From the Pastor's Desk

Fall Fundraiser

As mentioned in the Mass announcements the last couple of weeks, we are in the midst of our annual fall fundraiser. I beg your generosity to help us keep Catholic education available, accessible, and affordable both in our school and religious education program. Invitations to the celebratory party have been mailed and are in the pews this week. You can also give online via our website. November 8 we will all celebrate together yet another successful annual parish appeal. As Fr. Solanus Casey reminds us and to follow-up last week's homily about gratitude - thank you! We cannot do what we do without you and your support!

Parish Breakfast

Please join us next weekend after the 8 am and 10 am Masses for breakfast in the parish hall. Thank you to the Knights of Columbus and the Council of Catholic Women! They are two amazing groups and I encourage you to get involved with them. They do so much for the parish and remain grateful for their presence, their work, their dedication, and their faith.

Gospel Reflection

This weekend's readings focus our attention on the importance of prayer, particularly the call to pray *always* and *persistently*. But if we're not careful, we may draw the wrong conclusions from these readings. Specifically, we might wrongly infer:

- 1. That we should pray only when we need something; or
- 2. That God will always answer our prayers exactly as we desire.

In our first reading, we hear of Israel's battle with Amalek. Moses instructs Joshua to choose men for battle while he ascends a hilltop. As long as Moses keeps his arms raised, Israel prevails. When he grows weary and lowers them, Amalek gains the upper hand. Eventually, Aaron and Hur support his arms, allowing Israel to triumph.

Moses' posture - with arms outstretched - is profoundly symbolic. It's the same posture Christ took on the Cross, where He interceded for all humanity with the most perfect prayer ever offered - the sacrifice of the Lamb of God. It's also the same posture used by priests during the liturgy, known as the orans position (Latin for "the one who is praying" or "pleading"). In each case, we see an image of intercession and prayer offered not just for oneself, but on behalf of others.

But here's where the misunderstanding can creep in: We might assume that if we simply pray hard enough, or long enough, we will automatically receive what we ask for. This isn't what Jesus is teaching.

In our Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the unjust judge and the persistent widow. The widow relentlessly pleads for justice, and the judge finally relents - not out of virtue, but to be rid of her persistence. She's bothering him! Jesus uses this comparison not to liken God to the unjust judge, but to show how persistence has power. Then Jesus says something interesting:

"I tell you, he will see to it that justice is done for them speedily."

It's easy to misinterpret this, assuming that persistence guarantees a speedy answer to prayer in the way we expect. But this isn't quite

what Jesus is saying.

First, Jesus is emphasizing the *necessity* of regular, ongoing prayer. Why? Because prayer is about relationship. No relationship can exist without communication. Deep relationships are built through mutual self-disclosure which is the heart of prayer: opening ourselves to God and allowing Him to reveal Himself to us.

I often use the acronym A.R.R.R. to explain this dynamic:

- Acknowledge Recognize what's truly going on in your heart your thoughts, feelings, and desires. This requires silence and attentiveness.
- Relate Bring those thoughts and feelings to God. Speak to Him honestly and directly as if speaking to a close friend or family member.
- Receive Listen for God's response. Maybe it's a word, a Scripture verse, a sense of peace or challenge. Be open.
- Respond Act on what you've received. Maybe it's a word of gratitude. Maybe it's a call to change or a leap of faith.

This rhythm of prayer draws us into deeper intimacy with God.

Back to that word "speedily." In Greek, it's *en tachei*, which can mean "quickly," "soon," or "without delay." But more often, it refers to *suddenness* rather than *immediacy*. Think of a dam that suddenly bursts: the flood happens in an instant, but the pressure has been building for years. Likewise, our prayers may seem unanswered for a long time, but when God acts, it is often swift and decisive.

Also, keep in mind: God exists outside of time. As Scripture reminds us:

"With the Lord, a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day." (2 Peter 3:8)

God's justice unfolds in His perfect timing not ours.

Jesus ends the Gospel with a striking question:

"But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

This could be understood in two ways:

- 1. When Christ returns, will He find us faithful in prayer persistent, consistent, even when answers seem delayed?
- 2. Will He find us trusting in *Him*, rather than in the outcomes we hoped for?

Prayer is not about getting what we want. Rather, prayer is about remaining in relationship with the One who loves us most. Our persistence in prayer is itself an act of faith and a sign that we trust in God's goodness, even when we don't see immediate results.

One of my favorite definitions of prayer comes from St. Theophan the Recluse (a saint recognized in the Eastern Orthodox Churches):

"To pray is to stand before God with the mind in the heart, and to do so until the end of one's life."

So let us remain steadfast in prayer, standing before the Lord with hearts open, until the day we meet Him face to face.





A Discipleship Moment

with Hallie Card, Director of Adult Discipleship and Evangelization

If you watch any Hallmark movie or romantic comedy, you will see the two leads meet, dislike each other, be forced to spend time together against their wishes, and eventually fall in love despite

their initial feelings about the other person. It is out of their control. It just happens (in every single movie) and is sealed with a kiss.

We often think of love as an emotion. It is something that develops because of mutual values, having things in common, or even just being part of a family. As a general rule, it is not really something that we have to really work for or earn from another person, it is either there or not there.*

The reality is, however, love is far more than just an emotion. Love is a choice, an active and completely intentional way of encountering others. If love was just an emotion, or something that happens naturally in friendships, romantic relationships, and families, then why does Jesus repeatedly tell us to love one another? He does not say, "Try to love each other." He says multiple times that we are to "Love one another". He gives us this command because we control who and how we love. We can choose the way we view and treat others.

One of the hardest penances that I have ever heard was from a priest who understood this assignment. After the person who came to him for the Sacrament was done confessing their sins, the priest told them to think about the person that they dislike the most - for whatever reason that may be - and for their penance, he told them to pray for the happiness of that person every single day for a month. These were not to be prayers for a change in behavior,

for God to make them nicer or for them to stop doing whatever it was that made them so unlikable, no, these were to be prayers for their happiness. Each day provided a choice to follow through on the penance or not. Choosing the prayer is an act of love.

It is important to note that loving someone does not necessarily mean agreeing with them, supporting what they stand for, or condoning their actions. St. Thomas Aquinas writes in Summa Theologiae (a definition then quoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church), that "To love is to will the good of the other." We are called to truly want what is best for all people, and, if we want what is best for them, we will work to help them achieve it.

What then is the good of the other? It is a close relationship with Christ. If we are truly working to help others achieve this good, we must start by loving them. Hate has no place in the Kingdom of God, yet our world is filled with it.

Jesus knows this is incredibly difficult for us humans to love everyone, but he tells us to do it anyways.

Someone who does not believe in the same things you do? Choose to love them.

Someone who hurts you or your family members? Choose to love them.

Someone who says awful, hateful things? Choose to love them.

Criminals, terrorists, political rivals? Choose to love them.

It is what we were made to do.

Choose Love. Always.
