

Once upon a time, there was a young woman who had become very scrupulous about the Eucharist. She was afraid that the priest was careless about distributing Communion and permitted tiny bits of the host to fall on the floor around the altar rail. After Mass was over and the priest had gone back to the Rectory, she would sneak up to the altar and collect what she thought might be parts of the hosts in which Jesus was still present. She would pick them up with a little spoon she always carried in her purse and place them in a little plastic bag. However, after she had collected many of these little bits of Jesus, she did not know what to do with them. So she brought them home and created a little altar in her room where she could pray to Jesus. Her parents thought it was nice that she had the little altar with a votive light burning in front of Jesus. Finally, one morning the priest caught her collecting bits of the Eucharist from the floor. Greatly embarrassed, she tried to explain what she was doing. The priest, who understood how young people could become obsessive, took the plastic bag from her and promised that he would wash it out in the special sacristy sink. But, Linda, he said, Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist to be with us because he loves us, not to drive us crazy with fears. If he were worried about such things, he would have used jellybeans at the last supper.

Those of you who have been attending our Summer Learning Series, "The Documents of Vatican II," have been somewhat surprised at some of the changes that came about from the sixteen documents. We only explore the four primary constitutional documents; it seems like every session; we learn something new. One of the general themes that echo through each document is how we celebrate Mass. Many of us remember some of the differences before Vatican II; Latin to English, the location of the Altar, the reverence, and devotion. Each change that came about offered us a new perspective on our Catholic Faith. We hear in scripture, "Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." The bread that we consume, changed into the body and blood of Jesus, is the foundation of our Sacramental belief in Transubstantiation. Before Vatican II, touching the Eucharistic Host was never heard of, or taking Communion with us to feed the homebound. Yes, earthly rituals change, but Jesus remains the same, and our devotion and reverence support our love for the gift that Jesus gave



Plenary Indulgences for the Year of St. Joseph

The Apostolic Penitentiary issued a decree to celebrate the Year of Saint Joseph through December 8, 2021. Special opportunities to receive a plenary indulgence were also included, subject to the usual conditions: sacramental confession, reception of Holy Communion, prayer for the intentions of the Pope, and total detachment to all sin, including venial sin.

How Are Bishops Selected?

On behalf of our entire diocese, I congratulate Father John Iffert on the good news that our Holy Father has appointed him the eleventh Bishop of Covington in Kentucky. I thank Pope Francis for appointing such a pastoral, compassionate and dedicated priest to the office of bishop. Father Iffert was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Belleville by Bishop Wilton Gregory in 1997 and has been a terrific shepherd to many people ever since. We will miss Bishop-elect Iffert, but trust that this is the work of the Holy Spirit and for the good of souls.

With this good news there can also come some questions. One of which is simply: how are Catholic bishops appointed? As many readers know, the Catholic faith has spread over the world and the Church is organized in units named dioceses. A diocese is a geographic territory which has a diocesan bishop appointed as shepherd for the clergy and faithful who live in that geographic area. There is usually an "archdiocese" in a region along with several dioceses nearby that are connected with the archdiocese. An archdiocese has an archbishop as the local shepherd, and a diocese has a bishop who presides over the local community.

When a diocese becomes vacant, such as when the bishop is retiring or dies in office, the Holy See begins a process of searching for a successor. In many nations, the Holy Father has a representative (the exact term is "papal nuncio") who is an archbishop and a diplomat, who interacts with the Catholic church in that country and also represents the Holy See to the nation's government. In the case of the United States, Archbishop Christophe Pierre, a native of France, is the papal nuncio. It would be Archbishop Pierre who would coordinate the process of surfacing the names of priests in our country who could be considered for the office of bishop.

Archbishops and bishops are normally the ones who suggest to the nuncio names of priests who could be considered for the role of bishop. The nuncio may then choose to vet a priest by confidentially consulting with bishops, priests, deacons, religious and lay people who would know a priest well enough to offer some insight into his suitability for the episcopacy. The process involves 25-30 people who receive a questionnaire and then return the completed document to the nuncio. All of this is in absolute confidence so that people can be as honest and forthright as possible in their responses. This may surprise you, but the priest is usually unaware that he is under consideration.

Finally, the names of three priests who might be suitable for a vacant diocese are presented by the nuncio to the Congregation for Bishops in Rome. This congregation, led by Cardinal Marc Ouellet, consists of 20 or so cardinals and bishops who meet every two weeks to consider the candidates who have been nominated. The members of the congregation consider the needs of a diocese and the qualities of the priests; the congregation members then vote and a list of three names (in order of first, second and third recommendation) is completed. Cardinal Ouellet then brings all of the information to the Holy Father for review and discussion. The Pope alone makes the decision of appointing a bishop. He may choose any of the three candidates or, in some cases, the Pope may ask for a different list of names (which means the process may take longer while a new list is created). Once the Holy Father makes his decision about the appointment of a new bishop, the decision is communicated to the papal nuncio who then contacts the priest who has been nominated. The priest may either say yes and accept the nomination to the episcopacy or he may decline (for instance, a priest may have a serious medical issue that no one knows about and he declines the appointment due to his health).

Once a priest accepts the Pope's appointment as a bishop, the priest cannot tell anyone until there is an official announcement. The nuncio will coordinate with the new bishop and the diocese receiving a new bishop an appropriate date for an announcement of the appointment. In the case of Bishop-elect Iffert, the announcement was made on July 13 in Rome and Washington D.C., with subsequent press releases in Covington and Belleville. A date is then set for the new bishop's ordination; we look forward to the ordination of Bishop-elect Iffert on Thursday, September 30, in Covington.

I hope that this column is helpful to our readers in understanding this important process. The goal is to identify a good priest who can fulfill the bishop's mission to teach, govern and sanctify. I hope that people are encouraged that the process involves consultation with the laity: parishioners, trustees, parish council members, and others, so that the best possible candidate emerges. Please pray for Bishop-elect Iffert and all of our bishops, that we can live with integrity as successors of the apostles and be good shepherds of the Lord's flock entrusted to our care.





Bishops: Getting COVID-19 vaccine is 'act of charity,' supports the common good.

WASHINGTON (CNS) — The "gravity" of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and "the lack of availability of alternative vaccines," are "sufficiently serious" reasons to accept the Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna vaccines, the chairmen of the U.S. bishops' doctrine and pro-life committees said Dec. 14. "Receiving the COVID-19 vaccine ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community," they said. "In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good." The bishops addressed the moral concerns raised by the fact the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines have some connection to cell lines that originated with tissue taken from abortions.

However, this connection to morally compromised cell lines is so remote and the public health situation is too grave to reject the vaccines, said Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades of Fort Wayne-South Bend, Indiana, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Doctrine, and Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City, Kansas, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Pro-Life Activities. Bishop Rhoades and Archbishop Naumann said they found the AstraZeneca vaccine it to be "more morally compromised" and concluded this vaccine "should be avoided" if there are alternatives available.

"Our love of neighbor should lead us to avoid giving scandal, but we cannot omit fulfilling serious obligations such as the prevention of deadly infection and the spread of contagion among those who are vulnerable just to avoid the appearance of scandal," the two prelates said.

"While having ourselves and our families immunized against COVID-19 with the 🖔 new vaccines is morally permissible and can be an act of self-love and of charity toward others, we must not allow the gravely immoral nature of abortion to be obscured," Bishop Rhoades and Archbishop Naumann said.
