FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three traditional disciplines of Lent. The faithful and catechumens should undertake these practices seriously in a spirit of penance and of preparation for Baptism or of renewal of Baptism at Easter. (Code of Canon Law, 1249-1252)

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17, and Good Friday, April 2, are days of fast and abstinence.

Fridays of Lent are also days of abstinence. Fasting is to be observed by all eighteen years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their sixtieth birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all fourteen years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

BLESSED PALM BRANCHES AT YOUR HOUSE...

Please bring last year's Palm Sunday palms to SJV and place them in the basket in the vestibule; they will be burned in this year's Easter fire.

LENT BONA OPERA 2021

*The writing of a Lenten “Bona Opera” (Good Works) Covenant is an ancient practice of the Church. It helps us to be mindful, prayerful and accountable in keeping our observance of Lent. In your Bona Opera this year, I encourage you to commit yourself to three things (and **only** three things) ... more fervent and increased participation in parish Lenten devotions and the sacraments; help those in need around you; and sacrifice something that’s going to be hard. The Bona Opera is your offering to God. Keep it with you when you pray, and especially when you come to Mass. I invite you once again to join me in writing your own Bona Opera for Lent 2021. It’s a great way to prepare for Ash Wednesday and the rest of Lent!*



Pope Francis's latest Encyclical takes up the topic of fraternal love, social friendship, solidarity, and human dignity, important values of the Gospel, which unite and hold the world together. The study group will continue reading and discussing this outline for a better world.

The encyclical is made up of eight chapters and we will discuss one chapter each session. All in the parish are invited to join, and might also consider becoming a chapter facilitator and leading the discussion for that week.

At Home with Faith

Jesus calls us to care for the sick — not just for their good, but for ours as well. Even if we feel healthy, all of us need the healing touch of Jesus.



In this weekend's readings, we hear about the way people were treated when they caught leprosy. They had to live apart from others to keep everyone else safe. Not only were they sick, but they were also left to suffer away from the community.

When Jesus heals the leper, he is doing more than just healing the body. He is also blessing him with the ability to return to his family and community.

A special note: This weekend marks the anniversary of At Home with Faith. We launched this weekly resource as a way to help families work around the limitations caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Let us be thankful for the ways that God offers us healing during this time, so that we can continue to be together in spirit until we can all meet again.

At Home with Faith

Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family.

Help your child become more aware of their need for healing:

- **Ask your child about different ways we can be sick.** See what comes to mind for them beyond just the coronavirus or the cold. Maybe they have a friend who was hurt in sports, or they know someone who suffers from a serious illness. Let them share observations.
- **Let them know about some illnesses are harder to see.** Tell them about how some people deal with conditions that are harder to see, like mental illness or addiction. Encourage them to see the connection between these forms of illness.
- **Ask if they have ideas about how to help those who suffer from being sick.** Let them explore ways that we can support those who are sick. Encourage them to think about ways that we can make those who might feel excluded like the leper in the Gospel feel included in our community.
- **Encourage them to turn to Jesus for help when they feel sick in any way.** Let them know about how you yourself have prayed for help during times when you were sick, or when you prayed for someone else who was sick. Help them to see that Jesus is always caring for the sick in one way or another, even if it's hard for us to see.



Leprosy is not a very common illness today, but many other forms of sickness afflict us still. Sickness doesn't just cause pain. It takes away our ability to do what we want. It makes us feel powerless. It makes us feel separated from those who are well. It also reminds us that, one day, we will die.

Jesus didn't just heal the sick by himself. He also called the disciples to do the same. In healing the sick, we express our love for them and welcome them back to community. It also helps us remember that we are all in need of Jesus' healing.

Take a moment to talk with your children about different ways that humans can feel vulnerable because of things like mobility limitations, sickness, developmental disabilities, addiction, and others. Remind them that we need to be in solidarity with those who are vulnerable, knowing how we share the need for healing from Jesus.

St. Damien of Moloka'i

St. Damien of Moloka'i (Josef de Veuster) was a Belgian missionary who spent over 20 years living among the leprosy patients who were quarantined on the island of Moloka'i. Not only did he care for their spiritual needs as their pastor, he also built a community for them and tended to their physical injuries, until his death at the age of 49.
