

It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have

a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother But this answer fails to get to the heart of herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

> Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

In revealing his mysterious name, YHWH ("I AM HE WHO IS", "I AM WHO AM" or "I AM WHO I AM"), God says who he is and by what name he is to be called. This divine name is mysterious just as God is mystery. It is at once a name revealed and something like the refusal of a name, and hence it better expresses God as what he is - infinitely above everything that we can understand or say: he is the "hidden God", his name is ineffable, and he is the God who makes himself close to men. 

Hence, we must use our gifts er as "Woman," the term was equivalent to build up, protect and nourish the ties to our word "lady," and was not offensive. It was, in fact, a term of respect and Jesus used the same word in addressing Mary from the cross. By calling her "woman," Our Lord is linking the Blessed Virgin Mary to Eve. In Genesis, God revealed that the seed of the woman would defeat the demonic serpent. I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise His heel. (Gn 3:15). In the same way when Jesus asked Mary, "What is it to Me. and to you?" He was probably implying, "We are guests, and we are not expected to supply the things needed at the feast." Jesus further protested, "My hour has not yet come." The "hour" of Jesus includes the Passion, death, Resurrection and Ascension taken as one great event. In spite of Jesus' detachment from the problem, Mary instructs the waiters, "Do whatever He tells you, "Thus showing Faith that her Son would do what the newlyweds and their families really needed. The Church uses the account of this miracle to remind us that, by virtue of her position as the mother of God and our Heavenly Mother, Mary's intercession for us with

God has great power. Therefore, our families and spouses need Jesus and Mary when the family relationship becomes boring, raising the children becomes a burden and parents become a burden to their children. The awareness of the presence of Jesus and Mary in the family will encourage parents to create an atmosphere of prayer, Bible-reading, mutual love and respect, with a spirit of forgiveness and sacrificial service at home. Weekly Reflection from Priests for Life

God, our Spouse and Lord of Life

"As a bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall your God rejoice in you." Today's first reading from Isaiah shows us how much God delights in human life. He rejoices in us as in a bride. He gives himself to us as a bridegroom is called to do for his beloved. He protects and defends us, and leads us to the life that never ends. His commitment to humanity is the source of ours. Like him, we are to give ourselves for the good of others, starting with the most vulnerable lives — children at the very beginning of their development in the womb.
