

FROM FATHER MIKE'S DESK:

Happy Fourth of July weekend! Summer is now here for real!

When I taught at Lansing Catholic High School, I was directly across the hall from Room 206, where, years earlier, Brother Andre' William, F.S.C., had taught sophomore English to an all-boys class. It was bracing in every respect -- Bro. Andre' was the best teacher I ever had at any level. Since this was in olden days, he made us memorize some of the great poems.

So inspired, I amazed my own students by making them memorize a few lines. They thought I was kidding at first. But their outlook changed when they learned that I would not accept their final paper until they had recited for me, perfectly, these few words --

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

As we approach July 4, 2023, we can be confident that multiple outlets will publish one of two holiday pieces -- each the mirror opposite of the other.

In some publications, we'll be invited to celebrate this shining city on a hill. We'll be reminded that ordinary Americans have worked hard to offer equal opportunity on a scale far beyond the dreams of any other multi-racial, multi-ethnic, multi-religious society in human history. We'll be invited to enjoy this land of immense natural beauty. We'll be given a chance to bask in the glow of our legion of inventors, innovators, explorers, musical geniuses, Nobel Prize winners, adventurers, scientific pioneers, and wild-eyed dreamers. We'll review the myriad reasons why vastly more people immigrate than emigrate. With all its imperfections, we'll sing of how this nation continues to honor the moral and legal principles that those students were asked to memorize.

Other publications will see a different America. Some will tell us that it's getting late in America -- like "Fall of the Roman Empire" late. We'll be reminded that no one in Congress seems interested in exercising the legislative authority provided by the Constitution, and that we're in a string of presidents who appear to believe that the nation's laws come from executive orders. It won't be hard to find signs of a nation that is unraveling, with wide gulfs seeming to open between demographic, political, economic, and generational cohorts. Great swaths of society appear to believe things that are demonstrably false. Declines in life expectancy and in measures of happiness and overall satisfaction do not augur well. And too many are being poisoned with pornography and violence.

So what shall we think? We can celebrate a free and vibrant nation that consistently manages -- even though it often takes too long -- to reject injustice and recommit itself to founding principles. Or we can mourn a nation that killed 63 million innocents between *Roe* and *Dobbs* and that now seems ambivalent about whether its citizens need a working knowledge of history, biology, or morals.

Truth. Let us recommit ourselves to Truth this Fourth of July. Those highly imperfect founders -- many of whom were themselves slaveholders -- nevertheless articulated true principles that would pave the way for all to be free. John Adams famously said that the Constitution "was made only for a moral and religious people" and that it is "wholly inadequate to the government of any other." A "moral and religious people" must be committed to Truth.

Let us also remember what a treasure we hold. These values of freedom and human dignity, and the remarkable idea that government draws authority from the people, not the converse, are the great exception in human history. Across all nations and eras, the vast majority -- the overwhelming majority -- of humans have lived under what is, in reality, a dictatorship of powerful persons or interests. Some absolute rulers were kind and wise, but they were absolute rulers nonetheless.

With little difficulty, we can generate complaints about the current state of the nation. We can outline the shortcomings of elected officials and of our troubled political parties. But, this Fourth, let's not. Instead, let's invite our children and grandchildren into a conversation about those few lines from the Preamble of the Declaration of Independence. Let's make sure they understand those words. *Really* understand them. Maybe even go all the way, and see whether they can memorize them.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

WELCOME FATHER RYAN!


