

As he went through the park, he noticed an old woman sitting on a park bench. She looked lonely and hungry, so he sat down and offered a part of the chocolate bar he had been saving. She accepted it with a smile. He gave her more of the candy, and she shared a can of root beer with him. They sat together in a very friendly manner, eating and drinking and smiling at each other. When the boy got up to leave, he reached over to the woman and gave her a big hug. He walked home smiling. His mother noticed his big smile and happiness on his face and asked, "What did you do today that made you so happy?" "I had lunch with Jesus. And she has a great smile," he said. The old woman returned to the small apartment she shared with her sister. She, too, was smiling. Her sister asked her why she was so happy. "I just had lunch with Jesus. And he is a lot younger than I expected," she said.

We encounter Jesus in our lives in the most unexpected ways. That act of kindness from a stranger, someone is holding the door for us, a smile (hidden under the mask) seen through the eyes. We have our own walk to Emmaus; sometimes we are alone, other times we walk with friends and loved ones. However, we encounter Jesus in our lives, wherever we encounter him, it is always an eye-opening experience when we see him. Again, this week, we hear those four words, "Peace be with you." - •How will I do these mercy works: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty?

RESPECT LIFE

"Now I know brothers, that you acted out of ignorance, just as your leaders did." In Acts of the Apostles, First Reading, Peter is talking to a large group of Jewish people who gathered after he cured a disabled man in Christ's name at the Beautiful Gate of the Temple of Jerusalem. In Solomon's Portico, Peter talks of how they denied God's Holy and Righteous One and put Him to death. In testifying to Christ's Resurrection, Peter calls his listeners (and us) to repent.. When do we act, or don't act, out of ignorance to the needs of others, including families?. Learn, Act, Connect and Pray- Just as Mary suffered as she gazed at her son on the Cross, following Him until the end, many parents are forced to watch their sons and daughters struggle and suffer on our own city streets. Violence, addiction, poverty, gangs and sex trafficking rip too many young men and women from their families, trapping them in cycles of hopelessness and desperation that can be hard to break. We must go out and meet them where they are, as Mary set out to meet her son, Jesus, carrying the cross for us.




ONLINE REGISTRATION FOR MASS IS NOW AVAILABLE

Dear Friends, Christ is Risen!

Signs of Life are all around us in the Easter Season. When I celebrated the Easter Vigil in the Cathedral of St. Peter on April 3, I saw signs of life in the people gathered to worship, in the new paschal candle lit from the Easter fire and the beautiful flowers that decorated the sanctuary. Most importantly, I saw signs of life in welcoming into the Body of Christ the three people that I baptized and confirmed and who then received

the Body and Blood of Christ for the first time. I have also been privileged to see signs of life in celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation during the Easter Season. Hundreds of young people from our local church are asking to receive the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Confirmation. It is an impressive moment when you see young people, surrounded by their parents, family members and their sponsors, profess their faith in God and receive the Holy Spirit as they are anointed with Chrism. Years ago, I learned what the Church teaches about the sacraments of initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist. Once you have received all three sacraments, you are fully initiated into the Body of Christ. While I understood that the sacraments convey grace and draw us more deeply into life with the Holy Trinity, I still struggled a bit with articulating to others the tremendous power the sacraments conveyed. A chance meeting with a famous teacher helped me discover a succinct way to describe the power of the sacraments. Before his death this winter, Fr. Reginald Foster, a famous Latinist who worked for the Holy See for many years, had been teaching Latin classes in the Milwaukee area. Several years ago, I sat in on one of Father Foster's classes. In addition to translating Cicero, Father reviewed with the students a Latin hymn for Easter. The hymn described how the newly baptized were now "freed from death, so that they may be free for life." The truth of that phrase has been with me ever since. Only once we are freed from the finality of death by the self-emptying love of Jesus crucified and risen, can we be genuinely free for life; enjoying the gift of life as God intended for humanity when God created the first man and woman. In the sacraments of initiation, Christ is freeing us from death so that we may be free for life. The power of his saving death and resurrection are, in a true sense, applied to our wounded state, so that our sins are forgiven and that our mortal death will not have the final word over us. Now freed from the corruption and fear that comes from sin and death, we are able to embrace life. But it is not just a continuation of my previous life; rather I receive life now as God intended it from the beginning of creation. Receiving the fullness of life in Christ, we can imitate the self-emptying love of Jesus by generously spending our lives serving others. One saint who is an example of what it means to live as a person "free for life" is St. Maximillian Kolbe. Kolbe was a Franciscan priest who was arrested and sent to the Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland during the Second World War. When a prisoner escaped from the camp, the deputy camp commander ordered that ten prisoners be executed in retaliation. Franciszek Gajowniczek, a Polish army sergeant, was one of the ten prisoners selected for execution. When Gajowniczek cried out in agony over the fate of his family, Father Kolbe stepped forward and offered himself to the commander: "I would like to take his place." Kolbe's offer stunned many who witnessed the moment; the commander allowed Kolbe to take the place of Franciszek. After two weeks of starvation in a bunker, Kolbe was executed by a lethal injection of carbolic acid. Now canonized a saint, the Church commemorates Father Kolbe on August 14. Father Kolbe is a powerful example of someone who is "free for life" and was thus prepared to "give himself away" for another person's sake. Signs of Life are all around us this Easter. Please join me in asking the Lord to help each of us to become a living sign of his victory over sin and death. Freed from our deepest fears, may the Lord fill us with his light, peace and love. Now fully alive in Christ, may we give of ourselves freely and without counting the cost.



Many thanks for you support of March on the Arch with Coalition for Life and Bishop McGovern! We had a record turnout for our diocese and we were the largest group at the event. 
