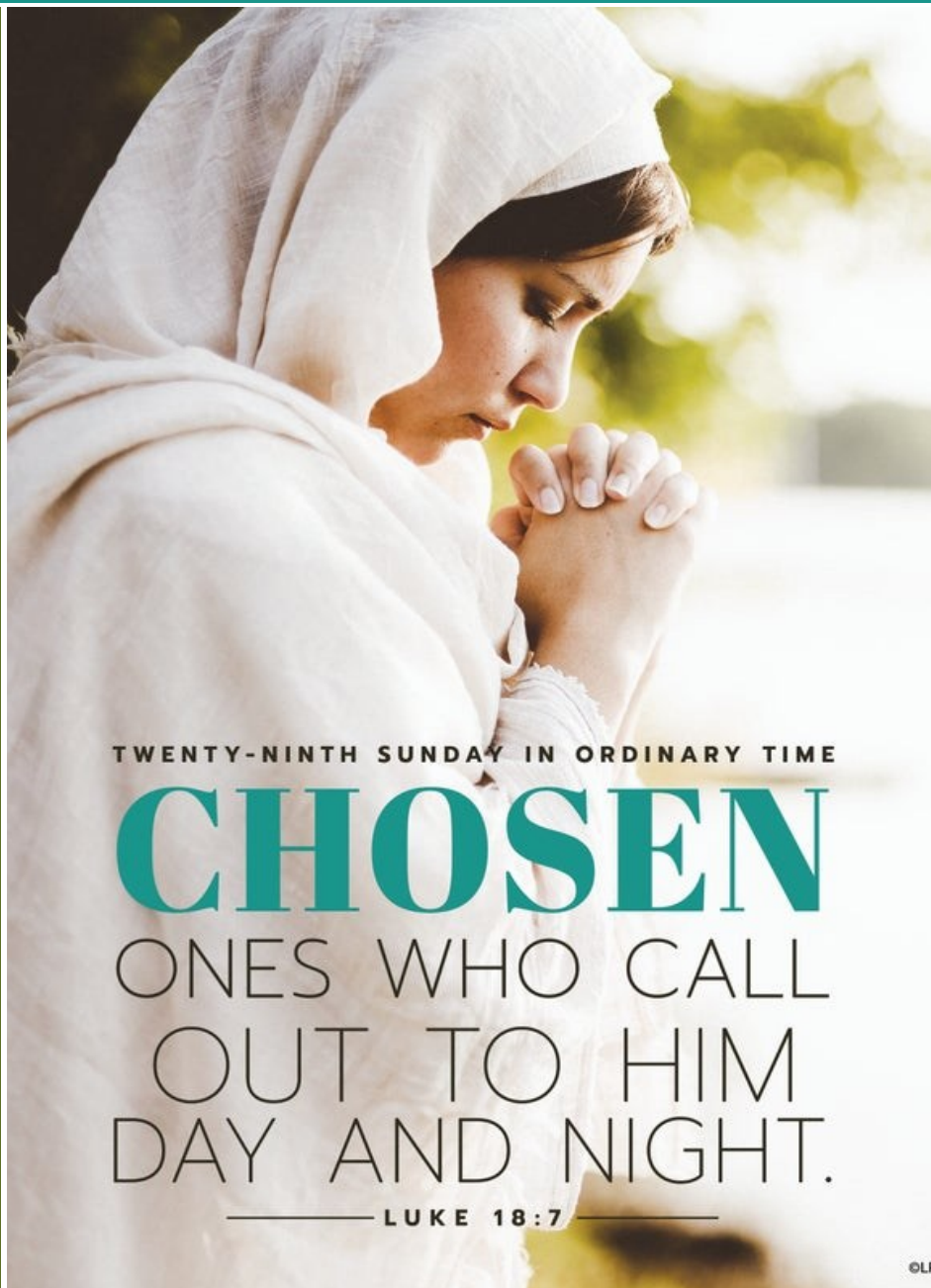

INFORMATION DIRECTORY AT ST. RITA

Baptism. Infant Baptisms at St. Rita Parish are generally celebrated on the last Sunday of the month during the Sunday Masses. For inquiries on the baptism classes and other procedures, contact John Johnson at john.johnson@archdpdx.org. Baptism classes are available in English & Spanish.

Marriage. A minimum of six months is needed for the marriage preparation. Couple needs to contact Fr. Tetzl for the initial marriage interview. Marriage classes are available in English & Spanish.

