A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

ear Parish Family,

Today we celebrate the Liturgy for the 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time. In the first reading, the Lord promises Abraham and Sarah a son after they show abundant hospitality to their guests. And, in the Gospel, Martha becomes frustrated with Mary for not helping her serve Jesus. We see in the exchange between Martha, Mary, and Jesus the two dimensions of the true Christian life: WORSHIP and WORK. Both are necessary to live as a true Disciple of Jesus. Our faith MUST be seen in action.

The readings today highlight God's goodness through generosity. From blessing Abraham and Sarah with their long-awaited child to assuring Martha that she need not worry, the Lord knows our deepest needs and responds to them.

Today, we are being given the incredible and beautiful opportunity to model this compassionate response in our own lives.... Today we're being given the opportunity to grow in HOLINESS. To recognize God's goodness and respond with generosity.

Joining us for our Masses this weekend are The Little Sisters of the Poor. I've known the Sisters for over 40 years. To me, they are always welcome. Their religious life shows us exactly what Jesus is talking about in today's Gospel. In a very real, concrete, quiet, unassuming, day-in and day-out sort of way... through their simple and quiet life of prayer and contemplation, they grow in holiness and are able to recognize the face of God in the elderly poor they care for. Then, they put the fruits of their prayer into ACTION, in their service to the elderly. In everything they do, the Sisters show us the love, compassion and helping hand of Jesus. The elderly poor, who the sisters care for, are not at all "great" in the world's eyes. And yet, the work the sisters do is beyond measure.... beyond price in God's eyes.

I invited the Sisters here this weekend to share with us their work. Although they may not agree, the Sisters should not be grateful, at all, that we invited them to come and speak to us. Rather, I really do believe — and that's why they're here — WE should be grateful to them that they have come and have given us the opportunity to share in their beautiful work of caring for God's poor, the elderly poor... certainly, those among the most vulnerable among us. And, what's more, as a blessing, and opportunity for us to grow in holiness... to put faith in action, they allow us to join with them in their witness and work. How could we not progress in the spiritual life? How could we not take advantage of the opportunity being given us to grow in holiness?

And so, this weekend we welcome Sister Amy Marie and The Little Sisters of the Poor from Saint Joseph's Home in Palatine. The Order was founded in France in 1839. The sisters do incredible work in caring for the elderly poor. They do it with such humility, love, care, and dedication. God must certainly be smiling on their efforts. And, I want to



thank the sisters for coming, and giving us, here at Saints Peter and Paul Parish the privilege of assisting them in their work. There are a variety of ways ALL OF US can assist these beautiful sisters in their work:

- PRAY for the Little Sisters of the Poor.... not only for their work, but for vocations to the Order. Perhaps God is calling some of our young ladies from Naperville to care for the elderly poor as a Little Sister? Consider going to the Home in Palatine and seeing the Sisters life, first hand.
- Sisters. Monetary contributions are always needed. The sisters rely solely on *Divine Providence*. They do not allow endowments, portfolios, etc. Instead, they abandon themselves completely to the Divine Providence of Almighty God. What He provides through generous donors is what they have to care for the poor. Their need at the home in Palatine is great. In addition to the donations greatly needed to provide care, major work is needed on their building. Give generously, and share in the spiritual benefits of their work.
- VOLUNTEER... Countless opportunities for you to offer your expertise and professional skills are available. Individuals connected with companies donate services, food products, cleaning supplies, etc., everything needed to run a house and care for the elderly. Never under-estimate what you can give! There is always something that needs doing for the sisters and the residents. Other people contribute time to spend with residents, sharing their abilities, interests, etc. Families are also welcome to visit and help with various projects and events. Teach your children the beautiful "art of giving." Grow in holiness, through service, together. I'm hoping more of our parish organizations will provide service to the home.
- SPREAD THE WORD... Let others know about the work of the Little Sisters and their needs.

Please welcome the Little Sisters of the Poor, be generous in your response to their appeal, support their work, and know that God will certainly bless you for your care for His poor!

A vocation to the Little Sisters of the Poor is a unique call from God to live for him alone. Usually, when Catholics in the United States think of *the sisters*, we think of the nuns teaching in our schools - or perhaps sponsoring hospitals (that is their more well-known work in the U.S.). But the Little Sisters live a more "private" or unseen vocation in healthcare and social service. As Little Sisters of the Poor, we care for the elderly poor in the spirit of humble service which we have received from Saint Jeanne Jugan, the foundress of our Religious Community which began in 1839. We welcome the elderly as we would Jesus Christ himself and serve them with love and respect until God calls them to himself.

Steps you might take in discerning whether God is calling you to follow Saint Jeanne Jugan as a Little Sister of the Poor:

BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: Are you anxious about many things? Then you need to be right where Mary is: at the feet of Jesus, with all your burdens.

Martha's Burdens

It's time to admit it: I've been unfair to Mary in the past. Been a little catty about her. *Oooh*, *Mary*, *she's so holy*. Well, do you like to eat, Mary? Who made your lunch? Yeah, that's right: it was Martha. Because you know what? It's the Marthas who get things done in the world while the Marys lounge around reading Aquinas and attending silent retreats and going to Eucharistic Adoration whenever they want.

