
### A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

### **Honoring our Deceased Servicemen and Women**

[a moving account of an experience of two Nashville Dominican Sisters — April, 2016 Veritas Magazine]



Anyone who has viewed the poignant Golden Globe film "Taking Chance" [with Kevin Bacon] would understand the experience that two Nashville Dominican Sisters had on a Southwest return flight from Baltimore-Washington International Airport. The film depicts the true account of Lt. Col. Michael Strobl, a volunteer

military escort officer, accompanying the body of a 19 year-old fallen Marine, Chance Phelps, back to his hometown of Dubois, WY.

Unknowingly, the two Sisters had providentially stepped into this beautiful story, became part of it, and fulfilled a patriotic role, along with all the others on that memorable flight, as the flight Captain announced, "We are privileged to soon be carrying the mortal remains of a navy serviceman back to his family. We request a moment of silence."

With that, the casket (still in a transport box) was brought ceremoniously to the plane's storage space while Naval servicemen held their saluting pose. Silence reigned aboard the plane during this surreal but powerful experience. Later, into a quite subdued audience, the Captain asked the Attendants to "prepare for landing." He continued, "Upon touchdown, you will notice military police, Naval officers and the family gathered in expectation. Please observe a respectful silence while they carry out their reverent duties. It has been an honor to bring our fallen brother on his final journey back home to his family and loved ones."

As they witnessed this beautiful, moving, and sad scene, the two sisters began to pray the Rosary. With that, the flag-draped coffin was slowly brought out of the plane while the military personnel saluted and the family burst into tears. Tears were abundant on the plane as well, as passengers strained to witness the events — and one could sense many human hearts thanking GOD for America, and begging Him that we always witness to such a profound honor and respect for all life!

### **Patriotic Duty for Catholics**

It's been said that Anti-Catholicism is one of the last acceptable prejudices left in the U.S.. Yet, as Catholic citizens of this great Country, we have a responsibility to foster love of country in a spirit of gratitude to God and in service to all.

Americans questioned whether a Catholic could be a good citizen. Yet, from the beginning, we knew there is no conflict between our faith and commitment to one's country. And over the years, we've proven that, time and again, by serving proudly in uniform - fighting and dying alongside Protestants, Jews and non-believers. Catholics have also distinguished themselves in public service, serving loyally at every level of government, promoting human dignity and the common good. And throughout society, we have transformed entire institutions for the better.... from schools to charitable organizations to hospitals.

In our own day and age, many question whether anyone should be a patriot. Cultural elites tell us that patriotism means the same thing as blind nationalism - and that it tends toward arrogance, aggression and advancing one country's interest at the expense of others. They insist that patriotism is an outdated ideal that should be put aside for the sake of so-called progress. And they tell us that our love of country is misplaced because our country is not worthy of our love. The Church teaches us that patriotism

is not and never has been about national supremacy. Nor is it an excuse to exclude or vilify the foreigner or the immigrant. It's not a weapon to be used against other nations or people. Rather, patriotism is a duty that flows from a sense of gratitude.

Saint John Paul II saw gratitude as the starting point for faith and hope. In his apostolic letter *Novo Millennio Incunte* at the close of the Jubilee Year 2000, he urged us "to remember the past with gratitude, to live the present with enthusiasm and to look forward to the future with confidence." Twenty-five years later, his words remain wise and timely counsel, and they reflect the spirit of true patriotism. Gratitude and hope lead to love of country and service to neighbor, and they are an antidote to the nihilism and meaninglessness that have a strangle-hold on so many people today.

Patriotism is not only a virtue, but also an obligation for us all. And just as patriotism calls us to defend our country we have a duty to remind our fellow citizens that our nation isn't defined by its failures, past or present. Nations, just like people, are so much more than the sum of their mistakes. We have inherited something precious, which we must treasure, even if our nation will always be a work in progress. And we must teach future generations to do the same. Pope Benedict XVI observed that each successive generation faces anew the challenge to build a just and virtuous society - perennial yet ever urgent task. "Freedom," he wrote, "must constantly be won over for the cause of good." During the welcoming ceremony for his visit to the United States several months later, in April 2008, he further reflected, "Freedom is not only a gift, but also a summons to personal responsibility. The preservation of freedom calls for the cultivation of virtue, self-discipline, and sacrificing for the common good and a sense of

responsibility towards the less fortunate. It also demands courage to engage in civic life and to bring one's deepest beliefs and values to reasoned public debate. Patriotism matters. And, it's our duty, a duty of gratitude to God that we must instill in our children and grandchildren.

