

Our Advent journey is quickly coming to an end. Over these past weeks, we have traveled a well-worn road that many of us have traveled before. We know the routine well enough, being creatures of habit. I pray that this year you stepped outside the comfort zone and explored Advent as never before. Within days, Christmas will be here; we are back to Ordinary Time within weeks. There is still time to do your Advent "shopping" to find those last-minute treasures that are inside of you. The Christmas movie "Home Alone" can help us focus our Advent Journey. As Kate McCallister, Kevin's mother, flies with the family to France, she begins to believe she left something behind. Her husband, Peter, tries to reassure her. "Honey, what's the matter?" Kate feels she forgot something. Did she turn off the coffee pot, lock the door, close the garage? Pete reassures her, "Honey, you just feel that way because we left in such a hurry." After some quiet thinking, she screams out her son's name, KEVIN! She realized she had left him behind. It wasn't until Kate was 30,000 feet above the ground that she realized she had left her son behind. She sadly looked out into the distance and asked herself, "What kind of mother am I?"

#### Dear Friends.

As I write this column during the third week of Advent, I am struck by the scripture passages we have been reading. John the Baptist prepares the way of the Lord by calling for a spirit of repentance. The people respond wondering if the long-awaited Messiah is about to arrive. Would this also mean the end of the Roman occupation of Israel? Would the Messiah restore the fortunes of Israel by restoring the kingdom of Solomon and David?

Jesus, in his public preaching, tries to explain the shift now taking place, that the Kingdom promised by God was not a place, it was not the restored kingdom of Solomon and David. Rather the Kingdom of God is a person, Jesus himself. Jesus of Nazareth is Son of God, Son of Mary, Son of David and the Savior of the World. That is the gospel we proclaim again and again. The mission of the Church is to introduce the world to her Savior, that the world may discover the Kingdom of God in Jesus Christ.

That is the reason we have our parishes and their many ministries. That is why we have heartfelt worship. That is why we have catechesis and Catholic education. That is why we reach out to the poor. That is why the Church's life should include the promotion of justice. The Church is always on a mission to introduce the world to Jesus: Son of God, Son of Mary, Son of David, Savior of the World.

The mission of introducing the world to her Savior is seen in the gospel texts concerning the Lord's birth that we will hear proclaimed in the liturgy during the Christmas Season. Mary and Joseph welcome the shepherds who have received the message of an angel: "This day in David's city a savior has been born to you, the Messiah and Lord." (Luke 2:11). The shepherds visit Jesus, Mary and Joseph and begin sharing the news: "All who heard of it were astonished at the report given them by the shepherds (Luke 2:18). Later, the Magi come bearing gifts and found "the child with Mary his mother." (Matthew 2:11). I imagine that the first question the Magi would have asked Mary is: "what's the baby's name?" Finally, when Mary and Joseph bring the child Jesus to be presented in the temple, Simeon and Anna encounter the child Jesus; Anna then "talked about the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem. (Luke 2:28)."

My friends, I encourage each of us to introduce people to our Lord Jesus in the Christmas Season and in the coming year. Beginning with the people in our family, our friends and the people we meet in our daily lives. Let's help one another realize more deeply that the Kingdom of God is the very per-

son of Jesus. May we be filled with an interior peace and joy that only God can give and spread that peace and joy by the way we live and treat one another.

May the Lord Jesus bless each of you and your loved ones abundantly as we celebrate the Nativity of our Lord.

In Luke's Gospel the Holy Spirit helps reveal Jesus' identity as God to those who believe. Elizabeth is filled with the Holy Spirit and sings Mary's praise because she bears the Lord. We sing these words of praise to Mary in the Hail Mary. Even John the Baptist, the unborn child in Elizabeth's womb, is said to recognize the presence of the Lord and leaps for joy. It is appropriate in this season of Advent that we consider the role of Mary in God's plan of salvation. Elizabeth describes Mary as the first disciple, as the one who believed that God's word to her would be fulfilled. Mary's faith enabled her to recognize the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to everyone. Because of this, Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan for salvation.

# RESPECT LIFE

If we truly want young women to be no less than Mary for every unplanned pregnancy, we can be no less than Joseph for every fatherless child, no less than the Beloved Disciple for every unsupported mother. But this costs more than a picket sign. It costs us being inconvenienced by others in the way Mary and Joseph and the Beloved Disciples were inconvenienced by an Other, perhaps even in the way that Other was inconvenienced by all of us. If Christ shares the burden of human death, surely he can expect us to share the burden of human life, whether that means adopting babies or adopting mothers-for we all are adoptees (Rom. 8:15; Eph. 1:5). And while this may or may not require a formal adoption process, it will require an effort to make room for others in our lives in very tangible ways. It will require welcoming young women and men into our homes and to our tables, into conversations, into mentoring relationships, friendships, and into our gatherings, and doing so before they find themselves in such desperate situations. But it means welcoming young women and men in precisely the same way after they find themselves in such desperate situations, as well. It means being committed to making room for others' lives so that they can commit to making room for new life when it comes, planned or unplanned, because that is always God's plan.


