year. Some with healthy jumps in enrollment were Holy Cross in Bay City, which has continued to grow for the last several years. In 2022-23, they had 77 students and now are at 137. Nazareth Academy has been gaining about 20 new students each year and currently has an enrollment of 393. St. Philip the Apostle is at max enrollment with some 286 students and a waiting list.

Our Lady of Victory is the largest school and has seen a steady enrollment number. They cut the ribbon on a new junior high facility in the building that was once a mall and now houses the Cathedral Center and other offices.



Visitors to the event will also be able to venerate a relic of Acutis obtained several years ago by the Diocese of Victoria.

Acutis was originally to be canonized on April 27, but the death of Pope Francis on April 21 caused the event to be postponed for a period of mourning and for the conclave that followed. Pope Leo XIV rescheduled the canonization for Sept. 7, when he will also canonize Pier Giorgio Frassati, who, like Acutis, is Italian. How a bad example offers disciples a good lesson

"For the children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light." Luke 16:8

Years ago I made a final walk through of my parent's house scouting for items overlooked as we prepared to sell it. There were the usual suspects – a few coat hangers, some SOS pads under the sink, a screwdriver left in a drawer. But tucked away on a closet shelf was an old, old shoe box left untouched for years and marked with the words: "VALUABLES! DO NOT THROW AWAY!"

Oh what visions I had of its potential bounty: priceless heirlooms or gold coins or maybe stacks of the initial stock certificates in IBM or Apple Corp. Instead, I found two poker chips from a long-since demolished casino, a wad of expired coupons and a half-filled book of S&H Green Stamps. I suspect we all have our versions of those coupons and casino chips ... of items stacked in our attics or stored in our garages that we've saved as "valuable" ... of things in which we invested time and money that are no longer of use. Barring the addiction

of hoarding, giving up a little money and time for these kinds of things and holding on to them past their usefulness is not harmful.

However, when we invest pieces of our soul to buy celebrity or power or toys of success; when we risk the eternal for the temporary, well that's a different matter. Throughout Sacred Scripture there are warnings against placing high value on material goods and human prizes. The question, "What does it profit a man to gain the world but lose his soul?" speaks to the consistent message that material wealth and symbols of success are ultimately meaningless if they come at the cost of one's spiritual, eternal life.

So how then are we to digest the puzzling, surprising and shocking gospel account of the 25th Sunday (Sept. 21st) in which Jesus holds up the cheating Dishonest Steward as a model for a disciple of Christ to follow? What good lesson can be learned from such a bad example?

To set the stage, Jesus has been preaching to a mixed audience. There are some Pharisees and scribes and other nonbelievers whom Jesus refers to as the Children of the World. There are also those claiming some discipleship with Jesus, the Children of the Light. Jesus first offered the parables of the lost sheep, lost coin and the lost son (15th chapter) to impress upon all the listeners the value that God places on all people, even those who have gone astray.

But then "Jesus said to the disciples ...", and spoke directly to those who

claimed allegiance to him. He tells them of a steward who cheated his master and, upon being relieved of his duties, rather than seeking forgiveness or showing remorse devised a scheme to cheat the master even more. The dishonest steward offered the master's debtors relief from their full liabilities hoping to gain favor from them so that when he is no longer employed those he helped would support him.

The steward shrewdly used his master's money to buy the good will of his possible future benefactors. He compounded his initial wrongdoing by stealing even more and by bringing others into scandal. Here we would expect Jesus to launch an attack on the immoral actions of the steward, to illustrate how goodness is distorted when material possession are given highest honor and to admonish all those who seek first the treasures of the world.

Instead we are told: "And the master commended that dishonest steward for acting prudently."

The steward did not receive condemnation, but was granted commendation instead. So what gives? In what way could this bad example of the steward offer a good lesson for you and I?

Begin with this: That steward recognized that he was at a critical time in his life requiring immediate attention. He followed with a self-evaluation and recognized that "I am not strong enough to dig and I am ashamed to beg." He then took prompt action and, while his way was immoral, it was a committed and determined way. That steward knew what he valued and did not let other matters, even the moral and ethical,


interfere with obtaining what he prized.

It is here that Jesus makes a clear observation: The children of the world (like the steward) are more committed to obtaining what they value (the things of earth) than the children of the light are in pursuing what they claim to value (the things of heaven).

