## FR. CRAIG'S CONTEMPLATIONS

### Solemnity of Christ the King

As we prepare for the gift of the Holiday, Thanksgiving. We first conclude our Liturgical year, "year c" with the great Solemnity, Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. How fitting, as we prepare to be with family, and friends and give Thanks. We first, in prayer, pause and acknowledge, Jesus Christ as our King. This great solemnity is traced back to the papacy of Pope Pius XI. Jesus re-educates us, as to how to "define" a King. Through the lens of St. Luke, Jesus' kingship is shown at the moment of His crucifixion. As Pope Emeritus – Benedict XVI reminds us, "precisely on the cross, Jesus is exalted at the very 'height' of God who is love. It is there that he can be 'known.' Jesus gives us life because He gives us God. He can give God because He Himself is one with God. From the One who 'is before all things, and in Him, all things hold together."

The Cross is a sign of both mystery and victory, and from the altar of the Cross Jesus shows us the power of His love, that through the key of the Cross the gates of heaven are open, and this is how we can give thanks in faith, on this Solemnity of Jesus Christ the King of the Universe.

Our king hangs on a cross. Onlookers saw this as the final defeat of a fool who many saw as an insurrectionist. They laughed at him and challenged his kingship by looking for proof: Save yourself! Historically, earthly kings are influential figures wielding significant power over the quality of their subjects' lives. Where is Jesus' power? Slowly fading away, he's a failure in many eyes. Brokenness and vulnerability are often seen as failures. Something went wrong and exposed us, revealing our fragile and sometimes incorrect selves to others. Yet, what appears at first to be shameful is really a golden key to life. It is only when vulnerable that we learn how to love genuinely. Marking what seems the end of a failed mission, Jesus Christ our King hangs before us as the vulnerable, wounded key to God's infinite love and life. The kingdoms of this world pass away. Jesus hangs as our king of a world that never ends. When we are vulnerable and broken in death, we fall into the fullness of Christ and are made one with him. This is more than any earthly king can promise and is the salvation we seek.

## READING REFLECTIONS

### First Reading:

The Israelites recognized that David was anointed by the Lord to shepherd and rule over them as their King. What do you think it takes to be a really good leader?

### Second Reading:

Paul teaches the Colossians that through the death and resurrection of Christ, God has redeemed and reconciled all of us and creation, and "transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son." How should we celebrate this incredible gift from God?

### Gospel:

While the rulers and soldiers ironically mocked Jesus as "King of the Jews" as they were crucifying him, Jesus offered words of comfort to the repentant criminal crucified beside him. What words of comfort do you need to hear today from our Lord Jesus Christ?

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas.

Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days.

Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.

## EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

### Is Christ King in Our Hearts?

When you think of a king, who is the first person to pop into your head? It may depend on how much history you know, or which historical period intrigues you the most. As Americans, the first person we might think of is King George III, whose reign has become synonymous in our national lore with the concept of tyranny.

We don't have much familiarity with kingship in modern American society. Kings tend to make us uneasy. Presidents, on the other hand — we can handle those because we know we are a president's boss. No matter how much power he has, we are the electorate. We are the source of that power. We're comfortable with this arrangement.

But with kings, it is profoundly different. Traditionally, the king derives his power from God. His rule bridges humanity with the divine.

We should reflect carefully on whether or not we have made Jesus Christ king in our hearts, or whether we regard him as a president. The difference isn't just one of titles, it's one of roles. Subjects do not demand anything of a king. They beseech. They entreat. They submit, and they accept.

Do we demand of Christ, or do we beseech? Do we tolerate God's edicts with grumbling, or do we embrace His word as the means of our reconciliation with Him?

The "good thief" treated Christ as a king. His counterpart treated him as a president. And it's worth remembering that Jesus Christ is not the President of the Universe.

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### Assumption

#### Question:

The Assumption isn't in the Bible. What proof do we have that it really happened?

#### Answer:

Since the beginning of the Church, Christians have venerated the relics of the saints. We can see this in the catacombs of Rome, in the crypts of churches, and in the reliquaries that contain tiny fragments of bone. Throughout Church history, there have been no relics of Mary nor any legitimate claims to her bones. Even the tomb of Mary, visited as a site of pilgrimage, stood empty. At the Council of Chalcedon in 451, the Roman emperor asked the bishop of Jerusalem to bring Mary's relics to the council. The bishop reported that there were no relics of Mary. Upon finding her empty tomb, the Apostles had concluded that her body was taken up into heaven. Soon afterward, the Church began celebrating this miraculous event. The Assumption is an article of faith. Within the context of salvation, its meaning and logic is clear. Being born without original sin, Mary did not suffer its consequences. She is already participating in what we, too, will experience one day — the resurrection and glorification of our bodies as they reunite with our souls.



