From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends at Immaculate Conception,

"On the 40th day of Christmas, my true love gave to me..." Wait. The song stops at 12 days. But, did you know that the traditional Christian celebration of Christmas continues for 40 days? It goes from December 25th, when Jesus was born, all the way to February 2nd, which is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. What is so special about the Presentation of the Lord?

The Presentation of the Lord commemorates that forty days after Jesus' birth, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the temple for the rites of purification and dedication. According to the Book of Leviticus (12:1-4), when a woman gives birth to a boy, she was considered "unclean" for seven days. On the eighth day, the boy was circumcised. The mother would then continue to stay at home for 33 more days. At the end of the forty days, the mother and father would go to the temple for the rite of purification. This included offering a sacrifice: one option would be a lamb for a holocaust (a burnt offering) and a pigeon or turtledove for a sin offering. If the couple were poor, they could simply offer two pigeons or two turtledoves. According to Luke's gospel (2:24), Joseph and Mary made the offering of the poor.

Three main events are happening here. The first, in fulfillment of the Mosaic Law, Mary comes to the temple to perform the purification rites for herself. Thus, an older name for this feast is, "The Feast of the Purification of Mary." The second event is that Jesus is being redeemed. Isn't that interesting? We don't usually think of this, but it's in the Jewish mindset. According to the Torah, Joseph and Mary were obliged to "redeem" their firstborn son: "The Lord spoke to Moses and said, 'Consecrate to me every firstborn that opens the womb among the Israelites, both of man and beast, for it belongs to me'" (Ex. 13:1-2). The price for such a redemption was five shekels, which the parents paid to the priest. This "redemption" was a kind of payment for the Passover sacrifice, by which the Jews had been freed from slavery. So, although we call it, "The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord," the Jews would've understood it to be a very normal occurrence.

The third thing that happened was the Lord entered His temple, in fulfillment of Malachi's prophecy. The first reading of the Mass says, "Lo, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me; and suddenly there will come to the temple the LORD whom you seek" (Mal. 3:1). John the Baptist was the messenger, and now the Lord comes. The light of the world comes into His Temple to fulfill this prophecy. Ritually, this is represented that Christians would bring their baptismal candle to Mass and process in that day with it lit. It symbolizes that this light of the world was given to them on the day of their baptism. So, yet another title for this day is, "Candlemas." This is why we're having the school join us for mass this day—so the students can enjoy Candlemas together!

One final interesting tidbit of this day is that this day was traditionally important to farmers. February 2nd is almost midway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. An old English song went, "If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come, Winter, have another flight. If Candlemas brings clouds and rain, Go, Winter, and come not again." The old tradition meant that if it's sunny on Candlemas Day, the end of winter is near. If it's cloudy on Candlemas, there'll be more winter. German Protestants transferred the observance to checking to see if badgers would see their shadows. When they immigrated to Pennsylvania in the 18th and 19th centuries, they brought the custom with them, choosing the native groundhog instead of a badger. Looking to capitalize on the idea, a newspaper editor in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, named Clymer Freas organized businessmen to make this an annual tradition and is now known as the Groundhog Day as we know it.

