FROM FATHER MIKE'S DESK:



As I've said to some of you, the recent outpouring of support, encouragement, and -- most importantly, by far -- prayer has been absolutely wonderful and deeply humbling. The February 24 episode at the MAC was bad -- some good people had to work hard to get my heart beating again, and the aftermath includes both a surgically implanted pacemaker and some strong drugs to which I still must become accustomed. I'm physically back at the rectory and certainly am looking forward to resuming my role in the life of this wonderful parish. But it still will be a while before you see much of me.

By God's mercy, you can give praise and thanks for a Lent less interesting than mine. Yet each of us, in our own fashion, is moving ahead through Lent, approaching the mercy of the Cross and the glory of the Resurrection. I hope that each of us has taken the opportunity for quiet reflection on how elements of Prayer, Fasting, and Alms-Giving can be built into our Lent.

Before my recent adventure, I offered a few Lenten suggestions. Certainly daily Mass and some slow reading of Scripture (*lectio divina*) can enhance our prayer. Or we can pledge a short period at the beginning of each day to offer to the Lord the blessings and challenges that lie ahead. We can fast from chocolate or bacon, of course, but perhaps the Lord is calling us to gain greater control over a non-food aspect of life (a fast from political "news"? a daily break from checking the phone?). With regard to alms, there are myriad ways in which our time, talent, or treasure can better be shared with those around us.

As everyone knows, Lent began on Ash Wednesday. It's sometimes said, though, that Lent really begins the first time we are seriously tempted to stray from our intended Lenten observances. So, by now, we've all had several chances to stumble. And, if we have, then we've had several chances to get back up.

As we think back to the familiar readings of Ash Wednesday, we recall their power and beauty. In some ways, though, the first reading of the following day (the Thursday after Ash Wednesday) can guide our Lent, just as it can guide our efforts to live the Christian life.

The passage is Deuteronomy 30:15-20. It begins with Moses telling the people, *Today I have set before you life and prosperity, death and doom.* After explaining the blessings that come from loving God and neighbor, and the travails that always accompany an unruly life, Moses continues with these familiar words, *I call heaven and earth today to witness against you: I have set before you life and death, the blessing and the curse. Choose life ...*

When we encounter this passage, we normally -- and properly -- understand it as a call to protect the unborn, the elderly, the weak, the vulnerable. But the Lord, speaking through Moses, has something else to say to us, as well.

Just as we cannot learn any particular truths unless we understand that there really is such a thing as Truth (we don't just get to make things up and declare them to be "our truth"), likewise we can't make good choices unless we understand that a satisfying, productive life is the product of real and consequential choices.

We sometimes reflect on the words of the great Italian Catholic philosopher, Lawrence "Yogi" Berra, who famously said, "When you come to a fork in the road, take it." So often, we are tempted instead to just pause at the break in the path, clinging to both possibilities. But we must choose.

Bishop Robert Barron memorably made this point about the Christian life in the very opening sentences of his masterful video series, *Catholicism*. The first thing Bishop Barron said, before launching into many hours devoted to the richness of the life of Christ and of His Church, was that Jesus Christ requires a choice. He cannot be dismissed as a gentle sage, a folksy peacemaker. He either was God incarnate, as He claimed, or He was a charlatan who got all His friends killed for nothing.

With a good portion of Lent still ahead of us, perhaps we can reflect on that fundamental and eternal choice. Is Jesus Christ the Lord of my life? Is He the Lord of my home? If so, then our Lenten choices -- and all our life choices -- begin to come into clearer focus!

Again, thanks for the prayers. I need to go slower than is my custom and desire -- for this one, I do need to listen to the doctors. But I'm working my way back.

SCIENCE UPDATE WITH MR. QUINTUS!

Our fourth graders are currently raising a few mealworms in their groups to observe their larval stage, pupation, and complete metamorphosis. This is part of a unit on environments where we learn about animals' interaction with their surroundings. Our work includes making regular observations with drawings along with studying animal needs. In our unit on earth and weather, our fifth grade has been testing and observing how air gets warmed up by the earth underneath it and how heat transfer works through radiation, conduction, and convection. To do this, we have to observe and record how light heats up earth using experiments visualizing

convection and conduction. Our sixth graders just finished a unit on metabolism. We learned what nutrients a body needs and how they are metabolized. By using a computer simulation, we were able to diagnose what kind of metabolic disease an imaginary patient had. We also determined whether an athlete used illegal doping to his advantage in a race. In a unit on chemical changes, our seventh graders turned detectives and revealed who stole a diamond from a museum. We used their scientific skills to determine which suspect could have produced the chemicals that were found at the crime scene. On our way to acquiring these skills, we learned about the basics of chemistry: substances, compounds, and chemical changes. Our eighth graders are knee-deep in our study of natural selection and the history of evolution. By using computer simulations, we explored how traits can be adaptive or non-adaptive and how adaptive traits can become more numerous in a population. A week ago we embarked on a journey that takes us through the history of evolution, at the end of which we have to write a paper arguing whether a fossil is closer related to a bird or a crocodile. We will see!


