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From the Pastor's Desk

"Strike the Rock"

Whenever we think of getting water it's often from a source like a lake or a river or a well or a faucet. However, when the Israelites were thirsty as they wandered through the desert the Lord told Moses to, "Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink" (Exodus 17:6). Getting water from a rock is like getting honey from a lemon or snow from a

volcano or fire from an ice cube! In other words, it's not the first place that we think of for getting something to drink. And yet this moment in salvation history was a reminder that God heard the complaints of His people and knew their needs when they were parched. Within the Gospel for the Third Sunday of Lent (John 4:5-42) there was a powerful encounter between Jesus and a person who was thirsting.

The Samaritan woman at the well had experienced a great deal of suffering and hardship and seemingly a fair amount of shame in her life. Her presence at the well in the middle of the day (when the sun would have been at its hottest) indicates that she wanted to avoid people. However, in God's Providential Plan, the "Rock of Salvation" — that is to say Jesus Christ — was waiting for her at the well. He wanted to provide "living water" for her (John 4:10) that would have quenched the deepest longing of her soul for attention, affirmation, and appreciation. Though understandably hesitant she soon realized that indeed Jesus was the One who could satisfy the thirst from the depths of her being. The way that the Samaritan woman was able to "strike the Rock" of Christ and receive "living water" was by her humble attitude of responding to Jesus saying, "Give me a drink" (John 4:7).

Several theologians have pointed to the words of Christ from the cross in the Gospel of John as being a fulfillment of this earlier message when He said, "I thirst" (19:28). May we be given the Grace to share honestly and completely with Jesus who knows us better than we know ourselves. In doing so we will experience "a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14).



Saint of the Week

Saint Patrick

Feast Day-March 17

Whether you know him as the man who brought Christianity to Ireland or simply as a reason you eat corned beef and cabbage in March, St. Patrick (415 – 493) is a well-known saint around the world.

St. Patrick was born in Britain of a Romanized family. At the age of 16, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders from the villa of his father, a deacon and local official, and brought into slavery in Ireland. He spent six long years there as a herdsman, during which he turned to his faith for strength. He later escaped back to Britain on a ship, where he was eventually reunited with his family.

His years of captivity changed him and brought out a zeal for God and a yearning to spread the message of Jesus Christ. Despite the constant danger of martyrdom, he continued to travel throughout Ireland where he baptized and confirmed in the name of Christ.

The Messiah Before You

If you would have asked me on the morning of my confirmation what the chances were of the Holy Spirit getting into my heart, I would have told you they were about the same as getting water from a stone.

My faith was fragile at this time in my life, primarily because I viewed it as exactly that — my faith. Something within my possession and subject to my own power. And I hadn't done the things I thought I needed to do in order to be the kind of Christian who knows the truth and lives it. I was waiting to be made stronger. I was waiting to be made more faithful. I was waiting for a transformation.

Little did I know, I was like the woman at the well, standing around talking about the coming of the Messiah, unaware that he was standing right in front of me. She wasn't ready; she was still living in her sin. She was caught so unawares that she left her water jar at the well, rushing out to tell what she had seen.

When I was anointed with the oil it no longer mattered that I wasn't strong enough to break open the stone that I was convinced encased my heart — God's grace gushed forth through the cracks. While I certainly didn't become a perfect Christian — and never will, in this life — I did learn that when God tells you to strike, it's probably best not to second-guess Him.





Reflections

Why Do We Do That?-Catholic Life Explained

Easter

Question: Why does the date of Easter change every year, while most other celebrations are celebrated on the same day?

Answer: Every feast is celebrated at a certain time for a reason. Saints feast days are commonly the day of their death. While we don't know Jesus' exact birthday, we celebrate the "light of the world" around the time of winter solstice, as dark, wintery days begin to lengthen again. We have a historical clue, however, to when the Easter events occurred. We know that Jesus was crucified the day before Passover. The Jews calculated the date for Passover based on both the solar and lunar calendars. It corresponds to the first full moon after the spring equinox. The early Christians maintained this connection in their celebrations of Easter on the first Sunday after the paschal full moon.

We don't re-calculate the full moon every year. As astronomy developed, so too did the forecasts of when Easter would occur in future years. The Church has created a table of calculated dates, projecting the date of Easter decades in advance. The date of Easter also determines the date of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, as well as the feast days following in the Easter season, including Pentecost. So these feasts move, too! This tradition may seem complicated, but it connects our Christian faith now to what has come before — our Jewish roots and the real, historical reality of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.

Live the Liturgy-Inspiration for the Week

Sometimes, like the Samaritan woman, we can scarcely believe that God would meet us here in this fallen world. The truth of what he speaks and the beauty of what he proclaims is like a well of spring water in a dry desert. Do we dare accept the gift?

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

John 4:13-14

Word of Life

"We are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life'. We find ourselves not only 'faced with' but necessarily 'in the midst of this conflict: we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life" (*The Gospel of Life 28*).

Gospel Meditation



3rd Sunday of Lent

When I became the pastor of a large parish, I soon found myself, for the first time in my life, riddled with anxiety, headaches, difficulty making decisions, and fatigue. I called a therapist friend and told her my symptoms and asked if she thought I needed a serious medical exam. She said, "How much water do you drink?" I told her, "I haven't had time to drink water lately." She respond-

ed, "You're chronically dehydrated. Drink eighty-five ounces a day and call me in a week." I started guzzling water and in a week all my symptoms went away. I felt great.

Like me, the people in the Exodus wanderings were dehydrated. But unlike me, they knew it. Their symptoms were bad. They fight with each other. They accuse God of being a monster who wants them and their children to die of thirst. Their thirst drives them to plot the bloody assassination of the man who rescued them. God responds by using Moses to strike a rock from which rivers of living waters flow to quench their thirst for years to come.

The Holy Spirit is the living water of love which flows from the pierced side of Jesus, the new Moses. What symptoms in your life suggest you're spiritually dehydrated? Anger at God? Cynicism at your leaders? Bitter rivalry and bickering with others? Don't panic. Of course we have those symptoms. Ask God to provide his water to quench your spiritual thirst, and he will. And all those symptoms will soon disappear.

Father George Rolwes arrived in Columbia Heights with orders from the Most Reverend Austin Dowling D.D., Archbishop of St Paul, to organize a church. The parish of Immaculate Conception of Columbia Heights was established in the month of November 1923.

The Church of the Immaculate Conception was the first Roman Catholic congregation in Columbia Heights. The first mass was celebrated on December 8th, 1924. which is the feast of The Immaculate Conception.

Totus Tuus Volunteers Needed


