



Lesson from a Toddler written by a Parishioner


After Mass, I watched as a young mother walked her toddler son over to the altar and had him kneel there with her. He was barely able to peek over the kneeler to see the altar. Shortly thereafter, she lifted him into her arms and they headed towards the exit, and I watched as he waved his tiny hand towards the Tabernacle and shouted, "Bye-bye!"

What a wonderfully sweet thing to witness! I was sure that Jesus was smiling, like I was, at such a beautiful acknowledgement of His Presence.

That young boy's gesture got me thinking about my own greetings to our Lord. Does he smile at my greetings when I enter and exit church? Hmmm. Well, I always genuflect, but I must admit, my heart isn't always in it, and some days I may be paying more attention to my pew rather than looking at the Tabernacle when genuflecting.

I started thinking about what I do when I enter and leave anyone else's house. I certainly never have done what I have been guilty of here in God's house (by habit, if that is any defense), which is to barely acknowledge the Presence of the Host. And, of course, it is polite to look right at the person when greeting them, as to do otherwise would be, let's just say, rude, and a bit odd. But do I look at the Tabernacle when I greet Jesus on the way in or out of church? Well, to my credit, sometimes I do. (I think.)

Perhaps Jesus allowed me to witness the little boy's heartfelt gesture in order to suggest my first New Year's Resolution: to greet Jesus with my best genuflection while looking right at Him in the Tabernacle, each and every time I enter and leave the church. [I think I will actually be able to keep this resolution!] Maybe I'll add a short prayer as well, like "My Lord and My God." (But one thing at a time – hate to overburden myself!) In any case, that young boy's "prayer" of "bye-bye" gave a whole new meaning to Matthew 18:3: "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

The days are getting longer now. The sun will slowly start to warm the soil making it able to produce fruit. This is a good thing, because as much as I enjoy the winter months, I know that without the sun's rays we couldn't survive on this earth for very long. Every human being knows this, which makes me wonder why St. Padre Pio said that it would be easier for man to exist without the sun than to live without the Eucharist. St. Padre Pio was a mystic priest who bore the wounds of Christ. He could read souls in the Confessional. He could heal with a touch and was known to bilocate. He had a far greater understanding of spiritual things than most. We would do well to listen to his wisdom.

At Holy Family, we started offering Eucharistic Adoration back in 2020. It began during the months when, regrettably, churches were shut down. In place of public Mass (which as you recall were not permitted), we had an hour of Eucharistic Adoration at St. Joseph and Holy Family. When Masses resumed adoration was offered prior to the Noon Mass on Tuesdays and Thursdays. This past Fall we extended the hours to a full day of exposition on Thursdays after the 8 a.m. Mass until the evening.

Since then, people have expressed gratitude for this opportunity to be with the Lord in Eucharistic Adoration. They have shared the spiritual benefits receive from their time with Him. I know that it has brought fruit to the parish as well. No, it has not come in the form of large numbers returning to the Faith, or a bumper collection, but I believe there are buds forming that will one day bear much fruit. Adoration has reminded me that we cannot grasp at the Lord and bring about fruit on our own time. Rather we must be patient and humbly receive what He wishes to give us on His time.

I would like to invite you once more to sign up for a half hour or hour to adore the Lord. Ideally, we need two for each slot just in case someone is sick or unable to make their assigned time. I would like also to have a list of substitutes to fill in so we do not have to scramble to find an adorer in when they cannot make it. Please pray whether the Lord is calling you to sacrifice only 25 hours or 50 hours a year for Him in prayer. What does the Lord want to do for you? Blessings on you!
