A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parish Family,
Today, we celebrate the **Solemnity of Pentecost** - the Birthday of the Church and the end of the Easter Season. It was on Pentecost that the Lord's promised gift of the Holy Spirit was poured forth upon the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin Mary. It was on this day that the Spirit of Knowledge, Understanding, Wisdom, Piety, Fortitude, Counsel, and Fear of the Lord came upon them and filled them with a sense of mission to accomplish all that Christ had commanded them to do in His name. That mission given to the Apostles on Pentecost continues to this day with all of us.

There are a variety of ministries and apostolates available at Saints Peter and Paul Parish. *Good Stewardship* of the Lord's blessings involve gifts of our *time* and *talent*, along with our *treasure*. All three are important. All three are necessary. But, more importantly, our involvements in the Church are ways in which we carry out the Lord's command to "preach the Gospel to all people!" At the same time, our "doing" of the Gospel, helps us to grow in holiness.

The Ascension of Jesus teaches us that WE are His hands, His feet, His voice, and His love in the world today. Pentecost, celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit into the life of the Church to make our "doing" of the Gospel possible. Let's all do our part. Consider your involvement in the life of the parish, and decide what YOU are going to do to add to the vibrancy of Saints Peter and Paul Parish.

By now you should have received the mailing concerning the necessary repairs to the Altar of Sacrifice, pews, and wooden floor in our church. Hopefully, everyone will take their part in financially supporting the project to *Preserve our Heritage*, and make the necessary repairs to our beautiful church building. Next weekend is Father's Day. And, we'll have yet another opportunity to provide assistance to all those who have given their lives in service to the Church. Each year, throughout the Diocese of Joliet, the Bishop asks us to take up a special second-collection to support our retired and infirm priests in the Diocese of Joliet. You'll remember that in December



there is a National Collection for the retired religious sisters, priests, and brothers, members of religious orders who have served the Church. In June, the Diocese of Joliet takes up a collection for the retired and infirm Diocesan Priests who have served in the parishes throughout our Diocese. Please be generous in helping those who have helped us all, so much. Give to those who have given their lives for you. Help our own Diocesan Priests to live out their retirement years in dignity, without worry regarding their housing, care, and other needs. They have given the Church so much, now it is our turn to give back and say "thank you" for their lives of service.

These are just two ways you can give back for the blessings you and your family have received. As I said, a variety of ways exist in our parish to be more involved, a good steward of the Lord's goodness to you. Our share in the mission of the Church began with our own Baptism. Over the twelve years of His Pontificate, I heard Pope Francis challenge Catholics to "find out" the day of their Baptism and to keep it as a special day in your life — like your birthday — the Pope said. With the feast of Pentecost, the beginning of the Church's mission, let's use this day to re-dedicate ourselves to the "part" of the mission Jesus has given each one of us to do. Let's remember the day of our own Baptism (mine was on March 10, 1963). Together, let's thank God, and our parents for the gift of faith we were given on that special day of our own Baptisms. Let's re-dedicate ourselves to being faithful and active followers of the Lord in our daily lives.

You and I share in the mission of the Church. Today's readings remind us that each of us are to use the unique gifts and talents given to us by the Holy Spirit to further the work and mission of the Church. *What are you doing for Jesus? What is your life saying for Him? What are you doing to further the mission of HIS Church?* Make sure you do something to celebrate "our" birthday!


2025 ALTAR AND CHURCH RESTORATION

The Altar

While the parish priests were performing the traditional washing of the Altars and sanctuary floor in preparation of the Good Friday Services, Father De Salvo discovered that all eight of the black marble supports/legs holding up the massive marble top of the Main Altar of Sacrifice in our church were shattered. The weight of the mensa [the top of the Altar], is too heavy to be supported by the eight marble pillars/legs of the Altar. Installed in the 1970s for the reformed liturgy, the Altar has failed.

Total cost to properly repair the Altar of Sacrifice in our Church:
\$59,200

Total cost to restore High Altar [Tabernacle Altar] and Baptismal Font:
\$82,400 [if available/provided]

Church Pews and Floors

The pews in the church need refinishing. During the Covid shut-down, harsh chemicals were mandated to be used to sanitize the church. Because of this, the finish on the pews was ruined and must be replaced. Additionally, new kneelers need to be installed on the pews. They are more than 40 years old and are failing. Most importantly, the 100 year old wooden floor under the pews MUST be refinshed. The old finish is completely worn. Sanding and refinishing the floors before further damage is done will save us the expense of completely replacing the wood floors under the pews.