# THE MASS EXPLAINED



### The Mass: Compass Points?

### To live and love our Catholic Faith, we have to know it!

[taken from Our Sunday Visitor & Inside the Vatican / August, 2016] Each week we will examine the mass, piece by piece, looking at all the elements that go into this great prayer, the greatest act of worship of the Roman Catholic Church.

hat difference does it make what direction the priest and people face when celebrating the Eucharist? What does it mean to "face east?" To speak of facing east during the Eucharistic prayer is not simply equated with facing "compass east." Given grids of cities and the layout of buildings, churches cannot always be situated facing east. Facing east [ad orientem] refers to a common stance of the priest and the people, during the Eucharistic prayer, where both priest and congregation face toward the Tabernacle and crucifix. As such, they are looking through Christ, to the Father. Christ is our Oriens, our "East," and he orients us to his Father.

This stance emphasizes that the priest, acting in the person of Christ the Head, is speaking to the Heavenly Father on our behalf. One who represents a group before an official, usually stands facing that individual with the people behind or beside him; so, too, here. After all, the Mass is not per se a re-enactment of the Last Supper. Rather, it is the making present of the once-for-all perfect sacrifice of Jesus on the cross and his glorious Resurrection. Christ himself pointed beyond the moment of the Last Supper to the cross: "This is my body, which will be given for you.... This is ... my blood, which will be shed for you" (Lk 22:19-20).

"So when in the reflections on the liturgy we concentrate all our attention on how to make it attractive, interesting and beautiful, we risk forgetting the essential: the liturgy is celebrated for God and not for ourselves; it is His work, He is the subject." [Pope Benedict, October 12, 2012]. Secularism purports that the ancient, sacred rites of the Church are not enough... they no longer "speak to us." Therefore, in an attempt to make the liturgy meaningful and relevant to "me" all sorts of secular innovations and elements are vociferously and aggressively asserted by those who have embraced the secular culture around us [i.e. secular songs, non-scriptural readings, eulogies, sentimental additions of secular objects and "rituals" being added to the mass, etc.] These "innovations" or aberrations are contrary to proper Catholic piety, devotion and faith, and must be resisted if the sacredness and proper focus of the liturgy is to be maintained.

Cardinal Robert Sarah, former head of the Congregation for Divine Worship in Rome, gave an interview in which he discussed the beauty of the

Catholic liturgy. Along with offering many other insights, he recommended that priests orient themselves "to the East" while celebrating Holy Mass. In other words, he is encouraging priests to celebrate the liturgy ad orientem, facing east. This has nothing to do with the priest "turning his back" on the people; it is about the priest leading the faithful in facing the Lord. The practice of orienting the liturgy toward the East — from where the Lord will return (Matt. 24:27) — has ancient roots. It remains the norm in Orthodox Christianity and Eastern Catholic Churches.

This posture was not discouraged by the Second Vatican Council in its Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium). The Council Fathers noted with eloquence in their document on the liturgy: "In the earthly liturgy we take part in a foretaste of that heavenly liturgy which is celebrated in the holy city of Jerusalem toward which we journey as pilgrims, where Christ is sitting at the right hand of God... Venerating the memory of the saints, we hope for some part and fellowship with them; we eagerly await the Savior, Our Lord Jesus Christ, until He, our life, shall appear and we too will appear with Him in glory." This is the main point Cardinal Sarah is making: that the liturgy is an encounter with, a foretaste of, the heavenly liturgy — of heaven itself.

Saint John Damascene wrote in the 7th century... "We worship God seeking and striving after our old fatherland. Moreover, the tent of Moses had its veil and mercy seat towards the East. Also the tribe of Judah as the most precious pitched their camp on the East. Also in the celebrated temple of Solomon, the Gate of the Lord, was placed eastward... And when Christ was received again into Heaven, He was borne towards the East, and thus His apostles worship Him, and thus He will come again in the way in which they beheld Him going towards Heaven; as the Lord Himself said, 'As the lightning cometh out of the East and shines even unto the West, so also shall the coming of the Son of Man be."

