

## FOCUS ON THE READINGS

#### The 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The author of Ecclesiastes speaks of vanity and the toil of life. Paul exhorts the Colossians to leave behind earthly ways and pursue what is from above. In the Gospel, Jesus warns the crowd to take care against all greed, and then tells a parable of a rich man who stored up all his goods but died before being able to enjoy them.

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

#### A message from Fr. Chris Dayton

This Sunday's readings invite us to reflect on one of life's most essential—and yet often neglected—truths: we cannot take it with us.

The Book of Ecclesiastes speaks with raw honesty about the seeming futility of our toil and striving. "Vanity of vanities," the author writes, "all things are vanity!" It's not that work, success, or responsibility are meaningless, but that when these things become our ultimate pursuit, they risk leaving us empty. Without being rooted in something eternal, all our achievements and possessions can feel fleeting.

St. Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, helps us reframe this. He urges us to "seek what is above," to orient our lives toward the things that last: compassion, humility, mercy, forgiveness, and love. He challenges us to put to death the worldly desires that tether us too tightly to the temporary: greed, impurity, anger, envy. Paul reminds us that if we have died with Christ in baptism, then our true life is now hidden with Him in God. We were made for more than this world can offer.

Jesus makes the lesson unmistakably clear in today's Gospel parable. A rich man, after a fruitful harvest, plans to tear down his barns and build bigger ones to store his surplus grain. His confidence is in his

wealth. He believes he has secured an easy future: "Rest, eat, drink, be merry." But God calls him a fool—not for his success, but for placing his trust in possessions instead of in God. That very night, his life is demanded of him. And the question lingers: What remains? What matters now?

Our culture is built on the pursuit of more—more stuff, more security, more recognition. We are praised for building resumes, filling calendars, and climbing ladders. But Jesus invites us to a different kind of richness, one not measured in bank accounts or barns, but in how fully we live in relationship with God and others. The question becomes: Are we building bigger barns... or are we helping build the Kingdom?

This doesn't mean we shouldn't work hard or provide for our families. What it does mean is that we must keep eternal things first. Our real treasure is not in things that fade, but in love that endures—in a heart open to God, in a life poured out for others, in a legacy of faith, service, and generosity.

As we continue walking through this Jubilee Year of Hope, let this be a moment to re-anchor your life in Christ. Ask:

- What am I storing up?
- What am I clinging to that will not last?
- What would it mean for me to be rich in what matters to God?

May our families, our friendships, and our parish become places where the richness of God's love is not only stored but shared freely. Let us not settle for full barns and empty hearts. Let us strive instead to be filled with grace, mercy, and faith—and to leave behind a witness of hope that endures.

This week, may we pray for the wisdom to let go of what fades and the grace to cling to what is eternal.

I hope everyone has a great week and always know of my prayers for each of you.

#### A message from Mrs. Jaime Gostkowski

As parents, we naturally want to give our children the best: good clothes, enriching experiences, the latest technology, and opportunities to succeed. But in this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus reminds us not to confuse material success with true richness. He tells a parable of a man who spends his time and energy storing up wealth, only to find that his life ends before he can enjoy it. It's not a condemnation of having things, but it is a caution against letting our things define our worth.

Our children are always watching how we spend our time and what we prioritize. Are we teaching them that a full life is built on love, faith, generosity, and trust in God? Or are we unintentionally showing them that success is measured by what we own?

This Gospel invites all of us - parents and children alike - to pause and reflect: What truly matters most? When our homes are filled with faith, patience, and kindness, we offer our children something far more lasting than any possession.

This week, talk as a family about blessings that money can't buy, such as health, time together, forgiveness, or the love of friends. Invite your child to donate a toy or a piece of clothing, share with a sibling, or do something kind for someone else.

Then talk about how these small actions reflect the kind of richness God wants for all of us.

# A message from Mrs. Laura Sarubbi:

The unofficial Scripture verse for the women in my family is Luke 10:41: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things."

If you heard Fr. Chris' homily two Sundays ago, you'll remember how his mom turned to him and said, "Don't even think about complaining about Martha! Someone had to feed those men!" She's right.

We've been hearing a lot about Martha, Mary, and Lazarus lately, and I can relate. In my mind, Martha is the oldest: planning and caring for everyone. Mary is the emotional middle child with a heart for love. Lazarus is the baby, off with his friends. We all have a bit of them in us—but what makes their family holy is this: each of their hearts belongs to Jesus.

My Baba Kate used to tell me, "Be friends with people who are smarter than you. You'll always learn something." And each of these siblings teaches us something:

- Martha shows us bold faith: she declares Jesus is the Christ.
- Mary shows us how to love: she sits at His feet and listens
- Lazarus shows us that friendship with Jesus is prayer in its simplest form.

So what can you learn from them? Try a bit of contemplative prayer. Close your eyes. Imagine you're there when Lazarus dies. Hear the voices. Feel the grief. Then witness the miracle—he walks out of the tomb. Do you truly believe?

# MENSAJE DEL P. CHRIS Pastor de San Pablo

San Pablo hace eco de esto en su carta a los Colosenses, exhortándonos a "buscar los bienes de arriba" y a hacer morir los deseos que nos atan demasiado a las cosas de este mundo.

Jesús nos presenta esta misma enseñanza en el Evangelio de hoy con la parábola del hombre rico que acumula bienes para sí, solo para descubrir que esa misma noche se le pedirá la vida. Es llamado "necio," no por haber tenido éxito, sino porque puso su seguridad en sus posesiones en lugar de en Dios.

Nuestra cultura muchas veces mide la vida por lo que poseemos, producimos y acumulamos. Pero Jesús nos recuerda que una vida rica a los ojos de Dios se ve muy diferente. No se trata de graneros llenos de trigo, sino de corazones llenos de gracia, misericordia, amor y generosidad.

Esta semana, los invito a examinar lo que estamos construyendo. ¿Estamos edificando graneros más grandes para nosotros mismos, o estamos ayudando a construir el Reino de Dios? ¿Nos esforzamos por dejar un legado de fe y compasión, o simplemente acumulamos cosas que se desvanecerán?

En este Año Jubilar de la Esperanza, que podamos volver a anclar nuestras vidas en Cristo, quien es el único tesoro que permanece. Que nuestras familias, amistades y comunidad parroquial sean lugares donde se almacene y se comparta la riqueza del amor de Dios.

Pidamos la gracia de ser "ricos a los ojos de Dios."

Espero que todos tengan una excelente semana y recuerden que siempre rezo por cada uno de ustedes.