Total cost to refinish/repair pews: \$274,000

Total cost of new kneelers: \$49,400

Total cost to refinish the wood floor: \$35,000

*to totally replace the wood floor would be hundreds of thousands of dollars. Our 100 year floor has one more refinishing in it, saving us a lot of money.

Pentecost: The Coming of the Holy Spirit

The Solemnity of Pentecost celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Apostles. At His Ascension, celebrated 40 days after Easter, the Lord promised that He would send the Spirit [the Paraclete] to His Apostles to fill them with His life, His Spirit, so that they will be able to courageously and faithfully proclaim His Gospel and give witness to Him. On Pentecost, 50 days after Easter, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit with His seven-fold gifts.

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are **wisdom, understanding, knowledge, holy fear of the Lord, counsel, piety, and fortitude**. These same gifts, given to Mary and the Apostles at Pentecost, were given to each of us at Baptism and sealed, or poured forth in abundance upon us at Confirmation. By nature, the gifts are supernatural "habits" because they dispose us to do something easily. They incline us to steadily and constantly follow the inspirations of the Holy Spirit.

The gift of **wisdom** enables us to judge rightly the things of God; this gift gives us a kind of divine "taste" for the Lord and His will. The gift of **understanding** empowers us to better understand and enter into divinely revealed truths and the connections between them in the Catholic faith. The gift of **knowledge** enables us to see and judge rightly about created things, and to use these as stepping stones to glory while we see God in all things. The gift of **counsel** gives us the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to judge rightly about particular events, what is to be done or avoided on the road to heaven. The gift of **piety** enables us to form a childlike affection for God as our Father; it also supports our universal love for others. It enables us to grow in holiness, devotion, and in our love for God. The gift of **fortitude** moves us under the power of the Holy Spirit to heroic practice of virtue and to overcoming all dangers on the path to heaven. Finally, the gift of a **holy fear of the Lord** empowers us to be teachable and submissive to God's will out of respect and reverence for the divine majesty of the infinite God. This gift teaches us to love God, to remember death and judgement. This gift teaches us, and enables us to grow in *humility*, the foundation of all virtues and holiness... knowing our place, who we are and who we are not before God and others.

Let our prayer this Pentecost day, be in our hearts always... *Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful, and enkindle in us the fire of your love.*

Today's Feast... Pentecost

The word *Pentecost* comes from two Greek words; it simply means *fiftieth-day*. Pentecost Sunday ends the season of Easter; it is the Sabbath Day after a week's worth of weeks [7 x 7 = 49]. Today's feast of Pentecost grew from what was originally a festival marking the first grain harvest of the Middle Eastern year, marked by a sacrifice to the gods from the first part of that first harvest. In very ancient Palestine, this first-fruit sacrifice was tightly tied into the religions of the gods of power and fertility (both in farming and in fertility). As the Jews grew to understand themselves as followers of the one and only true God, they created ways to be thankful to Him for the first harvest, without the pagan trappings. As the Jewish kings started to centralize religious activity to Jerusalem (a process that took several centuries), this pilgrimage and sacrifice was brought there, with all the songs, processions, liturgies and pageantry that Jerusalem did so well. To them, the 50-day period was the week's worth of weeks after the Unleavened Bread (Passover).

Pentecost (*Shavu'ot*) was the celebration of a blessing of harvest, and its joy was symbolized by leavening the bread. The festival began to take on another religious role around the time of the Exile. Because Exodus 19:1 describes the arrival of the Jewish people at Sinai as being at about that time of year, Pentecost was used to mark the giving of the Torah at Sinai. Over time, the Torah became more prominent in the *Feast of Weeks* celebrations.