Pope Benedict XVI, one of the great liturgists of our age, in his seminal hook, *The Spirit of the Liturgy*, written when he was still Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, should be read by every Catholic. In the last full year of his service, Benedict gave a beautiful series of instructions on the liturgy. On October 3, 2012, he reminded the pilgrims in St. Peter's Square: "It is not the individual — priest or layman — or the group that celebrates the liturgy, but it is primarily God's action through the Church, which has its own history, its rich tradition and creativity. This universality and fundamental openness, which is characteristic of the entire liturgy, is one of the reasons why it cannot be created or amended by the individual community or by experts, but must be faithful to the Forms of the universal Church." Sacrosanctum Concilium, #3 states it very clearly.... *Therefore no other person, even if he be a priest, may add, remove, or change anything in the liturgy on his own authority*.

# **Eucharistic Miracles LEGNICA, POLAND 2013**

Eucharistic Miracle Legnica, Poland 2013





In St. Hyacinth's Church in Legnica, during Holy Mass, on December 25, 2013, a Host accidentally fell on the ground, during the distribution of Communion. It was immediately placed in a container with water and closed

in the tabernacle as required by code of Canon Law.

A few days later, a red spot appeared on Its surface. The Bishop of Legnica at the time, Stefan Cichy, decided to establish a commission for a scientific analysis. The results were surprising, and confirmed that It had similarities to "human heart muscle with alterations that often appear during the agony".

... St. Hyacinth's priest, Father Andrzej Ziombra, said that on January 4th, along with other priests, he went to see if the consecrated Host had dissolved in the water after nearly two weeks: "Immediately we noticed that the Host had not dissolved, and that a red spot covering a fifth of Its surface appeared. We decided to inform the Bishop, who established a special theological scientific commission to analyze the event.

We noticed that over time the stain on the Host changed color from deep red to red brown (...). The sample was taken directly by the scientists on 26 January 2014. For the priests the miracle was evident.

The commission checked if It was some fungus, mold or another external agent (...). The Wrocław Forensic Medicine Institute immediately excluded the presence of bacteria or fungi as a cause for the Host turning red. A second histopathological analysis pointed out that some fragments seemed to belong to myocardial tissue.

An additional opinion was sought using the same samples at the Institute of Forensic Medicine in Szczecin without specifying where the samples came from. The Institute used a different analysis method. After the analysis, The Pomeranian Medical University's Department of Histopathology in Szczecin announced that "tissue fragments containing fragmented parts of cross-striated muscle" was found in the histopathological image. This is similar to "human heart muscle with alterations that often appear during the agony. We have not tested the blood found on the Host, we only know that human DNA was found." The results of the analysis were presented to the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which recognized the supernatural nature of the event.

It is striking that the examination results were similar to those of the Lanciano Eucharistic Miracle of 700 A.D. and other Miracles that occurred recently such as Sokolka in 2008, in Poland, Tixtla in 2006 in Mexico, and Buenos Aires, in Argentina in 1996.

On April 17, 2016, following the instructions received by the Holy See, Monsignor Zbigniew Kiernikowskiego, the new Bishop of Legnica, announced during Mass that the parish priest Fr Andrzej Ziombra should "prepare a suitable place for the exhibition of the precious relic, so that the faithful can express their adoration properly".

# Registration for the 2025/2026 Religious Education year is now open.

Children can be registered in the program beginning in 1st grade. The Diocese of Joliet requires two years of preparation prior to receiving sacraments, so in order for children to make their First Communion at the end of 2nd grade (Eucharist 2), they must complete Eucharist 1.

Similarly, with the move to Confirmation to the fall of Confirmation 2 (typically 8th grade), preparation for this sacrament must begin earlier, in what is currently called "PreConfirmation" (typically 6th grade). The completion of the 5th grade curriculum is a prerequisite to register for PreConfirmation.

Registration packets are available on the RE Page of the parish website and in the church vestibule.

We also offer specialized classes for children and adults with disabilities through our REACH program, generously subsidized by the Knights of Columbus. Please contact us if you are interested in this program.

Volunteers are always needed! If you are interested in helping in the religious education program next year, please contact the RE Office at 630-357-2436. You don't need to have a child in the program to help!

### Saint Vincent de Paul


