Thoughts from Fr. John

October 08, 2023

Our Sunday readings have employed the parables concerning the Lord's vineyard and workers three weeks in a row. Overall, Jesus has challenged us (his audiences) to self-check our (mis)perceptions about the compensation for any service in the Lord's vineyard, our attitudes toward doing God's will, and how to express our gratitude with the fruits of our labor.

Therefore, it is a suitable time to thank our "laborers/gardeners" who worked with St. Anne's Flower Garden Ministry. Of course, let's not forget Joe from Wojo's for generously donating flowers yearly. Our gardeners also want to extend their invitation to whoever is willing to help clean up the flower beds on Tuesday morning (Oct. 17th; in case of rain, it will be on Wednesday, Oct. 18th). We are so grateful that they gave us a beautiful courtyard and delighted our hearts before entering the house of the Lord.

Inside the church, we are preparing our Mass Stewards (sacristans), Lectors, and Extraordinary Ministers of the Holy Communion to be (re)commissioned on Tuesday Evening (also Oct. 17th). The rite of commissioning liturgical ministers acknowledges ministers for their dedicated services. Moreover, the rites are meant to convey our gratitude for their services and to pray over them for God's blessing.

Finally, we are ready to have a Sunday Mass (10:30 a.m.) dedicated to our Youth Group on October 15th. The Mass is to encourage our youth to step into the services of the Church. Hopefully, it will increase the awareness of our youth and support them for the well-being of our parish family.

Shoeboxes for Appalachia

Each year we create Christmas treasure boxes for people living in the Appalachian 'hollers', the rural areas around Vansant, Virginia. Some students make up an entire shoe box themselves, others make this a family project, packing up one or more shoe boxes.

Mr. Carl Roos of St. Rita Church in Holly then loads the gifts into his trailer, starting out for Virginia and heading to the mountains before Thanksgiving.

How can you send some happiness to the 'Holler'?

- -Wrap an empty shoe box, any size, with Christmas wrapping paper
- -The lid must be wrapped separately and the box has to remain unsealed.
- -Each shoe box is made for a specific age or person, for example: a seven-year-old boy, or an infant, an adult woman
- -Get creative and create a theme for your special person's box! For example, a teenage girl might enjoy a box filled with makeup, nail polish and special toiletries!

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIPThe Gift that Gives Back

It never ceases to amaze me how often I fall into the trap and end up grumbling about the greatest gifts in my life. A husband, children, a life that is full almost to bursting: these are things for which I once begged God. These are the jewels in the crown of my life.

Oh, but the children need care. Constant care. And a husband — a real flesh-and-blood creation of God, entrusted to me by God, to help me be holy and relying on me for holiness in turn — well, that relationship is a lot of work, isn't it? And a "full life" — I laugh to think of it, and then I blush with shame, because I admit sometimes, I do yearn for a life that is a little less ... full. A full life can leave you awfully tired at the end of the day.

I would imagine it's the same for everyone, no matter your life circumstances or vocation. Your greatest blessings are also those things that require much of you, more than you imagined you would ever be asked to give. The biggest jewels make the crown heavy.

But if we had any of these gifts without the effort it takes to maintain them, would they be half as sweet?

In this same way, the work of the vineyard is opened to us through baptism; we are given the chance to produce fruit for the kingdom. It's a chance we never dared to dream would be given to us.

It's a gift. But just like with any gift worth having, it requires effort. Upkeep. Work.

It requires that we give in return. And it's the giving that somehow, mystically, transforms us. It's the giving that turns into the gift itself.



Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question: How can a priest counsel people about marriage when he has never been married?

Answer: If a marriage counselor is in a bad marriage does that mean that he or she will be a bad counselor? If one's counseling ability depended upon first-hand experience, would that require counselors to be perfect before they can help others? Obviously not. Some of the skills necessary to help others come out of personal life experience. But you don't need personal, first-hand experience in order to understand something. We would not think that a doctor, who is an oncologist, would not be able to treat cancer because he himself has never been sick. We also would not expect every doctor to treat cancer. It is the same with priests.

Essentially marriage is a relationship and we've all been involved in different kinds of relationships: in our family, with our friends, and with God. And so counseling people about marriage is really helping them to look at the issues that really are part of their relationship, finding ways to better understand themselves in relationship to one another and in relationship to God. In many ways, a priest's training, background, and experience, as well as his personal knowledge of many different relationships in families and couples, gives him a broad background from which to draw upon.