As Saint Luke reports it, the believers had gathered together after Jesus returned to the Father. Not just the 12 disciples, but about 120 of them. They were talking, remembering, praying, wondering what was next. (They had just been through several of the strangest months there ever were.) On the morning of Pentecost, they came out of the room, and started telling the people they met about Jesus, enlightened by the Holy Spirit. The streets were full of people from many places, mostly there for the holy day, some still hanging around from Passover. When each of them heard the witnesses speak, they heard it in their own language! (That is, if they were allowing themselves to listen; otherwise, they heard babbling, as shown by the remarks about drunkenness.) What was being told, for the first time in full form, was the good news of Jesus and what it means for all people. But more than words - the words were being carried with power and authority by the Holy Spirit into the ears and the hearts of those who are listening. About 3000 new people join their ranks. This is the first fruits of a new kind of harvest, and the giving of a new covenant of grace that fulfils the covenant of the Torah, the Law.

Pentecost was not the first time the Spirit was active. The Spirit had been working all along in people who listened, giving them guidance, teaching, shedding light on the mysteries of life, and causing prophecies. But Pentecost was the first day that the Spirit took hold of the followers of Christ as a group or "body," and came to stay. It was the first time the Holy Spirit's raw power was there in anyone who followed Christ, not just the Twelve. It was the first time they had a complete message, an empowered mission or purpose, and a unity that came from beyond themselves. Before, they were just another small circle of people following a leader around; now, they had become the Church, an entity that would eventually be measured in billions. The difference? The arrival of the Holy Spirit in force, to join them together into one. With Pentecost, the Church was born... Happy Birthday!


Sacred Heart of Jesus Christ The Month of June

The Month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus Christ. Many devotional exercises are connected with the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Of all devotions, devotion to the Sacred Heart was, and remains, one of the most widespread and popular in the Church. Understood in the light of the Scriptures, the term "*Sacred Heart of Jesus*" denotes the entire mystery of Christ, the totality of his being, and his person considered in its most intimate essential: Son of God, uncreated wisdom; infinite charity, principal of the salvation and sanctification of mankind. The "*Sacred Heart*" is Christ, the Word Incarnate, Savior, intrinsically containing, in the Spirit, an infinite divine-human love for the Father and for his brothers.

Twelve Promises of Jesus to Saint Margaret Mary

In the apparitions to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, Jesus gives these twelve promises for those who are devoted to His Sacred Heart.

1. I will give them all the graces necessary for their state of life.
2. I will establish peace in their families.
3. I will console them in all their troubles.
4. They shall find in My Heart an assured refuge during life and especially at the hour of their death.
5. I will pour abundant blessings on all their undertakings.
6. Sinners shall find in My Heart the source of an infinite ocean of mercy.
7. Tepid souls shall become fervent.
8. Fervent souls shall speedily rise to great perfection.
9. I will bless the homes where an image of My Heart shall be exposed and honored.
10. I will give to priests the power of touching the most hardened hearts.
11. Those who propagate this devotion shall have their names written in My Heart, never to be effaced.
12. The all-powerful love of My Heart will grant to all those who shall receive Communion on the First Friday of nine consecutive months the grace of final repentance; they shall not die under my displeasure, nor without receiving their Sacraments; My heart shall be their assured refuge at that last hour.



Mass is different today... Why? The Solemnity of Pentecost

In most families, birthdays are special occasions. Whatever the family customs may be, usually the day is marked with special celebrations, somehow marking the day's "festive nature." The same is true in *our family*, the Catholic Church.

Pentecost is the "birthday" of the Church. It comes fifty days after Easter and closes the Easter Season and our celebration of the Lord's Resurrection. And so, it is only natural that the liturgy we celebrate today would be marked with special features to let us know that something is different, this is a great day of celebration.

The music reflects our joy at the coming of the Holy Spirit. The ancient hymn, from the 6th century, *Veni Creator Spiritus* is heard. *Come, Creator Spirit* fills our prayers and singing today. Since Pentecost celebrates the Church's beginning, at some of the Masses celebrated today we may be sprinkled with Holy Water as a reminder of our own Baptism, our own "beginning" of faith. Pentecost celebrates the beginning of the Church's Mission... the *Water Rite* we may observe today celebrates and reminds us of our own mission to make Christ known; a mission begun in the Waters of Baptism.

