and because of a COVID related delay we have. As a result, it seems more difficult to make our CSA target this year. Please help us if you can. Of course, any shortfall from our goal is paid from our own parish funds.

I spoke with a couple of representatives from the Catholic Cemetery Association. As more people are choosing the option of cremation, we investigating the possibility of providing more niches for cremated remains on Grosse Ile. At this point There is very limited space left in the memorial garden. In the coming weeks, I'll meet with representatives with the Catholic Cemetery Association on the parish grounds, with members of our Finance committee to discuss possibilities further. You may also have the opportunity to participate in a parish survey on the subject. I'll keep you posted about any plans.

I mentioned the idea of using some of our classroom space for day care or preschool for people on Grosse Ile, and environs. This is still a possibility. As St. Joseph school enrollment continues to grow, we are looking at various ways of providing more space for parents who want their children to receive a Catholic education. I was a pastor in Monroe about 10 years ago when we founded the Monroe Catholic Elementary School system, which is still providing a Catholic education in Monroe County to this day. I'll be meeting with their early childhood educational leaders to learn from them about how we can do a better job of providing for the needs of our parents and families.

This past weekend saw fall events such as Family Catechesis and the Blessing of Animals take place. It's not too early to bring in photos of your loved ones who have died to place them around the altar. As we come into this season of Thanksgiving, I am grateful for each and every one of you! May God continue to inspire to share the blessings of faith we have received.



### "Lead us not into temptation ..."

No one is exempt from temptation. Being enticed by the attractions of this world is part of our human condition, but successfully fighting it makes us stronger and

holier.
Watch for it.
Temptation
strikes when we are least able to fight it.
Identify what tempts you most and try to anticipate when you are weakest. Then devise a plan of action – not just a resolution – to help you

resist.

Pray through it. When Jesus caught
His disciples sleeping in the garden
instead of praying, He said, "Watch

and pray that you may not undergo the test" (Matthew 26:41). Overcome temptation by being alert to it and praying instead of indulging in it.

Run from it.

Sometimes fleeing temptation is the best way to resist it. "God is faithful, and IIe will not let you be tempted beyond your strength, but with the temptation will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it" (1 Corinthians 10:13). Avoid people, places or situations that give you trouble.

Don't start it. It is easier to resist temptation if you stop it when it starts. Then it won't have the force of habit. Though it is never too late to ask for God's help, the longer you live with the temptation, the harder it will be to turn to Him.



# Why do Catholics turn to Mary?

In Old Testament kingdoms, the queen mother played a significant role in her son's governance of His kingdom. Her power and authority flowed from her position as it related to her son.



His subjects often petitioned her to speak for them. As Queen Mother of Heaven, Mary's purpose is to further her Son's kingdom. When we turn to her, she acts with her authority to bring our concerns to her Son, and He is always inclined to fulfill her wishes.

### God's love never changes

It's only human to want to be loved. Unfortunately, even the best friend or lover will let us down once in a while. That can leave us lonely or searching for the wrong kind of love. Fortunately, God will never let us down. His love is the right kind of love to have.

## from Scripture

### Mark 12:28-34 – The first Commandment

The Jewish authorities often tried to draw Jesus out and get Him to say something counter to Jewish law. That way He could be discredited – or worse. Yet, the strategy never worked for them. In fact, one of the scribes was so impressed by Jesus' response to a challenge by the Sadducees that he posed a question of

The scribe asked which of the commandments was most important. Jesus said everything starts and ends with love – love of God and love of each other. To love God is to

his own. He sincerely wanted

to learn from Jesus' answer.

love one another. They are as inseparable as the beams of the cross. While it is easy to love God, loving others is more difficult.

But true love of neighbor is measured by how we treat those who are neither family nor friends. It means including people when the natural inclination is to exclude or avoid them. Jesus loved prostitutes, thieves, lepers, even His political

enemies. This is how God loves and He calls us to do no less.



In October we celebrate the Rosary especially on the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7th. The Rosary helps us to meditate on Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection.

October 6 – St. Bruno (1101). Bruno was born in Germany, studied in France and became a theology professor. With six other companions, Bruno founded the Carthusian Order in 1084 and helped reform the clergy in Rome.

October 14 – St. Callistus I (222). A Roman slave, Callistus obtained his freedom and was ordained a deacon by Pope Zephyrinius, whom he later succeeded. Callistus's election caused an eighteen-year schism, spawning the first anti-pope. In a time of trial and confusion, he reopened the Church to all. He was martyred in Rome.

October 20 – St. Paul of the Cross (1775). Paul was inspired by a vision to start a religious order dedicated to the Passion of Christ.

He founded the Passionists in 1720, lived a penitential life, worked miracles, and cared for the poor and sick.



# Q Why is a& Catholic FuneralA important?

Although no one enjoys dwelling on death, most of us will mourn and bury loved ones in our lifetimes. Friends may counsel us to skip the church funeral and just "get it over with," but our faith

provides the strength we need to deal with death.
The Church has created Rites to help us face the difficulties and reality of death.

Every baptized Catholic has a right to a Catholic funeral. The Rites of a Catholic Funeral include Prayers after Death, Prayers in the Presence of the Body, the Scripture Prayer Service at the Wake, the Funeral at Church (with or without Mass), and the Internment Prayer Service at the cemetery. Together these services not only make up the total Catholic Funeral Service, but also provide the Church's special prayers for the deceased. The Rites also support families and friends who are grieving for their loved one.

Catholics are entitled to a Catholic Funeral whether they are frequent or infrequent Mass attendees. (For specific questions, check with your local parish.)
