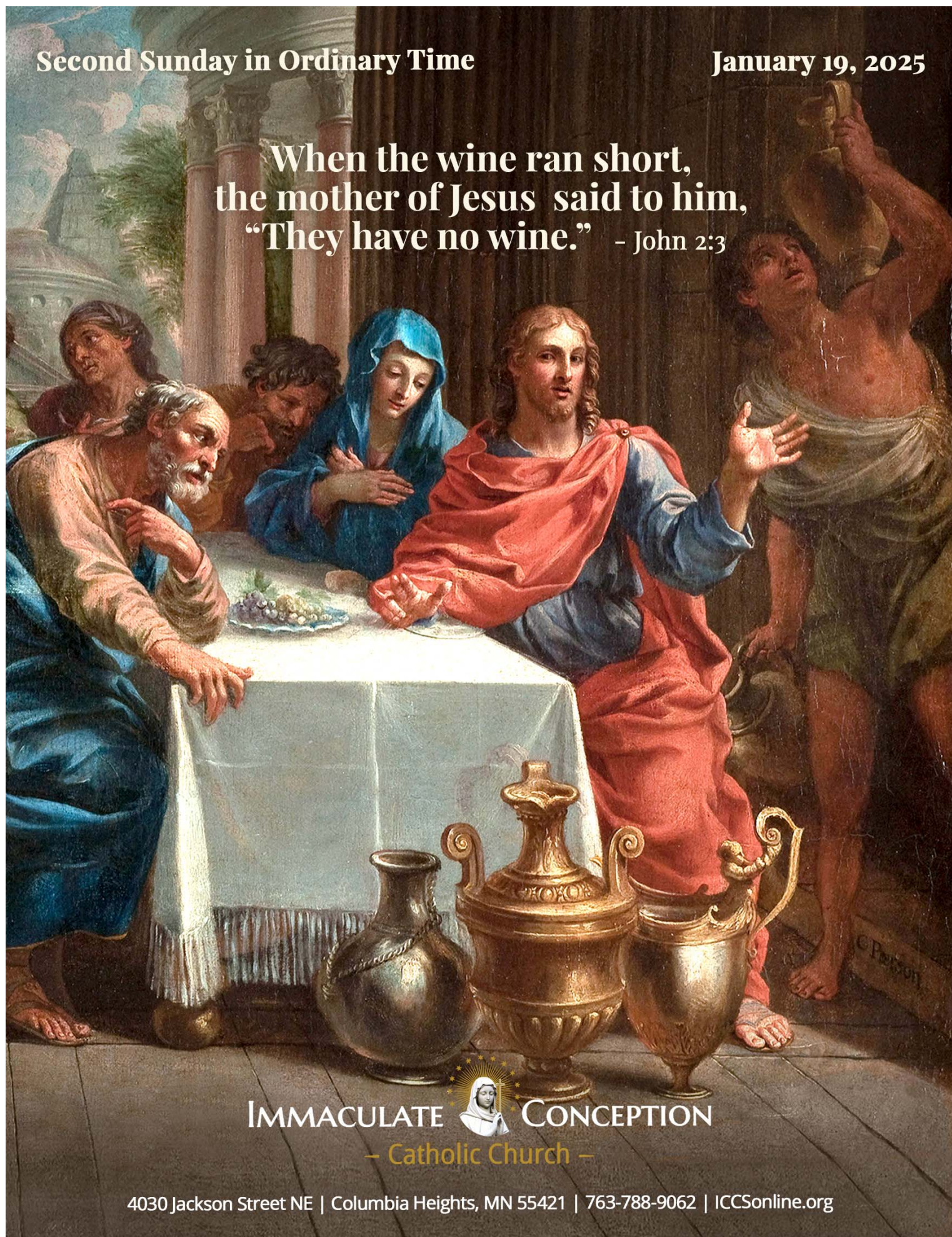

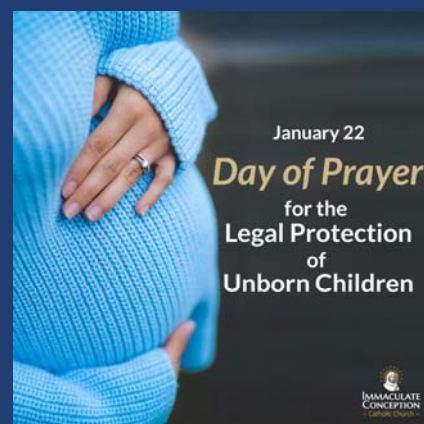



Reflections

Why Do We Do That?—Catholic Life Explained

Holy Days

Question:

Why do some dioceses move holy days, or not even celebrate them at all. Doesn't everyone do the same thing?