Following the second reading, before the Alleluia to greet the Gospel is sung, the Church gives us a special hymn of praise in honor of today's Feast. The Sequence of Pentecost dates back centuries. At one time there was quite a few more "sequences" to be sung for various feasts. Since the reform of the Liturgy by the Second Vatican Council only a few remain. Sequences, or songs of praise in honor of a particular feast are sung on Easter, Pentecost, Corpus Christi, and the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows [September 15th]. The sequence is meant to add a note of festivity to the Mass, and draw our attention to what we are celebrating. The Sequence for Pentecost, *Veni Sanctae Spiritus... Come, Holy Spirit*, beautifully showcases today's feast.

A third element in today's celebration is the presence of the Paschal Candle, the Easter Candle - a symbol of the Risen Christ. The Great Candle was blessed at the celebration of Easter, the Easter Vigil, on Holy Saturday night. The Paschal Candle has remained in our sanctuary throughout the fifty-days of the Easter Season. With Pentecost, the Easter Candle is removed from the sanctuary and stands by the Baptismal Font. It will be lit throughout the year whenever moments of birth [Baptism] and "Re-birth" [funerals] are celebrated. Whenever you see the Candle returned to the sanctuary for use throughout the Liturgical Year, remember that it is used and serves as a reminder of the abiding presence of the Risen Christ, who dispels the darkness of sin and death.


Finally, our liturgy ends with the solemn dismissal... *Go in peace. Alleluia!* This festive greeting, with the triple *alleluias* at the end is used on days of great celebration and solemnity in the Church. The greeting is meant to send us forth with great joy, to celebrate and make known the presence of Jesus Christ, living among us, leading us home to Heaven. Enjoy the beauty and ancient solemnity of this wonderful feast!

The Mass: "And with your spirit..."

A Matter of Words

The English Translation of the Roman Missal

To live and love our Catholic Faith, we have to know it!

Each week we will examine the mass, piece by piece, looking at all the elements that go into this great prayer, the greatest act of worship of the Roman Catholic Church.

The Mass begins with a greeting that is no ordinary, "Hi! How ya doin'?" greeting. Rather, it is a ritual greeting and response — *The Lord be with you / And with your spirit*. This is not so much a way to say "hello" but more of a way to enter into the liturgical rite by extending a solemn wish to someone undertaking a profound task.

This ritual exchange takes place at several other critical moments in the Mass: as we are about to hear the Gospel proclaimed; as we enter into the Eucharistic Prayer; as we are about to be dismissed. The priest's greeting represents his prayer that the Lord be with us as we are about to undertake these profound tasks. Our response, "and with your spirit," is much more than a "back at ya." It is our prayer that the Lord be with the priest in his unique role as the ordained celebrant of the liturgy and as the head of the gathered body, the liturgical assembly... the one among us in *Holy Orders*, who presides or *orders* our gathering and our prayer.

It is also important to remember that this liturgical greeting is scriptural. Remember that from the earliest years of the Church, we have the tradition of taking quotes and allusions from Scripture, and putting them in the texts of our liturgical prayers. "The Lord be with you" is a greeting that can be found in Ruth 2:4. The response, "and with your spirit" is based on Paul's greetings to the communities to whom he was writing (Gal 6:18, 2 Tm 4:22). Finally, the words, "and with your spirit" more closely

correspond to the Latin original and "official" text of the Mass, and are more consistent with the response as it appears in other languages.

Since the First Sunday of Advent [November 2011], Catholics throughout the English-speaking world have been wrapping their minds and their tongues around the changes to the Missal. While not everyone is happy with the changes — especially many people who do not remember the pre-Vatican II Mass — most seem to be enthusiastically embracing them. Several said they don't see what the big deal is.

As we continue to "get-used-to" the changes, congregations tend to mumble a bit, especially when the response "and with your spirit" is called for. That response, which used to be "and also with you," occurs five times over the course of the Mass, and expresses the more "vertical" dimension of the liturgy, moving it away from the "horizontal" ... *person-centered encounter*. The response seeks to raise our minds and hearts to God, and the action Christ is accomplishing through the priest. It also seems to be the most difficult for people to remember, according to what many Catholics have reported. Perhaps that is because folks are not always looking at a missal, and the response comes up rather quickly in the mass. Nonetheless, careful attention to the prayers of the Mass will help us all to embrace the changes with fervor, and enter deeper into the mystery of the Mass, because we are growing in our knowledge and appreciation for the mystery we celebrate.






Prayer Shawl Meeting
