

### Around the Table

# Rev. Denis B. Theroux, Pastor The Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### Dear Friends:

In an effort to describe an extreme dedication to a cause, a service or a work, we sometimes speak of a person "pouring him or herself out: totally for that work. When a person gives a particularly moving speech, we may say that he or she "poured him or herself out" completely to the people. We mean by this that he or she emptied him or herself, exhausted him or herself of all their resources, as they strove to reach the people he or she was speaking to. So total was their concentration that there was very little of that person left when it was over. The person had truly, "poured him or herself out."

This concept of pouring had a deep significance in religious acts and ceremonies of ancient times. The custom was to pour something as a symbol of total commitment. We still do a similar thing when we take a bottle of wine and carefully watch the last drop drip into a glass. This simple act symbolizes how the bottle has been totally poured out, completely emptied of its delicious and fragrant content. By pouring it out to the very last drop, we demonstrate our appreciation of its fine quality.

This kind of giving even to the last drop is St. Paul's mood here today, in our Second Reading. He proclaims, "I am already being poured out like a libation." Recalling an act of religious sacrifice, the pouring out of blood, or the pouring out of water or wine. St. Paul explains he has poured his life out in the service of Jesus. His commitment is total.

St. Paul therefore, provides a model for us in this. In a certain sense, we too, must pour ourselves out for Christ. We need to increasingly empty ourselves for others. This is the way the love of God moves through us into the world. Like a religious liberation, it causes us to pour ourselves out for God, to give ourselves more and more. We empty ourselves; our contents are given to others like a bottle that is passed around a table to fill others' glasses.

Consequently, others drink of that which we have emptied ourselves. Family life is an outstanding example of this. Parents experience the pouring out of themselves for their children. Hopefully, children understand, in love and gratitude, how much the parents have emptied themselves so that they might have full glasses to drink.

In a real and meaningful way then, our lives are religious libations to God. We pour ourselves out, as St. Paul did, so that others may drink of us as we empty ourselves. "I am already being poured out like a libation," wrote St. Paul. "I am already being poured out like a libation, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance."

Merited crowns awaits us, also. Our "eager longing" will be fully satisfied. What St. Paul says of himself is equally true of us, for we, too, are being poured out like libations for Jesus.

#### KATHRYN KONNECTION

Last week and this week, the gospel passages we have heard talk about prayer. It is one of those words many of us use often without giving it much thought. It is also one of those "activities" which we know we should do but many of us find it difficult to actually make it part of our daily life.



Joyce Rupp would say in her book entitled, **The Cup of Our Life** is that "the first step to making prayer a reality in your daily life is that you need to "SHOW UP." That advice sounds simple but it is the first step in making prayer a part of our day. What I have discovered is that the amount of time and the form of the prayer

doesn't really matter; it is the fact that I show up and am open to what God is trying to say to me or do through me that day. In order to hear what God might be trying to say to me, I need to stop talking and listen. Silence is very difficult for many of us and it is even more challenging when we come to prayer. We want to tell God what needs to happen and listening is often not our first response. Have you ever noticed that the words listen and silent have exactly the same letters in them? Might that be because we can not listen unless we are silent?

The second words of advice that Joyce Rupp gives is that we need to "WAKE UP." We need to be aware, open and ready to receive what God would like to offer to us today. If our attitudes and actions are to be changed because of and through our prayer, then it is imperative that we come to prayer with an open heart and mind.

We often hear in the gospels that Jesus withdraws to a quiet place to pray, to be with his Father. Even in the midst of his daily life, he leaves his apostles and goes away by himself to listen to his Father. If Jesus needed this time alone with God, how much more do we need to spend time in solitude with God?

As we soon come to the end of another Liturgical Year and we begin anew with the Advent Season this might be the time to ask ourselves the questions: Does time for daily prayer matter to me? Am I willing to make time for daily quiet time to listen and talk with God? Do I want prayer to make a difference in how I live my life?

We would all like to identify with the tax collector in the gospel who prays with sincerity and humility. God knows what is in our hearts as we pray and asks only to be true to him and ourselves. "Tis the Gift to be Simple" certainly expresses how we should approach God in prayer. Written by Joseph Brackett, an American songwriter and member of the Shaker society in Maine, in 1848, it is his most famous composition and has become an international favorite since it was highlighted in

Aaron Copland's *Appalachian Spring* in 1944. Sydney Carter used Brackett's tune SIMPLE GIFTS for the text of the popular hymn "Lord of the Dance" in 1963.




# Hello Youth Group! Sean Tehoke, OLV Youth Ministry Coordinator





#### **Scripture Reflection for the Family**

This weekend's gospel is filled with assumptions as to what prayer is and is intended to do. It is filled with assumptions on the part of the Pharisee who believes that following ritual and religious practices in and of itself is enough to gain favor with God and those who seemingly are not part of that favor are one's to be disdained and avoided. As is true with all of Jesus' parables however, the ending comes with a different view or reality; the one who does not assume, who humbles himself before God is the one who will be exalted. Clearly, the moral is how we stand before God is important and I would like to add how we stand with each other is equally so. Making assumptions and allowing stereotypes to color how we treat another without question damages our relationship with God and each other. It comes to play especially in our schools and aides in establishing a culture of bullying others both at school and online.

A young man by the name of Matthew Kaplan, of Arizona, began his own program to address this culture when he was just an eighth grade student in middle school. Deeply moved by the bullying his younger brother endured, he decided to challenge the culture that sustained bullying and build a new one based on the principal that those who engaged in or tolerated bullying behavior did not understand the true pain they inflicted. Taking on a nonjudgmental approach, he designed a program which provided experiences and activities that broke down cliques and promoted new friendships built on empathy toward others and a stronger sense of being together rather than apart.

His project over the past five years has grown into a non-profit that has impacted 1,000 middle schools and is used by two hundred teachers. Its mission statement proclaims the boldness of its approach. "The Be ONE Project not only challenges kids to be kind, but to be positive role models who hold others accountable to be kind as well, whereby harnessing the power of peer pressure towards inclusiveness rather than exclusiveness." (www.thebeoneproject.org)

This is a wonderful story of how one person has made such a wonderful difference and his approach echoes our gospel story. When we humbly come before God, we lay down our



assumptions and judgments so that we can open our hearts to new perspectives. Our lives have the power to praise God. It is in the daily living out of his mercy that we can accomplish that!

I am excited to be teaching my 27th year and my first year at OLV. From Day 1, the students, staff,

and parents have been welcoming and supportive. Having retired from public school teaching, I cannot say enough positive things about my first couple of months in Catholic education. The small class sizes, available technology, support staff, supply of great books, and time devoted to teaching literature and reading at the middle school level have surpassed my expectations. But more than our classroom achievements, the atmosphere at OLV, set by the staff and under the leadership of Father Denis, Dan Timmis, and Kate Szuba, is one of dedication, kindness, and humility. Our weekly all-school Masses and the many beautiful traditions are what make OLV such a great place to be, and I appreciate the opportunity to teach here.

Please join the Knights of Columbus on Sunday, October 30, to recite the rosary in the church immediately following the 9:30 a.m. Mass. All are welcome!!