And there you have it, folks: my bitterness on full display! I tend to identify with Martha, not with Mary, and I need to stop doing that.

Because I am not Martha instead of Mary. I am both. We are all both. $\,$

Mary was a woman; she was expected to do the serving, too. She shared that burden; she wasn't abandoning it, heaping her portion on Martha. And it's so wrong to assume that Mary didn't have the same cares and anxieties as Martha — perhaps she even had more!

Here's the difference: Mary, unlike Martha (and me, I guess) knew where to go with them.

We typically see our burdens as an impediment to a relationship with Christ. I'm so busy. I'm so overwhelmed. There are so many demands on me, on my time, on my person, on my finances. Take a number, Jesus. Get in line. But we're thinking the wrong way. Burdens aren't an obstacle that stands between us and Christ. Burdens are the straightest path to his feet.

God knows about burdens, okay? Aside from being all-wise and all-knowing, he basically completed a doctorate in suffering, taking on a human form (itself kind of a burden, if you think about it) and for 33 years lived among the hardest and heaviest burdens this world has to offer.

Why did he do this? Well, part of the reason was so that we could finally understand that our burdens aren't a barrier between us and God. On the contrary, they connect us to him.

Are you anxious about many things? Then you need to be right where Mary is: at the feet of Jesus, with all your burdens.



Saints of the Week

St. Bridget of Sweden-July 23



Saint Bridget or Birgitta was born in 1303, the daughter of Birger Petersson, governor of Uppland and his wife Ingeborg Bengtsdotter. She was married to Ulf Gudmarsson, who became governor of the province of Nericia. They had eight children, all of whom survived past infancy which was rare for the 12th century. One of their daughters would become St. Catherine of Sweden.

Saint Bridget was hailed as a mystic and her visions, which began in her early childhood when she had visions of Christ Crucified, made her somewhat of a Middle Ages celebrity. Her vision of the Nativity of Jesus even influenced the art of the Nativity through the Baroque era! She is said to have predicted the Vatican State. Saint Bridget's Revelations, which she dictated to Peter Olafsson, the prior at the Cistercian monastery of Alvastra near which she retired after her husband's death in 1344, were published in 1492. They have since been published in many languages and can still be purchased today.

Some of her most profound visions regarded the founding of a new religious order which would be primarily for women, ruled by an abbess, but with a separate house for monks who would serve as order chaplains. Her visions detailed everything from the abbey church to the clothing that would be adopted as the nun's habit, and how the order would be ruled. King Magnus II of Sweden granted Bridget land and buildings. The order, called the Bridgettines or the Order of the Most Holy Savior was approved by Pope Urban V in 1370.

Saint Bridget was canonized in 1391 by Pope Boniface IX and in 1999 Pope John Paul II named her one of the Patron Saints of Europe.

St. James the Apostle- July 25



Saint James the Apostle is also called James, son of Zebedee, or James the Greater to distinguish him from the other James in Jesus' group of twelve. Most of what we know about Saint James is recorded in the New Testament. He and his brother John were collected by Jesus along the sea of Galilee. Matthew 4:18-22 tells the story of Jesus calling first Simon Peter and his brother Andrew and then the sons of Zebedee. In

Mark 3:17 the brothers receive a nickname from Jesus who calls them "sons of thunder" because of their many extreme reactions, like that in Luke 9:54 when they offer to call down fire on a Samaritan village.

Saint James was part of Jesus' intimate circle, a witness to the Transfiguration, the resurrection of Jarius' daughter, and the agony in the garden of Gethsemane. In A.D. 44 Herod Agrippa had "James, the brother of John, killed by the sword." (Acts 12:2) He is the only apostle whose martyrdom is written of in the New Testament.

According to Spanish tradition, his body was taken to Santiago de Compostela, Spain where his relics were rediscovered in 9th century. This tradition has sometimes been attributed to a passage in the Song of Roland which tells of St. James appearing to Charlemagne in a dream, prophesying that Charlemagne would conquer the Moors in Spain. This was followed by a vision of stars which if followed would lead to the saint's lost tomb. In the Middle Ages Compostela was a hugely popular pilgrimage site. The saint's relics continue to rest in the cathedral there and one can still undertake the pilgrimage.

2025 ALTAR AND CHURCH RESTORATION

Church Pews and Floors

The pews in the church need refinishing. During the Covid shut-down, harsh chemicals were mandated to be used to sanitize the church. Because of this, the finish on the pews was ruined and must be replaced. Additionally, new kneelers need to be installed on the pews. They are more than 40 years old and are failing. Most importantly, the 100 year old wooden floor under the pews MUST be refinished. The old finish is completely worn. Sanding and refinishing the floors before further damage is done will save us the expense of completely replacing the wood floors under the pews.

The Altar


While the parish priests were performing the traditional washing of the Altars and sanctuary floor in preparation of the Good Friday Services, Father De Salvo discovered that all eight of the black marble supports/legs holding up the massive marble top of the Main Altar of Sacrifice in our church were shattered. The weight of the mensa [the top of the Altar], is too heavy to be supported by the eight marble pillars/legs of the Altar. Installed in the 1970s for the reformed liturgy, the Altar has failed.


