



From the Pastor's Desk

Witness to Jesus

"Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts. Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope, but do it with gentleness and reverence, keeping your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who defame your good conduct in Christ

may themselves be put to shame" (1 Peter 3:15-16). This passage from the Second Reading at Mass for the Sixth Sunday of Easter helps to provide a solid outline of how we are called to offer witness to Jesus by our lives. It could be described as: Personal conversion and growth in holiness; ready disposition to evangelize; and having a steadfast demeanor in the midst of difficulties.

To "Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts" means to clear out the storage space of our souls with the grudges and resentment and sinful inclinations from the past to make room for Jesus as the Lord of all that we are. Personal conversion and growth in holiness is a lifelong process.

"Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope" means that we have a ready disposition to evangelize and to share the Good News. More than just being an optimist in the worldly sense we have an eternal hope that stretches beyond the confines of time and space. Jesus suffered and died and rose from the dead to take away our sins and to give us Grace to be a virtuous people.

Finally, we must be prepared for resistance from others and to maintain a steadfast demeanor in the midst of difficulties by "keeping your conscience clear, so that when you are maligned, those who defame your good conduct in Christ may themselves be put to shame. It means living with an authenticity and integrity and humble dependence upon Divine Mercy to offer greater glory to God by the witness of our lives.

(Practicing) Catholic

Weirdly Christian

For some time, I have worn a brown scapular. If you don't know much about this devotional practice, here is a very quick-and-dirty version, greatly lacking in detail: it's two little pieces of brown cloth, connected by a cord and worn around the neck beneath one's clothing. One of the cloth pieces depicts Our Lady of Mount Carmel appearing to St. Simon Stock, and the other piece — the one that is sometimes visible at the nape of my neck — depicts Our Lady's "scapular promise:" Whosoever dies clothed in this Scapular shall not suffer eternal fire.

This reflection is not about the brown scapular, but let me just quickly say that, while I believe the scapular promise, I do not view the scapular as a get-out-of-jail-free card, and neither does the Church. I don't wear it for the purpose of avoiding eternal fire. I wear it as a reminder to myself of my Marian consecration and as an act of humility and prayer.

I have sometimes cringed at the thought of how it looks to the person standing behind me in line at the coffee shop, should they happen to glimpse my scapular and read its brazen promise. We don't go in for talk of hellfire and salvation in polite society these days. I wonder if they think I'm a crazy person. I wonder if I should try to tuck the scapular back down below my collar.

Sometimes I do. But more often than not, I take a deep breath and decide that it's okay for me to feel self-conscious and trust that, if God wants to use this moment for His glory, he will — and if He doesn't, all I've lost is the esteem of others, which isn't worth that much to begin with.

I've always heard it said that if you do Christianity right, the rest of the world should think you're just a little bit weird.

Reflections

Why Do We Do That?-Catholic Life Explained

Can Catholics Gamble?

Question: The Bible says that Jesus condemned gambling, but I notice that so many parishes have them at festivals and other events. What's correct?

Answer: Although Jesus speaks of our relationship with material wealth and the very human struggle with greed, the gospels do not include any specific instructions related to gambling. At the same time, the Church is very sensitive to the needs of those who might struggle with an addiction to gambling, and pastoral care should always be offered to those who struggle with this reality in their life.

While it is true that many parish or school communities include gambling or games of chance in festivals and fundraisers (e.g. bingo, roulette, ring tossing, dunking booths, etc.), there is nothing inherently wrong these sorts of events, given they are played fairly and within the limits of reason are not morally objectionable. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us: "Games of chance (card games, etc.) or wagers are not in themselves contrary to justice. They become morally unacceptable when they deprive someone of what is necessary to provide for his needs and those of others" (no. 2413).

As in all things, moderation and a sense of healthy limits should be applied to gambling and games of chance. For those who find themselves living with addiction to gambling, help is available in various 12-step and addiction recovery programs.

6th Sunday of Easter

My dad was adopted as a baby. It's a big part of my family's story. His birth mother placed him in a Catholic orphanage not long after birth. A young couple longing for a baby strolled among the bassinets. My father, then only a few months old, looked at the husband and smiled. The man said, "That's my son." They took him home and the family grew. This moment of adoption was a wonderful truth they cele-



brated even when my dad was a young boy. They told him, "You're even more special than the other children, because we chose you to be our son." My dad's eyes well up with tears of gratitude whenever he tells the story, even eighty-three years later.

What is your story? Do we think or act like unwanted orphans? Who do we believe ourselves to be? As we continue to ponder Jesus' resurrection, we hear him say to us this Sunday, "I will not leave you orphans." God doesn't leave us alone like spiritual orphans. The power that raised Jesus from the dead is the Holy Spirit, who is also called the Spirit of Adoption. He chooses us to be His children, to share God's life forever. He gives us a future filled with hope.

We are not orphans anymore! This Easter, that's the story we should share with others. It's the true story we are living right now.

Memories of Immaculate Conception

As I Reminisce | Sr. Mary Fran Reichenberger

I am Sister Mary Fran Reichenberger, a member of the Sisters of St. Francis, and a 1959 graduate of Immaculate Conception School. The April 30, 2023 reminiscence article in the church bulletin focused on the beginnings of Immaculate Conception School which my community staffed. I took that as an invitation to "speak up" about the blessing of my early formation at ICS.

A cascade of memories come up related to church and school as I recall my years at IC; they are intertwined, especially in the 1950's.

By the time I graduated there were over 1,000 students in the school and 16 sisters living in the convent. The expectation in those years was that every family enroll their children in the Catholic school (annual tuition was under or at \$50 and finances were never a barrier to enrolling). The parish heavily funded the school, but the students fundraised as door-to-door sales persons selling Christmas cards and gift wrapping and then magazine subscriptions to help the budget. Sr. Loretto was the principal and Msgr. Joseph Lapinski, the pastor at the time and an involved one who not only presided at (in 1950's liturgical speak, "said") Mass every school day, but would visit the classrooms on occasion, and distribute report cards quarterly in the classrooms. Monsignor's patronal feast day ranked right up there with Christmas and Easter! It was declared a school "free day," but before dismissal the students and parishioners gathered for a solemn Mass with all the stops pulled, after which the school children put on a well-rehearsed program in the auditorium in Monsignor's honor.

Spiritual and faith formation was the heart of the school experience. As I look back now, it was a classical religious education of finding God in the good, the true, and the beautiful. The good: how to lead a virtuous life of love of God and neighbor, of respect, kindness, generosity, and integrity. The true: the truths of our faith, particularly who God is and who we are in relationship to Him and each other. But the beautiful is the gateway: the sense of awe and majesty evoked in a church where one's senses are taken with candelabra, vigil lights, flowers, fragrant incense, organ music, and choirs in the service of praise. The older grade girls formed the choir for Mass (Latin was the "foreign language" taught then!) where in the singing was praying.

ICS continues the tradition today as a parish school, but one where the tent is wider, teaching is more complex, and fundraising more sophisticated. It is heartening to see how through dedicated pastoral and school leadership Catholic education remains a strong arm of this century-old parish.

Did You Know?

In the Spring of 1955, with as many as eight families entering Immaculate Conception Church per week, Father Lapinski asked Archbishop Murray permission to build a new church. On September 12, 1955, the campaign to raise money began with a goal of \$250,000. By the fall of 1957 it became evident that the goal would soon be reached and bids were taken on the construction of the new church. The lowest bid was from Rauenhorst Construction Company, \$429,995. Father Lapinski broke ground on November 11, 1957. The new church was dedicated on December 8, 1958.