Answer:

The short answer is no, not everyone does the same thing. Although the church is universal, there are many local customs and saints that each country, sometimes just a region, will honor. For example, feast days and patronal days may not be major feast days on the church's universal calendar, but are celebrated as such in one place. Holy days of obligation are the same way. The US Conference of Catholic Bishops has a certain amount of discretion in choosing days which best reflect the local church's experience and history.

Another reason certain feasts are moved is a practical one. With limited clergy, or a great difficulty for people to get to Mass, the feast day may be transferred to a Sunday. The rationale is that if a significant feast should be part of the church's celebration, then better to do so on a Sunday when people and clergy are available, rather than try to fit it on a day when one or both cannot be there.

Christmas and Immaculate Conception are always observed as days of obligation. In the USA we celebrate six holy days of obligation. There are also other special days and they are ranked, in order of importance as solemnity, feast, memorial and optional memorial.

Do Whatever He Tells You

I once ran out of pizza at my kid's birthday party.

Everyone told me it wasn't a big deal but come on. It was a disaster. I had invited all these people over. They showed up with presents and sang "Happy Birthday" and stood around patiently while my kid ripped through his cache of gifts. The very least they were expecting was to be fed sufficiently.

I'll tell you what, I sure could have used the Blessed Mother that night.

I love the story of the wedding at Cana because it's such a silly little miracle. I don't mean to be disrespectful — of course it's an incredibly important moment in Christ's public life. But it's not healing a leper. It's not raising the dead. It's not even walking on water. It's saving a young couple from embarrassment.

I think sometimes we forget, or even refuse, to bring small concerns and inconveniences to God because we think we should be able to handle them on our own. What a ridiculous attitude that is — as if we could handle anything on our own. It's so fitting that Mary, ever the ob-servant Mother, is the one to bring the matter to Jesus' attention. He asks her what this problem has to do with him. She doesn't answer him, because, between you and me, I don't think he's asking her. I think he's asking us. All she does is tell the waiters what I consider to be the best piece of advice in all of Scripture: "Do whatever he tells you."

I'm so quick to throw up my hands and feel sorry for myself when I encounter a barrier in my life. What I should be doing is taking the matter to God, and then doing whatever He tells me.

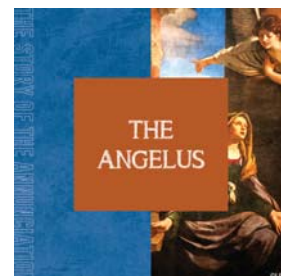
Connect With Tradition and Grow Your Faith

The Angelus

The incarnation of Christ changed the life of every Christian person who ever lived. Reflecting on that moment in salvation history is an opportunity for grace, growth and peace. Who wouldn't want that every day, or even three times every day?

The Angelus is composed of three antiphons which narrate the annunciation, each followed by the recitation of a Hail Mary (a prayer that itself contains the "angelic greeting" of the angel Gabriel). Its name is derived from the first words of the prayer in Latin.

This devotion was developed over the course of several centuries and is rooted in the ancient practice of saying three Hail Marys in the evening. Historically, people were called to prayer by the ringing of church bells — "the Angelus bells." Most people who recite the Angelus do so daily at noon, though it is often said in the morning, at noon and in the evening.



WOW – What a Year it Was!

Our Grounds and Maintenance Committee (GMC) continues to meet almost monthly to research, discuss, and approve projects that affect our buildings. It is through **your generous contributions** to the Building Restoration Fund that we were able to accomplish so many projects that enhance the beauty and worship experience for all our parishioners and guests.

Highlights of the year include:

- Replacing one of the furnaces in the rectory.
- Changing all the lights in the nave to LEDs.
- Replacing the fence on the north side of our parking lot across the street.
- Adding additional lighting towers to better illuminate the crucifix and altar areas.
- Cleaning of the outdoor Shrine.
- Repainting the cherubic statues and planters on the south end of the church.
- Cleaning the terrazzo floors in the narthex.
- Repainting the front exterior doors of the church.
- Replacing the exterior windows in the Adoration Chapel and repainting the interior.
- Painting the white wall panels and alcoves throughout the nave of the church.
- Changing the lighting in the choir loft to more energy efficient LEDs (*project not fully completed*).

But the group is not yet done! Some additional projects for this year include:

- Finalizing the lighting in the choir loft.
- Replacing the Convent door used by our adorers and adding enhanced security.
- Adding motion sensor lights in the restrooms of Fellowship Hall.
- Replacing the uneven concrete in the area between the rectory and school building.
- Continuing the cleaning of the terrazzo floors.
- Increasing security in Fellowship Hall.

Thank you to Bob Dykhoff, Gary Gorman, Molly Rhoe, Chris Ruback, Ron Ruback, and Dave Szurek, and the parish liaisons Julie Moricz and Doug Olson for their time and talent over the past 18 months. It is such a joy to experience the fruits of this important work for our parish.