MEDITACIÓN DEL EVANGELIO

XXIX Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

La forma de actuar de Dios es muy diferente a la nuestra. A veces, con nuestras súplicas, queremos moldear a nuestro modo el actuar de Dios. Es por eso que muchas veces se pierde la esperanza: porque deseamos que las cosas sucedan cuando queremos y como queremos. Sin embargo, la Palabra de Dios nos invita a ser perseverantes en la oración: *"Predica la Palabra, insiste a tiempo y a destiempo, corrige, reprende y exhorta con toda paciencia y doctrina"* (2 Timoteo 4:2).

En lo que respecta a la injusticia, se necesita una tenacidad descomunal; es decir, no desmayar ante las adversidades, como lo demuestran los personajes de la parábola de hoy. San Efrén (306–373), en su Comentario al Diatesarón, escribe: "De hecho, la perseverancia de la viuda humilló la iniquidad del juez rebelde a Dios y la insolencia arrogante contra los hombres. La voluntad de la viuda las sometió, y de esta manera pudo encontrar justicia ante su adversario. La oración inoportuna transformó las dos ramas amargas para que dieran frutos dulces, ajenos a su naturaleza... El fruto de la justicia es la correcta atribución de los oprimidos, y el fruto de la bondad es el consuelo de los afligidos". Oremos hoy por todas las personas que buscan justicia, luchando día a día hasta encontrarla. Tengamos la seguridad de que Dios, en su infinita bondad, escucha sus ruegos, porque Él es justo y su misericordia no tiene límites.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A little boy once asked his grandmother: "Grandma, why do you keep praying every day? Doesn't God already know what you need?" The wise grandmother smiled and replied: "Yes, child, God knows. But prayer isn't about informing God—it's about transforming me."

Today's readings invite us into that same truth: prayer is the breath of our faith, the strength of our perseverance, and the anchor of our hope.

Gospel (Luke 18:1–8)

Jesus tells us a parable about a persistent widow who kept pleading for justice from a judge who "neither feared God nor respected man." Her persistence finally wore down the unjust judge, who granted her request just to get her off his back.

If such a corrupt man could be moved by persistence, how much more will our loving Father respond to His children who cry out to Him day and night?

Jesus concludes with a sobering question: "When the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on earth?" (Lk 18:8). The parable is not simply about getting what we want, but about persevering in faith until the end, never losing heart in prayer.

First Reading (Exodus 17:8–13): Moses raises his hands in prayer as Israel battles Amalek. When his arms grow weary, Aaron and Hur support him. As long as his hands remain raised in prayer, Israel prevails. This teaches us that victory in life's struggles depends on unceasing prayer and the support of the faith community.

Second Reading (2 Timothy 3:14–4:2): Paul urges Timothy to remain steadfast in the Scriptures and to "proclaim the word, be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient." The perseverance in teaching mirrors the perseverance in prayer.

Together, the readings show us: prayer sustains us in our battles, Scripture strengthens our faith, and persistence keeps us united with God's will.

· St. Monica prayed for over 20 years for the conversion of her son Augustine. Her perseverance bore fruit beyond her imagination—Augustine became a great saint and Doctor of the Church.

· Mother Teresa of Calcutta spent hours daily in prayer before serving the poorest of the poor. She often said, "I cannot spend one day without prayer."

Application to Our Life

Like Moses, our arms often grow tired. We grow weary when prayers seem unanswered, when family struggles persist, when illness continues, when injustice seems to prevail. Yet Jesus tells us today: "Do not lose heart."

· When a parent keeps praying for a wayward child.

· When a sick person clings to prayer despite pain.

· When families pray the Rosary together, even amid busy lives. These are modern signs of faith Jesus seeks when He returns.

Prayer is not about changing God's mind but about changing our hearts, giving us endurance and hope.

Conclusion & Take-Home Points

Today, we are reminded that faith lives or dies through prayer.

Prayer is our weapon, our shield, and our hope. The readings unite in one voice: Pray without ceasing, persevere in faith, trust in God's Word.

Three points to take home:

1. Prayer is persistence – Like the widow, never give up; God hears every prayer.

2. Prayer is power – Like Moses' uplifted arms, prayer brings strength and victory in life's battles.

3. Prayer is faith – It keeps us rooted in God until Christ returns, so that He will indeed find faith on earth.

Let us pray today for the grace of perseverance, so that we may never lose heart but always remain faithful in prayer.
