"The bread that I give is my flesh for the life of the world."

If you have ever watched the EWTN Catholic program, *The Journey Home*, hosted by Marcus Grodi, you will hear of conversion stories to the Catholic Faith. These converts come from varied religious backgrounds and many were even ministers in another denomination, but almost to a person, they entered into the Catholic Church for one reason: to receive the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. As much as they tried to give the Eucharistic discourse of John's Gospel a "symbolic" read, they could not ignore its direct and concrete language: "The bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." This passage, and others like it, led them to a belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist and then an embrace of the Catholic Church. Converts to the Faith invite all of us "cradle Catholics" to ask: "How deep is my faith in the Holy Eucharist? How deep is my devotion to this Bread of Life?" When Jesus requests the honor of our presence at the sacred banquet of the Holy Mass, celebrated in His name, do we respond with great joy and gratitude?

Second, and closely related to this, we should not lose sight of the fact that great good can come from suffering. Many sinners have been transformed into saints through physical suffering, such as Saint Francis of Assisi and Saint Ignatius of Loyola. For all Christians, suffering is an opportunity to ponder more deeply the great gift that Jesus Christ gave us through His suffering and death. Our Lord refused to escape the suffering and agony of His death by crucifixion. We need to ask Jesus for the strength to witness to Him to the very end of life, including the great witness of carrying *our* cross of suffering. The suffering of Jesus removes the stigma attached to suffering and shows that suffering has purpose and meaning. Jesus Christ's sufferings won for us the gift of salvation; our sufferings, united to His, can bring about our personal salvation and the salvation of those whom we love, if we generously offer our sufferings up to the Lord on their behalf.

Lastly, by serving those who bear the Cross of Jesus Christ in their sufferings, we are the ones who benefit. Our world would be impoverished if we did not have suffering people in our midst, for they teach us the fundamental Christian virtues. Their patience, fortitude, courage, joy, hope, et. al. in the midst of great suffering imparts understanding of these essential Christian virtues in a way no catechism can. They are our teachers in the ways of Faith; we would be lost without them. In addition, those who suffer and die before our eyes teach us how to die with Christ, for some day, we will have to walk this same path. By their holy example, they show us the beauty of Christian death and take from us any fears we may have as we approach our death. We are grateful, for they reveal to us that death is not an enemy, but a dear friend, taking us home to the Lord.

With this understanding of death and dying from a Christian perspective, we see the intrinsic evils of the contemporary euthanasia movement. It even rejects the ordinary means of sustaining life, such as feeding tubes (when the body can still digest food); iv's for fluids; and the temporary use of a respirator. To omit these, even in the name of mercy, is an act of murder, for these measures can offer hope of recovery. We simply cannot do what we want with our bodies, because our bodies are not our own. They are gifts from God; we are mere stewards of our bodies. We therefore should seek not what we want, but what God wants. God does not want us to kill innocent human beings, ourselves or others. This contradicts His commandments and the Gospel of Life. Through Baptism, a person is made a temple of the Holy Spirit and deserves the full reverence a temple demands.

The time is here

In last week's bulletin, there was a contradiction: I asked that you offer input on the new Mass schedule by August 10th so that we could begin this new schedule by the start of the new school year. The problem is that I also needed to announce this new schedule by this weekend at our Masses, because next weekend's Mass schedule would be the one <u>before</u> the start of the new school year. To make a long story short, the new school year snuck up on me. Maybe it was from a lack of nourishment and the resulting diminished brain power, due to

a low number of German dough dishes that came to me this week (hint, hint), but it is what it is. So, I will offer our new schedule in this bulletin and at the pulpit this weekend (August 7th/8th). The past few days have seen few additional inputs on the new schedule, so perhaps it is a sign that it is time. The new Mass schedule is as follows: Saturday Vigil Mass (4:00 p.m. at Sacred Heart/6:30 p.m. at Saint Ann's) and Sunday Morning Mass (8:30 a.m. at Saint Ann's/10:30 a.m. at Sacred Heart). In formulating the new schedule, I pondered your feedback; considered the needs of the elderly and the young; considered the concern about the rising and setting of the sun throughout the year; and took into account the needs of the three parishes in our cluster. I know no parish got the perfect schedule and even members of families have varying opinions on what the perfect schedule should be. But, lets give it a chance and know that making sacrifices for attending weekend Mass unites us to the great Sacrifice of Calvary that we celebrate at every Holy Mass.

Help wanted

At both parishes, we are still in need of teachers and subs for the upcoming CCD year. As I look at the current list of teachers, I realize that at Sacred Heart and at Saint Ann's, the only men teaching are the clergy: Deacon Lance and Father Gary. Why is it that women are normally the ones who pass on the Faith to our young people? What message does this send to young men: faith is women's work. It's no wonder that the number of men who don't worship in the Church after graduation is much higher than the corresponding number of women. Men . . . it's time to step up to the plate. If you have time for hunting, fishing, shooting pool, etc. then you have time to teach the Faith to the next generation. Please contact Fr. Gary if you can help teach CCD; if you can be a substitute teacher; or if you could serve as a coteacher (teaching on certain weeks of the month). To sweeten the deal, how about this: any guy who teaches CCD gets their own reserved pew in the front of the church. How can you pass up this amazing offer!