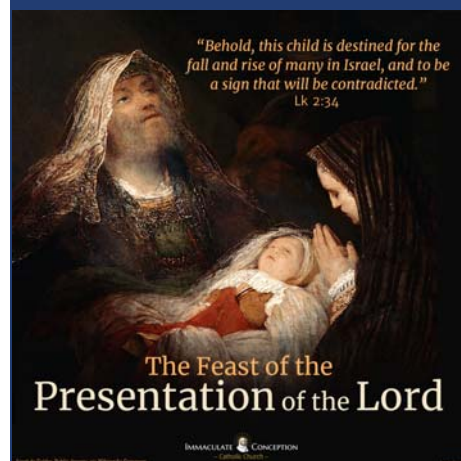

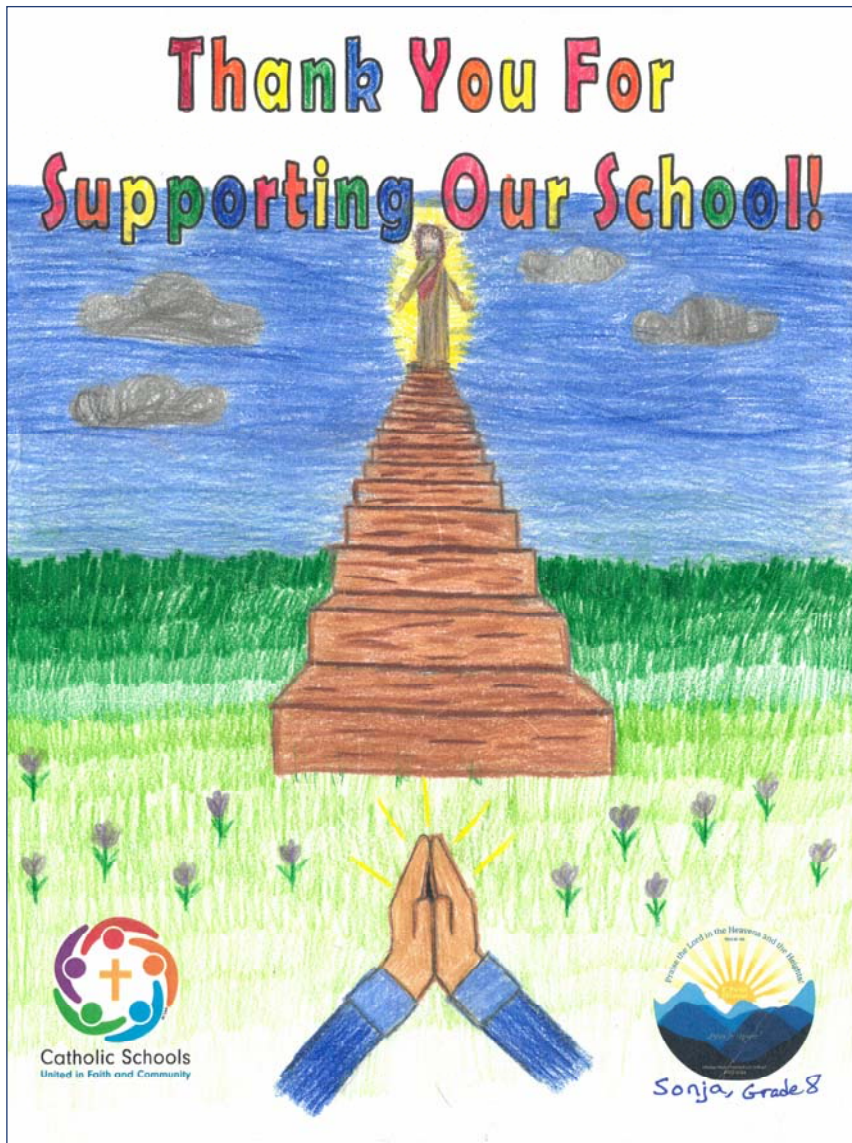

Reflections

Why Do We Do That?—Catholic Life Explained

Communion & Mortal Sin

Question: *I have a friend who receives communion, but who I know for a fact is in a state of mortal sin. Should I tell our priest? Is it my responsibility to say something?*

Answer: While we may always want to do what is best for our friends and family members, we have a responsibility to respect their privacy and their conscience. In its reflections on the Eighth Commandment (“You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor”), the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, “Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. [One] becomes guilty: — of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor; — of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another’s faults and failings to persons who do not know them; — of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them” (no. 2477).

We will never truly know what is in a person’s mind, heart, and soul; only God knows those things. We should, of course, take our concerns to God and entrust the person about whom we are concerned to God’s grace and mercy. If we have concerns about the spiritual wellbeing of someone with whom we are close, we should go to the person themselves and talk about our fears and concerns. Unless it is a case of abuse or endangerment (which we have a moral and even legal responsibility to report to the appropriate authorities), we ultimately do not have the freedom to share another’s persons faults or sins, however good we think our intentions might be.

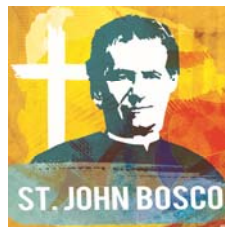

What Have You to Do with Me, Jesus of Nazareth?

Inevitably, when we read the story of the Garden of Eden, my children try to imagine what life would be like if Adam and Eve had not sinned against God.

"Would we have to go to school?" they ask me. "Would we get sick? Could we eat whatever we want? Would we get older?"

I tell them the only thing I know for sure about a world without sin is that we would be happier. I can see confusion in their faces — *Why? How?* — but I have none of the concrete answers they want. I don't know how to describe a happiness untouched by sin.

The moment sin entered the world, a chasm erupted between God and mankind. There is now a space between humanity and the divine, a cavernous and seemingly impassable void into which God calls for us, unendingly. And because we are lost in the dark, and miserable, instead of following his voice when we hear it, instead we reply: "What do you want?"

"What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?"

Did the unclean spirit know, when he cried out all those thousands of years ago in Capernaum, that he was giving voice to a question which defined the human condition? They are the words of a demon, yes, but they are also my words. Far, far more often than I care to admit, when God is reaching for me, I look upon His hand with contempt and confusion. When I am grappling with a problem or a sin which overwhelms me, again and again I forget that I already know the solution.

The tragedy of original sin is not that we live in a world where we cannot eat what we want, where we age, and where we become sick and die. The tragedy of sin is that we have forgotten how to be happy. We look at happiness and we think: "What do you want with me?"

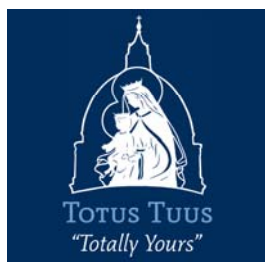

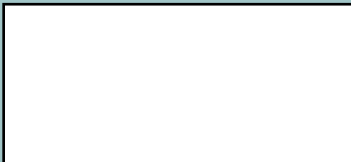