The Dishonest Steward was all in, willing to do whatever it took to get what he valued even if his prize would only be imperfect and temporary. How much more committed should a disciple be for what is perfect and everlasting? If the steward can be that determined to get the temporary crumbs of the earth, we disciples should be even more determined to gain the true bread of eternal life.

My friends, despite its appearance, Jesus does not applaud the values of the steward or the means he used to obtain them. Rather, Jesus is giving us a good lesson from a bad example. He is challenging our commitment and dedication in pursuing what we claim to value. That steward took his own self-examination and then took the action to gain what he valued even though it was evil and false and temporary. How much more then should we be committed in the pursuit of the good and true and eternal?

One day, a last walk through our own lives will be taken and the box of our valuables will be opened. Will it contain the remnants of poor investments in the temporary or the dividends from a life lived in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit and a promissory note into eternal life?



God was patient with humanity; we must be, too

One of my professors in college once began class with a passionate presentation on his love for monster truck racing. He had slides, pictures, logical arguments – even stood on his desk raising his voice to win us over. But despite his energy, those who didn't already share his enthusiasm weren't convinced.

Eventually, he revealed his point:
Sometimes this is what evangelization looks like. We try to share Jesus with enthusiasm, arguments, and intensity – but to someone who doesn't know Him, it can feel as strange and un-relatable as a lecture on monster trucks. Just because we love Jesus and the Church doesn't mean others will immediately share our passion. We have to start not with what excites us, but with what the person in front of us needs – and often, that means beginning at the very beginning.

"Gradually and in stages ... " This

phrase was repeated to me over and over again in school to describe how God unfolded His plan of salvation. He started small and He moved slowly. He didn't do it all at once. It began with Abraham and his family. It grew into the nation of Israel. New covenants acted as transition points to include more people in deeper relationship with God, growing and changing with Him for hundreds of years.

All throughout Scripture we see God working with His people, mercifully and patiently, sometimes having to establish additional regulations to correct them, or, like in the example of the prophets, having to send renewed messages of truth to purify distorted ideas and to prepare them for more. Finally, in the fullness of time, God would send His Son. That is to say, God gave us the fullness when we were ready for it; gradually and in stages.

Our approach should mirror His. Faith rarely takes root in one CCD night or a single conversation. Of course, the Lord is capable of doing anything and can work miracles by His grace in an instant. But, normally, He follows the pace of the mustard seed. So if the Lord uses this methodology, what would it look like for us?

The process of meeting a person where they are and helping them take their next step, slowly and patiently, is found most clearly in the catechumenate and the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults. In fact, the Church teaches that the baptismal catechumenate should be the model for all catechesis. Everything we do in the Church to make missionary disciples of Jesus should imitate this process.

Unfortunately, though, OCIA programs are run like an academic course, starting in September and ending at Easter, often structured to answer questions that most people aren't asking with a pre-set list of topics that may or may not meet the needs of the actual people in the room. At least, that's how I've done it.

But in the Church's mind, the OCIA isn't a Catholicism 101 course that someone can take so that, once classes are completed,

they can be awarded the sacraments like a graduating degree. ("I majored in baptism!") The OCIA is an extremely flexible process without a strict timeline involving various periods, or stages, that a person gradually passes through depending on their needs in their relationship with the Lord and His Church. It's a process that prioritizes conversion and spiritual growth and tries to

Imagine if all our catechesis followed this model. What if sacramental preparation programs were not set on a strict timeline but progressed through discernment and dialogue? What if a personal encounter with Christ, an explicit expression of faith, and evidence of conversion were prioritized over mere attendance? What if the OCIA looked like this?

follow God's speed.

But this vision isn't just theory. It is how the Church intends OCIA to be lived, and why she calls it the inspiration for all catechesis. Everything we do to make missionary disciples of Jesus should mirror this patient and gradual approach.

To explore this vision, the Catechetical Department is hosting an OCIA training workshop this October at Holy Family Catholic Church in Wharton, with guest speaker Rita Thiron, director of the Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions and an expert in the OCIA. Thursday, Oct. 23, will be for clergy, and Friday, Oct. 24, for laity.

Of course, I would like to invite all those who are responsible for and assist with OCIA programs to come to the training. But I would also like to invite anyone who is involved in any catechetical ministry, youth faith formation, or sacramental preparation. If our mission is to bring people closer to Christ, then we need to learn from God's own method, walking with people patiently, mercifully, and wisely – gradually and in stages.

