***“Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things.”*** A father was talking with his son’s teacher. Suddenly, he began to sob, saying, “I don’t live with my son, but I love him.” Regaining his composure, he explained that his wife had left him. He was a contractor, who often worked 18-hour days. He said, “I wanted my family to have all the things that I never had. But I got so involved with my work that I forgot about what they wanted most: a father who was there when they needed his love and support.” Perhaps we need to evaluate our lives: am I so involved in working to buy things that I’m forgetting more precious things---things money can’t buy? We might want to measure wealth not by the things we have, but by the things we have for which we would not take money.

### **Ecclesiology, the role of the Church in salvation. *“What is ecumenism?”***

In parish assignments, I have had good relations with the Protestant pastors in town. I have gotten together with them for prayer sessions and fellowship afterwards; I have joined them in meeting the social needs of our communities (soup kitchens, food pantries, etc.); and I often visit them in their homes for a meal and have them over to my rectory for a meal as well. All of these endeavors are the fruit of ecumenism, the Christian movement which seeks respect for fellow Christians and hopefully the reunion of separated Christian churches and ecclesial communities. To Catholics today, ecumenism seems so commonplace and is a welcome reality. This was not the case in the not-so-distant past.

If my German-Russian Catholic grandmothers were alive and knew of my ecumenical endeavors, they would probably give me a good thrashing! In their day, you never associated with Protestants, not even for their weddings and funerals. If your child married a Protestant or became one, he or she was essentially dead to the family. This was the way it was and if you ask Protestants who grew up in that era as well, the standoffishness was the same in regards to Catholics. Christians of different denominations simply lived in their own little worlds and seldom did these worlds overlap. How sad to see such division among the family of God’s children. Thank God for the Christian charity associated with the ecumenical movement. But now our age has its own problems: has the pendulum swung too far the other way? In our desire to be one, have we denied the differences with regard to

the essential truths of salvation, which cannot be simply glossed over? It is necessary to reclaim what ecumenism is and how it should be lived as Catholics.

The foundation of the modern ecumenical movement began within the Protestant ecclesial communities at the World Conference of the Mission in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1910. The Catholic Church was not involved at that time and was hesitant to join in the ecumenical movement, for fear of “granting rights to heresy.” But in time, the Catholic Church became a prominent figure in the ecumenical movement, especially through the efforts of Pope Saint John XXIII. He was an affable person and reached out to Protestant Christians and non-Christians with gestures of mutual respect and kindness. Once the Chief Rabbi of Rome was invited by John XXIII to the Vatican and he asked the pope, “How shall I address you?” John XXIII just smiled and said, “Call me your brother.” The spirit of good will continued in the Second Vatican Council, called into session by John XXIII.
