Third Sunday of Lent March 12, 2023

Centuries ago, a waterman used to carry water from the river to the king's palace in two earthen pots – one perfect, another cracked – and was paid according to the amount of water he brought. Unfortunately, the waterman was poorly paid since much water leaked through his cracked pot. Dejected, the cracked-pot cried, "Master, I'm cracked and bring you less money. Discard me!" The waterman replied, "No! Watch carefully!" Then, he took the two pots back to the river, filled them, and told the cracked pot to look at the pathway on its side. The cracked pot was surprised to see beautiful flowers beneath it. "See that?" explained the waterman, "I knew you're a cracked-pot, so I sowed seeds along the way. You've sprayed water on them and made the king's pathway beautiful!" Like the king's waterman, today's readings describe water-bearers. Two of them, Moses and Jesus bring water to the thirsty. (Francis Gonsalves in Sunday Seeds for Daily Deeds; quoted by Fr. Botelho).

In the Gospel today, we encounter someone familiar to any with an even slightly greater than remote knowledge of the Gospel stories: The Samaritan woman, "the woman at the well." There can be no doubt that she is the main character here, as well she should be. But it is helpful, perhaps especially today, to focus on a lesser character or characters in this adventure: the disciples. As much as we might want to identify with the woman at the well — and many of us can and do so, and justifiably — we would all do well to identify at least as closely with the disciples. The disciples are "us." We are the disciples. The actions of the disciples, toward Jesus, and toward the woman of Samaria, could be, in some sense or other, our actions. How are their actions our actions? How do our actions mimic theirs?

Jesus identifies himself to the woman as the Messiah, and she "gets it." And just then, right at that moment, here come the disciples. They are shocked that he is talking to this woman, in this place. The disciples are "us." Are we shocked, when we are shown Jesus speaking to ... well, I'm sure we can fill in that blank with a number of possibilities, a number of "types" we exclude without really thinking about it. Who is it that, when we see Jesus undeniably speaking to them, we are struck speechless? The disciples are speechless. And the woman puts down her water jar and goes and does what we would expect disciples to do: exhorts people to come and see Jesus. It is the Samaritan woman who does this, not the disciples. Perhaps only she can reach out to her people in a way.

Teach Us To Pray 27 February 2023

During Lent we have a number of catechumens preparing for baptism at the Easter Vigil in the different parishes in southern Illinois. As I write this column we have just finished the Rite of Election at the Cathedral of St Peter where I welcomed those catechumens and prayed for them as they enter their final weeks of preparation for Baptism, Confirmation and the Holy Eucharist.

In the process of preparing the catechumens for baptism, they will be presented and receive the Lord's Prayer. This is a very old custom in the rites of the Church. Jesus himself gave this prayer to his followers, in response to their request: "teach us to pray as John taught his disciples".

Do you remember who taught you the Lord's Prayer? How old were you when you first learned it? I don't think I can calculate how many times I have said the "Our Father", but a day doesn't go by without me saying the prayer a couple of times between rising and going to bed.

I have prayed the Our Father at Mass, on a plane, with inmates in a jail, with patients and families in the hospital, during confession, at the cemetery, and many other places. I imagine many of our readers can also think of ordinary and extraordinarily times when we have turned to God the Father and lifted up our hearts using the words of this prayer.

May I suggest a spiritual practice for Lent? Think about some of the times you have said the Lord's Prayer and the people who were with you at that moment of prayer. As I write this column I think of my mom, who taught me the Our Father and the many times I prayed these words with her or for her. During Lent, I am lifting up a prayer of gratitude for the way my mom and I shared in praying the Lord's Prayer. Parents and grandparents reading this column, think of the importance of praying with your children and grandchildren. In Lent, find more opportunities to pray the Our Father for your family and with your family.

The different phrases of the prayer may resonate within our souls at different times in our lives. Right now the phrase that resonates with me is "thy kingdom come." How about for you? My point is that the Lord's Prayer is such a gift from Christ that I hope we take some time in Lent to come to a

deeper appreciation of the prayer and the moments in our journey of faith when the prayer has meant so much.

Please remember in your prayers our catechumens who will be learning the prayers in the coming weeks as they prepare for baptism. May the Lord remember us all in his kingdom and teach us to pray.

During Lent, the Christian faithful are obliged to do penance through prayer, fasting, abstinence and by performing works of piety and charity. Even outside of Lent, the bishops in the U.S. still exhort the faithful to observe all Fridays as days of penance in recognition of Friday as the day of our Lord's death and in preparation for the heavenly banquet at Sunday Mass.

Fasting

Fasting is an ancient practice whose importance can be seen time and again throughout the Old and New Testaments of the Bible. Everyone age 18 and up to their 59th birthday is obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Only one full meal is allowed on days of fasting. Two other meals, often called collations, may be taken to maintain strength according to one's needs. When combined, these collations should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals and collations is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. The obligation does not apply to those whose health or ability to work would be seriously affected.

Abstinence

Everyone age 14 and older is to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. In the Midwest, highend seafood can often be a luxury and a significant expense, especially when consumed at restaurants. While consuming such food certainly observes the "letter of the law" in regards to the obligation, in order to reap the most bountiful spiritual fruits, the faithful should ensure their intention is united to the "spirit" of such obligations.

Sant Patrick's Day, Friday, March 17, 2023 Dispensation for the Faithful

Bishop McGovern has granted a dispensation for the Faithful for Friday, March 17, 2023. The regulation to abstain from eating meat is lifted for that Friday only. The faithful are encouraged to perform another act of Prayer or Almsgiving on St. Patrick's Day.

Prayer - Fasting - Almsgiving

It is popular for Catholics to "give something up" for Lent. This is not required by the Church, but it is often encouraged as a way to detach from the things of the world and focus our attention on God and heaven. This helps a soul prepare for Easter and grow in holiness at the same time.

We owe God everything and he owes us nothing. Yet, he has given us everything and we often give very little in return. Consider showing your deep love and trust for God by giving something up that you think will be very difficult. Resign yourself to him in complete trust and let him be your guide through the long journey of Lent. If you slip and give in during the journey, the only shame comes if you abandon your sacrifice completely as if it has lost all its merit. Turn again to him who never turns from you, and ask him to give you the resolve to rise once more and push on to that great and holy Easter day.

Decree of Dispensation

Given the penitential nature of the Season of Lent, the Bishops of the United States have preserved in our dioceses the tradition of abstinence from meat on each of the Fridays of Lent, "confident that no Catholic Christian will lightly hold himself excused from this penitential practice" (National Conference of Catholic Bishops, Statement, November 18, 1966, n. 13).

The law of abstinence binds those Catholics who have completed the fourteenth year of their age (can. 1252).

"During the Lenten season, certain feasts occur which the liturgy or local custom traditionally exempts from the Lenten spirit of penance. The observance of these will continue to be set by local diocesan regulations..." (Statement, n. 16).

This year, the Memorial of Saint Patrick falls on Friday, March 17. It is well known that Saint Patrick's Day is a day of convivial celebration for many American Catholics.

I therefore decree that on Friday, March 17, 2023, all Catholics of the Diocese of Belleville, no matter where they may be, and all other Catholics actually present in the Diocese on that day, are, by my authority, dispensed from the obligation (can. 87 §1).

It is not required that anyone make use of this dispensation. Those who do wish to make use of it are encouraged to abstain from meat on some other day as part of their penitential practices during Lent.