Pope appoints auxiliary bishop of Archdiocese San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO — Pope Leo XIV has transferred Auxiliary Bishop Arturo Cepeda, a native of San Antonio, from the Detroit Archdiocese back to the Archdiocese of San Antonio to continue his ministry as an auxiliary bishop, it was announced by the Vatican on August 26.

Bishop Cepeda, 56, will assist Archbishop Gustavo García-Siller, MSpS, and the other auxiliary bishops here in the administration of the archdiocese.

"We are deeply grateful to Pope Leo for appointing Bishop Cepeda as auxiliary bishop for the Archdiocese of San Antonio, and we are similarly grateful to Bishop Cepeda for accepting this new ministry," Archbishop Gustavo said. "We are particularly glad to offer a heartfelt welcome home to Bishop Cepeda. San Antonio is where he grew up and first heard the Lord call Him and nurture his priestly vocation. Having served the Church in the upper Midwest and on numerous committees for the U.S. bishops for the past 14 years, Bishop Cepeda brings back to the Archdiocese of San Antonio valuable perspectives that will assist us in our evangelization efforts to spread the Gospel with missionary zeal."

"With a grateful and eager heart, I give thanks to God, to Pope Leo XIV, and to Archbishop Gustavo García-Siller for calling me to continue my ministry as a joyful disciple of the Gospel here in my home, San Antonio," Bishop Cepeda said. "Filled with hope and faith in Jesus Christ our Lord, I joyfully prepare to serve you. And, as I begin this new mission, I humbly ask you to keep me in your prayers, as I already hold you in mine."

Bishop Cepeda was born on May 15, 1969, in San Luis Potosí, Mexico. He immigrated to the United States with his family at age 19. Bishop Cepeda studied at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas (Anglicum) where he received a licentiate and doctorate of Sacred Theology.

He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of San Antonio on June 1, 1996, at his home parish of St. Mary Magdalen by Archbishop Patricio Flores.

After earning a master's degree in Biblical Theology from St. Mary's University in San Antonio — while assigned as parochial vicar at San Fernando Cathedral — Bishop Cepeda was asked to study at St. Thomas Aquinas "Angelicum," Pontifical University in Rome, where he was awarded a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (STL) and Doctorate in Sacred Theology (STD) degrees, defending his dissertation in Spiritual Theology in 2005.

Upon returning to San Antonio, he fulfilled teaching and formation duties at Assumption Seminary and Oblate School of Theology, served as Vocation director and faculty member for the Transitional Ministry Formation Program for the archdiocese, and was a member of the Formation Faculty of St. Peter upon the Water: A Center for Spiritual Direction and Formation in Ingram. Bishop Cepeda was made vice rector of Assumption Seminary in 2009. In 2010, he was installed as the seminary's rector, serving in that position for a year before being called to be a bishop.

On April 18, 2011, Pope Benedict XVI appointed him auxiliary bishop of Detroit and titular bishop of Tagase. He was consecrated on May 5, 2011, at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Detroit by then-Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron. At the time he was named to the episcopacy he was the youngest bishop in the United States at the age of 41.

On Sunday, Oct. 12, the Archdiocese of San Antonio will officially welcome its newest auxiliary bishop when Bishop Cepeda greets the faithful at San Fernando Cathedral, where he previously served as parochial vicar.

The Archdiocese of San Antonio is comprised of 23,180 square miles and has a total population of 2,798,718, of which 1,148,253, are Catholic.

In a letter inviting the catechists, Bishop Cahill stated, "The ministry of




news of Jesus."

lenges that the Hispanic community and those who minister to them face.

Lydia Whitten, the director of the Office of Youth and Young Adult ministry is one who attended. She said she was impressed by what she perceived as a "deep interior" spiritual life of the leaders and organizers working toward the pastoral goals. "There are people who are working in the church who desperately want to bring

Christ to the world and to that community."

Whitten is non-Hispanic and not a Spanish speaker, but she had a great appreciation for what she took away from the retreat. "I think, for me, it was acknowledging that a lot of people in this diocese that I serve are coming from Hispanic backgrounds, and that's an important part of their story," Whitten said. "Even for the young people who might not speak Spanish, it might be more difficult for them to come to events because their parents may not be proficient at English. It was eye-opening. You really do have to think about

their family culture is like." She said it has make her more mindful about understanding those with whom she wants to communicate. She is also going to participate in the upcoming Conference.
